



Little Red Wagon

In October and November we will be gathering food for St. Cyprian Food Pantry. It is the largest pantry to which we donate food. It serves over 1,600 people each month. The needs are great! With the approach of Thanksgiving, items such as yams, cranberry sauce, canned pumpkin and stuffing mix would be great additions to the usual breakfast, lunch and dinner foods.

Monetary donations to the Food Pantry Fund are always welcome. been on my mind and on the minds of Caren Hunter, Preschool Director, and members of the preschool's Parent Advisory Board. Some of the related questions are arising due to a present imbalance between morning program enrollment (for which there's a waiting list) and afternoon programs (many open spaces).



Families' preferences for time and duration of programs continues to evolve and give rise to questions of how to best use existing classroom space and/or how to create more within our present facility. The October and/or November Vestry meetings will provide a chance for the Vestry to better understand the needs, opportunities and options - in time for Caren to make decisions that will be required in time for preschool registration, beginning January 1. Meantime, parishioner thoughts and questions will be helpful and may be directed to Caren, the Wardens, Fr. Kevin or me.

Parishioners are encouraged to bring with them any non-perishable items or household goods (paper towels, toilet tissue, etc.) and leave them in the Little Red Wagon when they visit the church.

+On Sunday, 22 September, members from our parish walked on two teams in the Walk4ALS Chicago. **Jackie Kraus** walked on the **Paul Launer Iron Horse Brigade** team AND **Denney and Tina Roper** walked on their daughter-in-law's team, **Amy's Army**.

Jackie sent along the following information: **Paul Launer's Iron Horse Brigade** numbered over 200 and raised over \$77,000! with more coming in. Original goal was to raise \$20,000, then a match from the Foglia family would have put us at \$40,000. When the donations went over \$37,000, they said, "keep going. We'll match whatever you raise."

Paul 'drove' his motorized wheelchair in the 2-mile walk along the beautiful Chi. lakefront. He used to ride motorcycles. We were the top team, raising the second most funds in the 11 years of the walk. Paul's courage and hopeful spirit inspire all of us. It is his goal to find the cause and the cure for others who will follow him. Paul, Kris, Aubrey and Sarah are on our prayer list.



What is Safe Families?

"Safe families for Children provides a loving sanctuary where parents can safely and voluntarily place their children in times of need. Founded in 2002 by LYDIA Home Association, a Chicago based Christian social service agency, Safe Families for Children has partnered with the local church to grow to a network of over 11,000 volunteers which includes 2100 volunteer host families. This network of volunteers has been able to provide as many as 8600 hosting arrangements since the start of the program.

There are currently 54 active sites, successfully established in more than 25 states across the United States alone. This has also become a global movement with sites now in Canada and the UK. Safe Families partners with host agencies, local churches, ministries, as well as community and government agencies to intervene in the lives of children and families that would otherwise be forgotten." (quoted from their website)

How did you become interested in Safe Families?

When the 2010 Haiti earthquake hit, I [Sharon] heard that they were in need of foster families for the hundreds of orphans in Haiti. The children would be sent to the U.S. and stay with families until there was a stable

environment for them to return to, which could even take a year or so. I contacted Safe Families and registered to be one of the families. Shortly thereafter, Haiti decided it was best to find solutions locally. I have been on their list and in discussions with Safe Families since that time.

Has your involvement in Safe Families changed your life in particular ways?

Yes, it has changed the lives of my entire family. We have been able to share our love with two different toddlers at this point. My children have learned that sometimes the needs of others has to come before our own. Since we have regular contact with the children's parents and social workers, we have learned a great deal about the diverse issues and needs for people whom are significantly less fortunate than we are. We now understand that there is no simple answer to the multiple problems many of these people are experiencing. Our brief time with the children helps them to be in a safe, happy place for awhile while their parents can deal with their crises. Frequently what "homes" they go back to are not ideal. We can only pray that the parents can turn their lives around, even if it means that have to be in the programs several times to do it.

How are you currently involved in Safe Families and how do you manage to incorporate your involvement in your lives?

We are a "host family". The host families take children into their home and make them part of their families for a period of time, depending on the circumstances. Every single thing we do incorporates taking the child with us or determining how she will be cared for. The children become part of the family by eating, shopping, sleeping, driving, playing, traveling and attending church services.

This will probably be our last hosting children until the summer time. I am going to continue being involved by being a Case Coach which is facilitating communication between the host families and the birth families. I would also like St. Michael's to considering being a Safe Families church. I will work with the Outreach Committee on moving this forward. There are many ways St. Michael's can become involved in this program including, host family, donation of money, clothing or food items, babysitting, transportation or professional services.

What advice would you give someone who is interested in Safe Families with no prior experience?

Contact Safe Families. They have people very interested in talking to you to help you become involved with them. They provide training.


