# Financing and Budgeting, the Work of the Church/A Week in Tampa

In June, my daughter, Diana, and I travelled with the other NBCCE participants on chartered bus to Tampa Florida. The first leg of the trip was an overnight ride with several stops. The next morning, following a breakfast stop, we arrived at the Holy Land Experience in Orlando Florida. It was an amazing place filled with exhibits and short dramas about Jesus and His times. We began our experience with Holy Communion and ended it with the crucifixion. I would recommend this theme park to everyone.

The hotel we stayed in was in a suburb of Tampa, so we had to take the chartered bus into the city every morning. Classes or a lecture started at 8:00 AM, so we usually arrived at the convention center around 7:30 AM. My class was in a beautiful hotel across the street from the convention center. It was located next to the river and had a comfortable riverside patio. I would lounge there before the lectures began.

My session began everyday with two lecturers. The first one, Dr. Orr talked about how to grow disciples. His first lecture was entitled "A Disciple Needs Family." He says that "since a disciple needs a family to grow, he must abide in Jesus Christ and be accountable to others." The second lecture was about a disciple needing food, that a healthy diet of the Bible is essential for spiritual maturity. Thursday's lecture was about a disciple needing facts. A disciple must be equipped with all the facts if they are to move from milk to meat. The last lecture stated that a disciple needs framework, "Our head must be governed by Jesus Christ; our heart must be guarded by the power of God; our feet must be guided by the Word of God; and our members must be glued by the Holy Spirit." Dr. Orr's lectures were insightful and very fulfilling.

The second lecturer highlighted Dr. Orr's message.

My class, Financing and Budgeting the Work of the Church, was taught by Rev Robert J. Thompson from Pine Bluff Arizona. Our textbook was Money Matters in Church: A Practical Guide for Leaders by A. Malphurs and S. Strope. The objectives of the course were as follows: s to give a biblical description of God's plan for financing the work of the church; explain the relationship between the church budget and the plans for ministry by the church; teaching others how to compile an appropriate budget for their ministry; and describing at least three different types of budgets. Rev. Thompson emphasized that a good stewardship program was essential for a good budget. Bible stewardship and tithing is very important, as well as planning church finances, increasing programs and handling the funds in a responsible manner. He says that budgets must be flexible. If they are flexible, you will never be bent out of shape.

There were about 60 people in the class with people coming from all over the country and various size churches. Some people were very familiar with budgets, and others were just getting started, i.e. were asked to take over the finances of a church. Dr. Thompson was a very lively and spirit filled instructor. His class was easy to follow and full of fun facts and anecdotes.

It has been several years since I had attended the conference. I used to go with my mother. I enjoyed the fellowship with my fellow bus mates and the side trips. I appreciate the hard work that goes into planning these trips and I want to thank Sister Deloris Agee and her team for making this experience so very rewarding.

#### **Water Consumption**

When the body loses water, the consumption of water increases to maintain a healthy level (Grosvenor & Smolin, 2012). The need to drink gets recognized by thirsty sensation. The thirst is caused by the mouth becoming dry. Although water does not provide the energy, it is essential to sustain life (Grosvenor & Smolin, 2012). Water, in the human body, services as a participant and medium for regulation body temperature, metabolic reactions, provides protection, regulates acid-base balance, and transports nutrition and waste (Grosvenor & Smolin, 2012). The types of water reviewed include distilled, spring, and drinking water.

Distilled water goes through a filtration process that removes contaminants and natural minerals (Kirschner, 2013). The use of distilled water is in small appliances like steam irons or water pots. The water is free of mineral buildup that is present when using tap water (Kirschner, 2013). Distilled water is not the best water source for human

consumption since its natural, and sometimes beneficial, minerals get removed (Kirschner, 2013).

Bottled water mostly consists of spring water (Kirschner, 2013). "Spring water is from an underground source that may or may not have gone through treatment or purification process (Kirschner, 2013)." Although the name spring water sounds attractive, its human ingestion is questionable (Kirschner, 2013). Studies conducted by the National Resource Defense Council (NRDC) recovered traces of arsenic, phthalates, and coliform. While the label on the bottle says spring water, the source is often a mystery (Kirschner, 2013).

Potable water is intended for human consumption. It is safe to drink and comes from a variety of sources (Kirschner, 2013). There no additional ingredients outside of what is considered safe and usual, like fluoride. Fluoride is essential to the growth of young children, so fluoride supplements get taken if not present in your water (Kirschner, 2013). Contact your local water company for more details.

The human body needs water to regulate temperature as well as transport nutrients and waste. Distilled water has no minerals and gets used in small appliances. Spring water may or may not have gone through a purification process, and the source of the water is a mystery. Drinking water is safe and may contain fluoride, which is an essential mineral in the growth of young children. For more information on your tap water contact the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) (Kirschner, 2013). Additional information on bottled water is available through the Environmental Working Group (Kirschner, 2013).

The Science, Mathematics And Research for Transformation (SMART) Scholarship for Service Program is an opportunity for students pursuing an undergraduate or graduate degree in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) disciplines to receive a full scholarship and be gainfully employed upon degree completion.

Participants in the SMART Scholarship for Service Program will receive full tuition and education related fees (does not include items such as meal plans, housing, or parking), a stipend paid at a rate of \$25,000 - \$38,000 depending on degree pursuing, access to summer research internships, mentoring, and other allowances and benefits including employment placement upon graduation.

### **RECIPE: Balsamic Chicken**

You will need: 1/3 cup balsamic vinegar, ½ cup chicken broth, 2 Tbsp. sugar, 1 garlic clove, minced, 1 tsp. dried Italian herb seasoning, 4-skinless, boneless chicken breast halves, 1Tbsp olive oil

Wisk together the balsamic vinegar, chicken broth, sugar, garlic, and Italian seasoning in a bowl, place the chicken breasts in the marinade (10 minutes on each side).

Heat the olive oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Remove the chicken from the marinade and reserve the marinade. Place the chicken in the heated pan and cook until they start to brown and are no longer pink inside, about 7 minutes per side. Pour the marinade into the skillet, and cook until it thickens slightly, turning the chicken breasts over once or twice, about 5 minutes.

Other suggestions use either chicken tenderloins or cut your chicken breast over strips and serve over brown rice or pasta.
