redeeming culture

It has been an exciting time for me transitioning from the workaday world to the world of retirement. There have been moments of culture shock: things like a lower fixed-income budget, Medicare and dental program reality checks, what to do with all the extra time, how to say yes to the "best" things and no to the "good." Having been a U.S. Navy sailor, a carpenter, a lab scientist and most recently a teacher, I am somewhat used to large cultural changes. Add to this my exposure to foreign cultures in Africa, India, Japan, China, Philippines, and Mexico as a teacher and a missionary, and I guess you could say I'm somewhat of a culture junkie. I even volunteer in the close-by subculture of Christian youth. One thing that stands out after considering all this exposure to foreign cultures near and far, is an appreciation for my own culture's strengths, weaknesses and idiosyncrasies.

My most recent opportunity for cultural growth came in the form of the class I am teaching, *You Lost Me.* Based on a book of the same name by David Kinnaman¹, it has been a profound study of who we are as SonRise church, and our part in the Christian church world-wide. David develops a cultural mirror for us in the life stories and perspectives of exiled youth, so-named because they "are still invested in their Christian faith but feel stuck (or lost) between culture and the church." The theme has resonance for me because many of the most prominent figures in the Bible are themselves exiles (Daniel, Joseph, Ruth, Esther, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, Ezra, Nehemiah, Moses, etc.). I see their modern-day counterparts in our public school system and our church youth pro-

grams. These are youth who are greatly challenged by their contemporary culture and desperately need guidance from significant adults in their life.

About the same time I discovered Kinnaman's book, I happened to come across some scripture from Jeremiah that I feel is prophetic for our time. He wrote: "But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the Lord on its behalf, for in its welfare, you will find your welfare." Jeremiah 29:7 The word exile has extra significance for me because that is the condition in which the modern church finds itself. The Christian ethic is no longer the default setting for politics, social issues, education, media, the arts and secular culture in general.

Now such a book might, on the face of it, appear to be about the youth. But as we in the class have come to find out, it's very much about all of us. You see, these exiles reflect back to us their feelings of confusion and estrangement from the church they grew up in. (We have even had rather "mature" classmates share with us that they themselves bear an image of exile because of their difficulty with some aspects of church culture) The reflections of these youthful exiles address topics such as overprotectiveness, shallowness, anti-science sentiment, (sexual) repressiveness, exclusiveness and doubtlessness in the modern church.

It is a painful study in an almost surgical sense. The heart-felt comments of these lovely young people sear the mature Christian consciousness with sadness about faith opportunities lost even before they were born. Here are some examples of their thoughts:

People will go where the love is. If love isn't in the church, then people won't be interested in the doctrine or theology of the church.

Some churches encourage their believers to separate from the outside world.

The church may not have done a very good job of teaching the youth that all truth belongs to God. Most of our churches are not set up to foster an ethic of

teaching discernment (mentoring).

Maybe going to church to get something met is the wrong approach; maybe we should be going to give something instead. Because of my deep felt need for human engagement, I want church to cost me something

If you want easy answers, then church is a good place to go for those. If you want nuance, challenge and complexity, then maybe not.

People want comfort, community and assurance. It's all about the band-aid. The band-aid makes it look better, but the wound is still festering.


God is missing from some people's experience of church. The church is disconnected from real life.

7 out of 10 Christian youth say that they have no adult in their church life other than their parents or the youth pastor whom they consider to be a friend.

Many congregations are silent on the issues of science. Some are even antagonistic toward issues of science.

The church is not a safe place to make mistakes.

Some people who get life wrong right out of the gate with some of the most intense struggles that one can go through (drug addiction, promiscuity, abortion, homosexuality) are labeled as sinful. People who need help the most get only judgment from



the church; they won't seek help from the church.

(Sexuality) is an area that the church has forsaken and this has been a disservice. It's just that nobody talks about it in a way that is real conversation. What ends up happening is that there's a lot of unhealed stuff that Christians have surrounding sexuality, and a lot of stuff not dealt with.

But there are also powerful messages of redemption in this study:

God has given us a spirit of power, love and a sound mind. We're enabled to engage the world, not be broken by it.

It's in our nature to judge others more harshly, and give ourselves the benefit of the doubt. The youth generation is beginning to realize that becoming a Christian will require something deeper.

One aspect of the beauty and mystery of the church is being able to put aside some of our preferences or expectations of being treated well and at personal cost to ourselves, learning what motivates the other person, learning their name, learning to care about that person.

Many young Christians who have not lost their faith did so because they were apprenticed into being Christ followers. They saw their parents living out their calling in the complexity of life. They grew up and had great interpersonal relationship with other adult Christians. Their church was truly a picture of intergenerational relationships.

We want young people 10 years from now to look back and say "I am a deeper, better Christian — in fact I'm still a Christian — because of that coach, that educator or that person in my church who really connected with me and was interested in what was happening in who I was becoming.

A huge opportunity that the church has in relation to science is the opportunity of generations working together. One of the greatest resources that our congregations have is older adults who have experience in careers related to science. What a natural resource to say "let's talk about the questions that the next generation has with people who are currently and already have



wrestled with many of these questions.

