As we turn this corner in history, I believe that God is calling the HMB, under the vision and leadership of the Parent Body led by our vigorous and visionary President, Rev. Dr. Jerry Young, to carry the compassion of our Christ! We serve to answer the call to carry the compassion and care of our Christ to the vulnerable and needy around us. In Matthew 25:31-46, believers in the Lord Jesus Christ are tasked with being a portion of the manifestation of Christ's compassion. Through our

heads, hands, and hearts, Christ reaches the lost, the unsaved, the homeless, the hurting, and the helpless! Like the advent and arrival of Jesus fulfilled a manifestation of "the Word made flesh", we, through the HMB, strive to make the compassion, concern and care of Christ, flesh to those whose lives have been impacted by poverty, problems, pains, and predicaments beyond their controls!

A wise colleague, Pastor Aaron Brown of Unity Baptist Church, Eutawville, SC once said, "God calls us to loving service." By this, Pastor Brown seems to say that our love, like God's love, must be active, not static! The HMB has always intended to and labored to reveal the love, mercy, and peace of God. We will continue this great legacy of making the Word of God become flesh by actively spreading the love of God with compassion and care!

Throughout my life and Pastoral career, I have heard the expression—"I would rather see a great sermon than hear a great sermon." While preaching is a vital aspect of Gospel work, when worship and preaching are completed, the sick, the homeless, the imprisoned, the downtrodden, and the recipients of injustice among us still need to know that our God is real beyond the walls of our splendid sanctuaries and Annual Sessions of the NBC, USA, Inc.!

Since our Annual Session in September, much has transpired in the world and on the soil of these United States! Among the many tragedies and turmoil that turned our stomachs sour, our HMB has been fighting the fight of faith to address those concerns that have been brought to our attention. Executive Secretary Dr. Pickett and I have both been in constant dialogue with President Dr. Jerry Young and the Office of Disaster Management through Rev. Dr. Joe Albert Bush. Such support resulted in a relevant, real, and reasonable response to "The 1,000-year rain event" that caused the historic flooding that paralyzed much of the coastal and midlands regions of South Carolina!

The Office of Disaster Management, on behalf of the NBC, USA, Inc. established a partnership with the American Red Cross (ARC) to channel relief and recovery resources to areas of need in several counties in SC! Supplies for feeding, clothing, and sheltering displaced families were provided by the ARC to several sites in some of the hardest hit areas namely: Clarendan County, Charleston County, Dorchester County, Richland County, and Williamsburg County. Throughout the state of SC, coordinating the mission efforts was a

tremendous challenge! If not for the efforts of the President of the Baptist Educational and Missionary Convention of South Carolina (BEMC of SC), Rev. Dr. James Blassingame and the SC Home Mission Coordinator Rev. Samuel Fulmore, chaos would have prevented much-needed resources from being used and made ineffective in helping the hurting people of South Carolina. Through conference calls that included representation from The HMB, Office of Disaster Management, ARC, BEMC of SC, and local politicians, coordinated efforts were planned and executed.

The HMB had a direct impact on fewer than three hundred (300) churches, individuals, and families through the Morris Street Baptist Church, Reverend Leonard O. Griffin, Pastor, which served as a Distribution Site. With the resources provided by the ARC partnership and other church and private donations, churches, individuals, and families received some of the following: bottles of bleach, buckets and mops, plastic tarps, leather work gloves, gifts cards of varying amounts up to \$40.00, chemical drying agents, hand sanitizers, clothing items, meals, diapers, and assistance with communicating with federal, state, and local agencies for governmental assistance!

The Recovery phase of the historic flooding event will be a long one. Entire Apartment Complexes were destroyed and/or significantly damaged!
Residences were washed away from their foundations and/or flooded or became dangerously overrun with black mold! Businesses, roads, bridges, and even caskets were washed away in the wake of the powerful movement of the water! Many houses of worship could not open their doors for worship on Sunday, October 4, 2015! Many churches, including Morris Street Baptist, suffered some minimal damage like small intrusion of water up to damages to their respective roofs. Therefore, ongoing, committed, and sustained efforts are paramount!!

During the Annual Session of the Charleston County Missionary Baptist Association, Executive Secretary Dr. Gilbert Pickett visited and preached a dynamic sermon entitled: "What to Expect If You Ever Expect to Be Used by God" using Isaiah 6:1-8 as a sermon text. This sermon and Dr. Pickett were a tremendous blessing to our Association and enlightened those in attendance. The HMB was well represented. Moderator Dr. William A. Salley pledged continued financial support of the HMB!

