African American's in Times of War



Crispus Attucks, 1723-1770

The former slave was the first casualty of the American Revolutionary War when he was killed during the Boston Massacre. In 1888 the Crispus Attucks monument was unveiled in the Boston Common.

Alexander Thomas Augusta, 1825-1890

In 1861, Augusta became the first of eight eventual African-American physicians to serve in the Civil War. Augusta faced both Confederate guns and Union prejudice, yet served as a surgeon through the end of the war and continued on as a civil rights leader later in life.

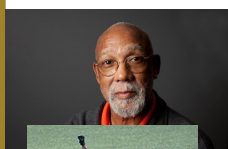


Harriet M. Waddy (nee West), 1904-1999

In 1943, First Officer Harriet West made a legendary radio broadcast on behalf of the army, imploring black women to join the military. In her address, West said that joining a segregated military "and accepting a situation which does not represent an ideal of democracy" was not "a retreat from our fight" but "our contribution to its realization." Waddy was the wartime advisor on racial issues, and one of the two highest-ranking black officers in the Women's Army Corps

Milton Lee Olive III, 1946-1965

Private First Class Olive received a posthumous Medal of Honor in 1966 for his conspicuous gallantry, intrepitude, and sacrifice in Vietnam. On Oct. 22, 1965, Milton L. Olive III, just 18 years old, smothered a grenade, saved the lives of his platoon mates, and sacrificed his life. Olive became the first black soldier to be awarded the Medal of Honor for actions during the Vietnam War .



John Carlos, 1945-

At the time of trials for the 1968 Olympic Games (Mexico), while receiving their medals, John Carlos and Tommie Smith raised their gloved fists as a silent protest of racism and economic depression among oppressed people in America. Australian Peter Norman, who also received metal, wore Olympic Project of Human Rights badge in solidarity with Carlos and Smith. In response, International Olympic Committee president Avery Brundage banned the two men for raising fist from the Olympic Village and forced them from the United States Olympic team. After their return to the United States, both men received death threats. However, they had become a significant symbol of the Civil Rights struggle.