We need to have a better, more honest dialogue about the things that are really our own personal hangups and blind spots, and really come to trust this next generation that they're intelligent, capable, smart people in a world that now has a lot of answers.

It's a huge opportunity to see this generation coming to terms with loving their peers despite (their) coming from families or situations or experiences where there's a lot of brokenness. But it does mean we are going to have to be willing to have these more difficult conversations and be willing to be more transparent.

The church is meant to be a place where we do make mistakes. We're not excusing sexual mistakes; we think that there are consequences when we don't follow God's plan. But sometimes we simplify these things and we make them less clear.

How should we deal with our new-found status as cultural exiles? *Why* should we deal with it? Todd Hunter² quotes Peter Senge saying that throughout the last fifteen hundred years, and particularly in the last two hundred years, mainstream Christianity has been "for the majority of practitioners not a practiceoriented religion but a Sunday religion. A religion of 'do what you want as long as you subscribe to the right things and you show up on Sunday to keep the institution going." Senge develops the thought that "there is a unique hunger in the Western world for a practiced embodied religion." This is because "people are increasingly skeptical of religion that only affects the mind of its adherents (and then their supposed eternal destiny). It seems intuitively wrong to the average person today that a person can claim to believe in Jesus, maybe even believing that He died and rose again, but live badly at work, in the neighborhood and at home." 2 Hunter extends his reasoning by suggesting that the words of Jesus are subconsciously seen as mere words used in Bible studies, not to be worked into our life.

Redeeming Culture (Conclusion)

He continues by writing about believers becoming frozen in their church culture and then not engaging the larger culture of the world.

"Some (believers) are sincerely stuck by pluralism and relativism. There can be no movement until we make a choice, a commitment to following Jesus and the things He said. But this can be emotionally and mentally uncomfortable. Society is quickly moving to the notion that religion is the enemy of social progress. Believing in or discussing the uniqueness of Jesus is now, in many circles, a serious social sin!" 2 To modify a saying of Ronald Reagan's, "Christianity isn't a solution to the problem, it IS the problem." We are being left at the dock by the world's culture, but maybe that ship hasn't yet sailed.

Dick Staub has some complementary ideas that pick up from here. In his introduction to The Culturally Savvy Christian3, Staub notes that "for centuries, (some) Christians were known for their intellectual, artistic, and spiritual contributions to society. Bach, Mendelssohn, Dante, Dostoevsky, Newton, Pascal, and Rembrandt are but a few who personified the rich tradition of faith, producing the highest and best work, motivated by a desire to glorify God and offered in service of others for the enrichment of our common environment: culture." He describes these artistic giants as being "serious about the centrality of faith in their lives, savvy about both faith and culture, and skilled in relating the two. They transformed culture by fulfilling their roles as creators of culture, as communicators in culture, and, at times, as countercultural influencers who operated like aliens in a foreign land.

More recently, he includes C.S. Lewis and J.R.R. Tolkien in this cadre of cultural redeemers. Pointing to them, he says "Their generation of thoughtful creatives, whose work was built on a solid foundation of spiritual depth, intellectual rigor, and creative excellence and was therefore influential in the broader culture, was succeeded by a generation of Christians who were content to withdraw from culture, do combat with it, or worse yet, build an imitative, intellectually and aesthetically vacuous parallel culture." Do "withdrawn, combative or vacuous" describe SonRise? Is there

"We've arrived at a crossroads in faith and culture" Staub concludes. The Christian community has degenerated into an intellectually and artistically anemic subculture, and the general population is consuming an unsatisfying blend of mindless, soulless, spiritually delusional entertainment. Today's superficial spirituality is incapable of producing a deep, rich culture... (we need to) explore how a new generation of culturally savvy Christians-the

another alternative?

old kind of Christian in the mold of Lewis and Tolkien, who, today, will look like a new kind of Christian-can be the catalysts for transforming culture.

So, how exactly can we become skilled about relating our faith and culture? It's not exactly something that is inherent in our spiritual DNA. So along with others of us who are culturally sensitive members, I hope to be offering new classes over the coming year that will help us engage the culture on it's own terms. We'll be learning alongside you. We'll go deep into uncharted territory with books like *Outsiders*⁴ which looks at the church from the perspective of people from outside the Christian faith. unchristian⁵ will reveal how our common Christian behaviors are often negatively interpreted by the upcoming generation already embedded in the world culture. Books like Coffee Shop Conversations⁶ and of course, The Culturally Savvy Christian³ will guide us and give us practical tools to engage the people who Jesus misses most.

Come join us, won't you? It certainly won't be boring and it may open up a part of God's creation you never knew existed!

There's a new quilting class in town - and it's NOT for your grandmother!

t's an "Artful Quilting" class focussing on color, line and design. There will be both lecture and lab/participation time for the class directed project; that means that each student makes their own quilt based on the same core pattern. All adults (motivated 16 year-olds and up), men and women, of all skill levels are welcome. But there's a limited enrollment of 20 students (a waiting list will be maintained). Students bring their own supplies and equipment for class use (or work at home); students may audit the class (attend without making a project).