Permit me to take a few moments here to comment on the continued slaughter of the innocent through gun violence! Gary Smith is a concerned citizen of SC! He and many others are part of the effort to challenge municipalities to enforce stiffer penalties for those who exact pain on and slaughter of innocent citizens through gun violence! A grass-roots organization of a broad cross-section of the Charleston community and vicinity has formed. With this mission statement: "Galvanized by the Emanuel AME tragedy, we are an independent, grassroots group of South Carolinians working hard to close the gaps in laws that make it too easy for guns to fall into the wrong hands — while supporting the Second Amendment right of citizens to lawfully own guns," GUN SENSE SC seeks to partner with all who are concerned about the senseless violence that is plaguing every American community!

As a Pastor in the Charleston community, I joined forces with this effort and will support "Gun Sense Sunday" on Sunday, January 20, 2016 by discussing with our congregation the need for every voter to participate in the election process, by preaching a message around the need for peace in the world and around the need for prevention of guns being easily obtainable by the wrong people, and by supporting the efforts and mission of Gun Sense SC. At present, over fifty (50) or more Pastors, Religious, and Civic Leaders have pledged support of "Gun Sense Sunday!" Too many innocent citizens have been gunned down through the use of assault and automatic weapons. Such weapons are to be used by the military but are now too easily available to those with ill intentions!

On Tuesday, November 9 and Wednesday, November 10, I was privileged to represent the HMB to speak to the delegates of the General Baptist State Convention of North Carolina regarding the missionary efforts of the HMB and to share any updates on the progress being made with restoring the community following the Mother Emanuel A.M.E. Church shooting and following the flooding. President Rev. Dr. Nilous Avery, Officers, and Convention delegates received me well and pledged to support the efforts of the HMB in the future.

On Friday, December 4, at Mother Emanuel A.M.E. Church, I participated in "A Service of Remembrance" at the conclusion of a full day of panel discussions and presentations around a theme of "Moving From Crisis to Action: A Public Health Approach to Reducing Gun Violence" sponsored by a collaboration of The College of Charleston, Medical University of SC, Charleston Police

Department, and others. "The conference was hosted by Emanuel AME Church and featured public health, medical and legal experts, faith leaders, lawmakers and law enforcement officials." These panel discussions



centered upon recommendations for stemming the tide of heinous killing and violence that is consistently occurring across the country.

Finally, I zealously and ardently seek the continued financial support of our HMB by Pastors, individual members of congregations, churches, and those who share our values and support our mission to carry the compassion of our Christ. Without your donations, we would not be positively positioned to participate in the purposes of our God! Please consider giving a little extra if you are already a supporter. A Historic Global Invitation for Solidarity with People of **African Descent**

On December 23, 2013, the United Nations (U.N.) General Assembly proclaimed 2015-2024 as the International Decade for People of African Descent with the theme "People of African Descent: Recognition, Justice and Development." At the center of this initiative is the promotion and protection of all human rights of people of African descent, the improvement of their well-being, and the recognition of their culture, history, and contribution to societies.

While this global invitation from the United Nations is most welcomed, people of African descent have been seeking promotion and protection of their human rights for many centuries. Take, for example, the slave revolts led by people of African descent in places like Charleston, S.C., where the martyred nine saints of Mother Bethel Church were fatally attacked this year. Also the uprisings of African slaves on slave ships during the trans-Atlantic slave trade and during Reconstruction, when African-Americans made significant political and economic gains after the Emancipation Proclamation, which were later pushed back by Jim Crow laws. In recent times, the Civil Rights and Black Lives Matter movements are also examples. In each case, the faith of people of African descent and their youth have played important roles.

So what is the significance of the U.N.'s commemoration? Although the U.N. has historically been committed to human rights, the decade invites a specific, unified approach of solidarity within the African diaspora

and nation states where people of African descent are the majority, where they are not the majority, and where they do not reside. This includes wealthier nations, rising, developing countries, and poor countries that support the U.N. resolution. The decade is also aligned with the newly adopted Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) that address matters of equality.

Recently I was at the launch of the commemoration in the U.S. The event was titled "Confronting the Silence: Perspectives and Dialogue on Structural Racism against People of African Descent Worldwide." Marlysa Thomas, the new Bread for the World Domestic Advisor for Policy and Programs, Specific Populations, was also there. She summarized the most prominent themes of the commemoration: 1) the declaration that Black lives matter is a critically important assertion worldwide; 2) engaging governments on the local, state, and national levels is crucial to seeking reform; 3) racial profiling is a problem that plagues all societies globally; 4) colorism is an issue that must be acknowledged in this initiative; and 5) progress on de-racialization is possible and has already been made in different areas of the world.

In summation, the decade calls for global solidarity with specific issues that most affect people of African descent but that also link to effectively addressing universal issues such as hunger and poverty, lack of fair trade opportunities, full employment, inadequate resources to empower small holders of land, and lack of voice and participation. Bread for the World is committed to addressing these related issues that link to ending hunger. We invite you to join us at this momentous time.

React – with all lowliness and gentleness, with long-suffering, bearing with one another in love and **Interact** – "endeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace."

