## What's Next in the Building Project?

What an exciting Easter Sunday. I would like to thank you for inviting your friends and family members. It was a perfect day. We have never had so many people at our church. We had 422 in the worship count and then add in all the children and you that were in Sunday School but not included in the worship count I believe we actually had almost 500 on Easter.

Our vision remains the same, it is not about how many people, it's about Honoring God by growing people in the Lord! It is so exciting when we see people growing in the Lord to the point that they want others to love Jesus too so they invite them to church!

It has been a year since our the first special meeting where we introduced our desire to address the parking and space issues at FBCC. So you may be asking what is happening and when will construction commence.

As a pastor I would appreciate this whole process going much faster but I am learning patience, so the Lord tells me. I have learned there are many questions that must be answered when attempting to do commercial work (a church falls into commercial as opposed to residential) and those problems are compounded when you are working on a hill side with water issues.

Over the past six months we have been working with Mason Engineering on the site lay out. A preliminary site plan was prepared and presented to the city. This site plan shows a new parking layout as well. Elder Dan Thomas has a comparison chart showing how many new spaces will be added in the new plan, see the chart on page 2. But, before we can move forward we have to address our water issues, such as water collected on our property, water that flows onto our property from up the hill and water coming up in springs.

We have been discussing with the engineer the cost difference between underground retention pipe verses a

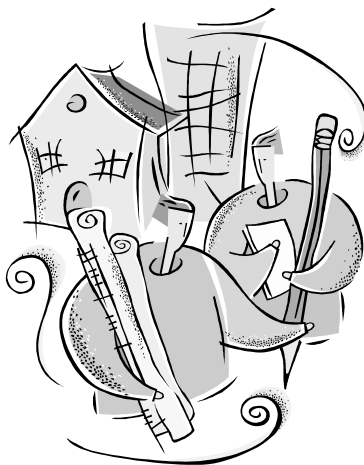
retention pond. We must meet the requirements of the Department of Ecology so we are weighing the cost and benefits of both options. One problem we have is the ideal placement of a retention pond on our property is where our out building that is currently housing the food bank.

You may not be aware of this but the Food Bank (FB) was started in FBCC in the early '70's by Pastor Hull. FBCC bought the building and moved the FB into the space some time later and launched the food bank as a non-profit organization. The FB has operated in our building for 30 years rent free (well \$1 a year officially). The good news is the FB has been in negotiation with District 6 to acquire the property behind their new station just off of Jackson Hwy. A new building will meet the Food Bank's current space and parking needs.

You may ask who is making the decisions and guiding the church through this process. Let me tell you a little about our team. First, is Don Lakin, FBCC church member since 1969 and is a retired teacher. He taught drafting at W.F.West H.S. for 32 years. Second is Warren Sorenson, FBCC member since 2004. He worked for Weyerhaeuser for 38 years in Forest Land management, his responsibilities include harvest unit lay out, and lay out for structures and road management. Third is Harry Sumrock member since March 2011. Harry managed road construction for 40 years with Tom Martin Construction and Wilder Construction, as well as managing site work for local hospitals.

As you see God has been at work building our team and preparing us for each step. On May 22 we will have a Special Business meeting. At this meeting we will be talking about our next steps and how you can be involved. Bring your check books!

# DOWN ON THE FARM –PUDDLE JUMPING

Rock-pitted potholes pock the meandering driveway. Refilled by every passing rain shower, these bone-jarring, alignment-altering holes are obstacles to be driven around, straddled or bounced through. They are problems to be lived with until the ground dries enough to scrape, smooth and repack the surface. At least that's my "grown-up" perspective.

A walk with our two-year-old grandson, Kasey, provides a reminder that potholes plus water equals puddles. At his age, jumping and splashing are an automatic response to any small body of water. It doesn't seem to matter that the rain is drizzling down or that the boots are still in the house. He grins and laughs as his feet propel water in every direction.

As grandma, I'm tickled by his antics even as I bite back all the "Don't get wet!", "Put your boots on!" and "You'll catch your death of cold!" comments that run through my mind. Kasey's exuberance brightens my day.