After reading articles of the blockbuster movie, "Star Wars: The Force Awakens," I reflected on the kind of difference churches could make through rocking and rolling with each other in strategic partnerships and fellowship. This movie is breaking all records regarding receipts. At the time of this article, 12/22/2015, it surpassed \$100 million in North America and \$250 million globally. In the first two days of its release it made over \$120 million. It will make well over \$200 million by the end of its initial rollout.

When every church awakens "The Force", what Dr. King called "unconditional love," there's no telling what records in mission ministries we can break regarding hunger in America.

You may remember some of King's most memorable quotes:

"Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that." "He who is devoid of the power to forgive is devoid of the power to love."

"Everybody can be great ... because anybody can serve. You don't have to have a college degree to serve."

"You don't have to make your subject and verb agree to serve. You only need a heart full of grace. A soul generated by love."

"There can be no deep disappointment where there is no

deep love."

"Love is the only force capable of transforming an enemy into a friend."

I especially love the last quote about love transforming an enemy into a friend because Hunger is an enemy. This is why the Home Mission Board is working with President Young in his effort to assist in the problem of national and world Hunger. We are doing so through conversations-to-action with Bread for the World under one of its staff members, Dr. Angelique Walker-Smith.

Hunger used to be the number one problem faced by Black Americans but it seems to have been trumped (no pun intended) by race-based violence: black-on-black violence and rogue-cops-gone-wrong, race-centered violence. However, no matter how you look at it, there is a direct connection between race, violence, and the poverty that gives birth to hunger. This trinity of evil has left our children as casualties of war against Hunger.

Executive Secretary Pickett, Chairman Griffin and Dr. Angelique Walker Smith are strategically located by virtue of their positions of power and authority. God's grace has positioned them and the rest of us for such a time as this, national hunger, to leverage our knowledge, skills, vocational experiences and connections to make a National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc. contribution to the national problem of hunger, if not world hunger.

Inspired by our Master's felt mercy and might in our lives, and armed by mission mandates such as stated in Matthew 25:35, "I was hungry and you gave me no meat" it's time to rock and roll! When we honor our Master's mission mandate we are rocking and rolling with the Rock of Ages. Jesus is the One and only one who can roll away the figurative rock that seals the fate of too many children and families in a land flowing with milk and honey.

In 2016, let's "awaken The Force!" Let's not just get our rock on in church. Let's get our roll on when we leave! Let's rock and roll with Jesus -- the Bread of Life -- and end hunger as this nation has known it far too long!

Update on Mother Emanuel AME Church Charleston, South Carolina




December 17, 2015 marked exactly six months since the day Mother Emanuel A.M.E. Church was violated by hatred, racism, and violence by the alleged perpetrator Dylan Roof! During the week leading to this six month anniversary of this mass murder, the Conference of National Black Churches (CNBC), Dr. Jacqui L. Burton, President, convened a three-day Consultation in Charleston around the Theme: "The Healing of Our Nation: Race & Reconciliation A Cross-Racial Dialogue". The CNBC "is comprised of the national leadership of the eight largest historically African-American denomination that have a combined membership of over 20 million people and 30,000 congregations in the United States and the African Diaspora." (Excerpted from the program booklet).

Thirteen nationally and internationally known Preachers, Pastors, Professors, and Speakers preached, lectured, taught Bible Study, and led the Panel Discussions throughout the three days. On December 17th, the Chairman of the CNBC, Rev. Dr. W. Franklyn Richardson, held a Press Conference flanked by nearly sixty Presenters and Attendees. He explained that this Consultation was a beginning of at least three years of strategic work to heal our nation of racism and hatred that divides within denominations, communities, ethnicities, and in worship! Through a ten-city approach, dialogues will be convened to bring the races together

through the medium of the universal church to foster conciliation and then reconciliation!

On Tuesday, December 15th, the CNBC Presenters and Attendees met for an ecumenical and Cross-Racial worship service. Senior Bishop John R. Bryant, A.M.E. Church, was the Keynote Preacher for this worship experience. Mother Emanuel A.M.E. was completely full, and a wonderful, dynamic, inspiring worship experience was the result!



Mother Emanuel continues to be led by the untiring leadership of Presiding Elder Dr. Norvel Goff. The congregation is slowly healing from these deep and demoralizing wounds! Worship services on Sundays and other days of the week continue to draw visitors from all walks of life. Of great interest is that a weekly Bible Study is taught by Rev. Dr. Brenda Nelson, who was slated to attend that fated June 17th Bible Study but was called away to attend to a matter at her home! She reports that the attendance is consistently in the ninety to one hundred range comprised of mostly African American members and Caucasian members of the community at-large! Rather than a "race war", a common Bible Study welcoming all races, ethnicities, and worshipers has resulted! But for the grace and power of God, people have found a means to come together!

Continue praying for this congregation! They, and the entire Charleston community, continue to need the undergirding of the power of God through prayer!