I wonder as I watch him if I let the practical needs of my days steal my joy in the Lord? Far too often, the answer is yes. My successful day is frequently based about how much gets done and I miss the gifts God has poured out on me.

What a sobering thought... almost depressing ... until another, more uplifting understanding replaces it. God took the childlike wonder I had at Kasey's age and paired it with knowledge of Him. Now, He blesses me with the ability to paint word pictures that illuminate a truth He wants us to understand. Using that blessing is not without risk.

Sharing my writing with someone else is an area of great vulnerability. In the past, that has caused me to limit what I wrote and who I let read it. Several years ago, God nudged me toward writing a monthly *Down on the Farm* article for our church's newsletter. The more I've let Him direct the focus and own the results of each story, the more freedom I've had from that limiting sense of vulnerability. The stories I write are His. The truths they reveal are His. The talents and skills used are His. The truth is that all the risk is His and He has been teaching me to trust Him with all of who I am.

God is now showing me the gift of child-like wonder that Kasey exhibits isn't dead in me; my Heavenly Father has simply transformed it. As He matures me, blessing me with understanding how to apply his teaching, my joy is not diminished but renewed and refined.

Now when I'm presented with an opportunity or challenge, my senses of maturity and adventure do not war with one another. I can count the cost and weigh the risk while trusting God to reveal His direction. The sight of a water filled pothole is a perfect example. Even as practicality compels me to don coat and boots, the joy and wonder of God's creation propel me into the water to send muddy drops exploding skyward.

# Plants work together to produce food in the Congo



The Mucuna vines climb up the corn stalks and engulf the field three months after the corn harvest. In dry season the Mucuna dies back. When the rains start we plant corn seed directly in the mulch.

*Our well-being as a human species depends on the health of the and on which we depend. The biblical message of creation underlines humankind's responsibility to care for the land and make it fruitful. A semi-subsistence farmer understands this. Unfortunately in places like Vanga she is caught in the maelstrom of population growth and demand for land. The tradition of leaving the land in fallow is increasingly ignored in the struggle to feed children and make ends meet. But caring for the land doesn't necessarily mean sacrificing better lives, as ACDI Lusekele's experience of the last six years has shown.*

The corn was finally harvested from the small experimental field in the ACDI demonstration garden in January. Antoine set the husked ears in the sun for another week. Then the research guys shelled the corn, cleaned the seed and weighed it: 69 kilograms of gleaming white kernels filled two large basins.

No Iowa corn master would be impressed; an indifferent Iowa farmer produces 3 times as much per unit of land . . . in his sleep. Still the 69kg translates into 1,586 kg per hectare (2.5 acres). That is on a plot of weathered, sandy soil, using no fertilizers, in the sixth year of continuous corn cultivation on the same plot. To put the yield in perspective: a Congolese woman planting corn on a newly opened forest field would be delighted to produce 700 to 1,000 kg per hectare. And even she would never consider planting a second crop of corn on the same land until several years later.

How do we do it? The secret is the nitrogen-fixing capacity of the leguminous cover crop that follows the corn each year. *Mucuna pruriens* is a vigorous bean plant that buries the field in 3 feet of lush vegetation during the second rainy season. The leaves, vines and roots store up nitrogen. When the rains start again we plant the next corn crop. The nitrogen locked up in the decomposing organic matter is released, nourishing the young corn plant and favoring rapid growth. When the corn is maturing the next *Mucuna* cover crop is already developing. We harvest the corn and the cycle continues.

Agronomists have estimated that the *Mucuna* cover crop provides the equivalent of 17 to 35 bags of mixed chemical fertilizer for each 2.5 acres of land. That's about \$1800 worth of fertilizer at current Kinshasa prices.

The yield in the experimental field was down a bit this year. But still the average over the last five years has been 1,733 kg/ha, about twice the yield in a traditional Congolese corn field - despite continuous cropping. This looks like one productive alternative to traditional slash and burn agriculture. Corn-*Mucuna* is one way to increase productivity and income and reduce the human footprint on increasingly scarce prime\*\* agricultural land. ACDI Lusekele is helping people to understand that becoming good stewards of the land can also be a pathway to improving our lives.

**\* "prime" agricultural land in much of Bandundu is misleading. These are old soils. They are highly weathered, stripped of most of their basic nutrients and chemically altered, impairing their capacity to hold on to nutrients. Most agriculture here depends on fertility locked up in the organic matter that accumulates during extended natural bush fallow intervals between cropping cycles.**

# Mission of the Month - Love In the Name of Christ

Love In The Name Of Christ has experienced a huge increase in business the last year due to the financial status of our community – many people have lost jobs and cannot find new ones, have been laid off and can't find work, and we seem to be getting a greater number of people who simply do not have a good work ethic and/or want too much to be given to them to make up for poor choices. Some of these we simply have to turn away to be good stewards of God's money. These are the ones we agonize over, for perhaps some of them, with a mentor who could make a relationship with them, and help them see a better way to live and make better choices, could see a dramatic change in their lives.

We provide classes for cooking and budgeting, and are learning that many, many folks just don't have the basic life skills to help them succeed. We ask that you join us in prayer for those who need this kind of help will attend the classes.

Last year requests for help topped the 6,000 mark – a small example of which were small house repairs, wheelchair ramp provision, automobile repair, transportation to appointments, bus tickets back to family or away from domestic violence, financial help with utilities and gas, background

checks and other fees, food, and a whole array of referrals to other social service agencies. We served 6,074 adults and 4,027 children in 2010.

Our administration expense is kept at 15%, which is excellent, and means that 85% of donations given to Love INC goes directly toward helping those in need. We write grants and have been awarded some: One of our favorite stories is of the trust officers who came to see our operation in response to a grant we wrote, and after looking around a bit, they said, "You have an excellent operation here, but you asked for too little money. Write a grant next year and ask for \$40,000 so you can have your own covered truck to deliver the household goods to people!"

How we praise God for His provision. Every morning, before starting work, we spend time in prayer, and many times Gary, our Furniture Ministry guy, asks the Lord for more provision in the Storehouse, because the inventory is getting low. More often than not, that very *day* a call will come through, or a person will drop by, and the very item asked for is brought in! And in the days following, the Storehouse once again fills up.

This ministry belongs to God, and we thank Him often and sincerely for paying for it, which of course, means

you! We take no other monies than what is freely given. We know it is all about Him, not us, and we ask only that our doing is pleasant to Him, and obedient to His Word. Of course we need more volunteers to be single mom mentors, 2<sup>nd</sup> grade tutors at schools, furniture deliverers and most of all, some who are willing to knock on a door after someone has received a couch or a bed from Love INC, and make a relationship with them, out of which will come the conviction of the Holy Spirit, and a new name will be added to the Lamb's Book of Life!

We are so grateful for the support from Chehalis First Baptist Church....may God bless you all.

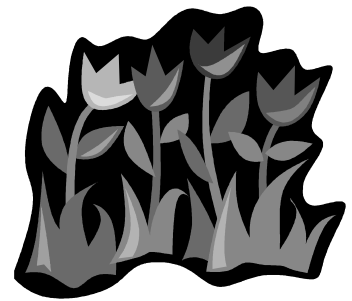
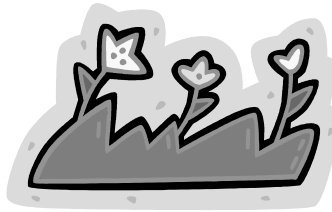

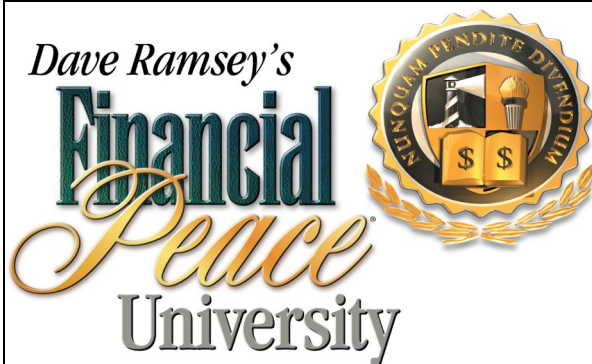