The class will meet in the chapel on campus for 6 week sessions on Tuesday nights from 6:30-8:30 pm. The first session includes Sept. 16, 23, 30, Oct. 14, 21, and 28 (no class Oct. 7). Two other sessions are planned for the fall. We're doing this for the love of God, people and fabric!



Karen Cunagin will provide instruction, inspiration and encouragement for making beautiful and useful objects. She teaches color and design in the fiber arts for the San Diego Community College District at the West City Campus in Point Loma. The themes in her art re-

volve around the intimate world of family, garden and spiritual work.

Though most of her textile compositions are machine sewn, she spends hours hand finishing many pieces with stitch, sequins, and yo-yos. There may be painting, printing and other surface design.

Her work has been shown in Visions: The Art Quilt



2006, regional juried shows and international publications. In 2010 she completed four giant fruits/cloth sculptures (each 5 feet in diameter) that are permanently exhibited in the award-winning Fallbrook Library. Karen was nominated for the teacher of the year award 2011 by The Professional Quilters magazine. She serves on the board of the Visions Art Museum in San Diego.

Presenting inspiring lectures, workshops and trunk shows, for quilt guilds, museums and festival groups, Cunagin challenges her fellow fiber artists to take little risks in making beautiful work that can lead to important life decisions.

Staff, board, helpers hit high gear after coffee shop's grand opening

Fallbrook Coffee Co. marked its formal grand opening on June 29 with an intimate gathering that was kissed by the sun, brushed by the breeze and filled with the Spirit.

Shop staff, customers and Sonrise congregation members gathered to share hugs, prayers and fellowship. They posed for pictures, cut the obligatory Chamber of Commerce red ribbon and basked in God's gift of a coffee shop to our congregation. A church elder estimated that hundreds of people participated.

Many were quick to note that the coffee shop is "located where Mission meets Fallbrook."

It can be a noisy place, but also one of silence, prayer and reflection. It is a place of the world, and also the Word. It is alive with hospitality, handshakes, hugs and hard work. It is an extension of Christ's love and our church family.

It is a place that evokes Jesus' words in Matthew 18:20: "...
For where two or three are gathered in My name, I am there in the midst of them."

The unfolding work surrounding the place continued at the July 23 meeting of the coffee shop board, which consists of Andrew Ice, Roy Callahan, Tom Dumont, Jeff Graflund and Greg Coppock, SonRise associate pastor.

"July is shaping up pretty good," reported Ice who, since the shop's acquisition about four months ago, has served as its interim general manager. He is slated to share his thoughts on this close-to-home mission experience during the Aug. 3 traditional and contemporary services.

And later that month, he said, financial data from the shop's first quarter of operations will be presented to church leaders. Board members said the data will give church leaders a clear picture of coffee shop operations as well as assist in future planning and business projections.

Meanwhile, business is brisk and confidence is brimming. Some record-setting days have been logged, and the recent temporary, construction-related closures of the Fallbrook's Denny's and McDonald's restaurants have sent an influx of new customers our way.

The coffee shop board worked its way through some ongoing and unfolding issues before its members slipped into a moment of reflection. "I really enjoy watching this place develop," Callahan mused. "It's two big thumbs up for the coffee shop and we're still growing."

The others responded with an instant 'amen.' "It's all pretty cool," Coppock concluded.

Kairos Prison Ministry

Our Vision

A community spiritually freed from the effects of imprisonment reaching all impacted by incarceration, through the love, hope, and faith found in Jesus Christ.

Our Mission

The mission of Kairos Prison Ministy is to share the transforming love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ to impact the hearts and lives of incarcerated men, women, and youth, as well as their families, to become loving and productive citizens of their communities.

M Kairos Inside weekend is an tintroductory 3-day weekend, described as a short course in Christianity. This weekend program is modeled after the Cursillo method and is based on a series of talks by laymen and clergy. Interspersed throughout the weekend is music, prayer, activities, a chance to form relationships and demonstrate Christ's love. Kairos of San Diego currently supports programs in two yards: Yard A (level 3) and Yard C (level 4). All attendees for the Kairos Inside weekends are nominated by previous graduates of the Kairos Program. Normally there are over 100 nominations for the 36 available open spots for the weekend in each Yard. The Kairos Inside Leadership team, with input from the Yard Pastor, will decide which 36 inmates plus several alternates will be chosen to attend. Because of the success of the Kairos *Inside* program, there is never a shortage of people that desire to attend.



As the following letter demonstrates, a very important aspect of the Kairos Prison Ministry involves providing encouragement letters (or notes) for the inmates. Kairos has the option to "gift" each man over 120 handwritten personal notes/ letters from outside Christian participants during the 4 day Kairos weekend. This literally blows their minds and often breaks down their walls of resistance. We have heard numerous testimonials that receiving these letters brought them to commit their lives to God and to live their lives like Jesus. We are offering all of you the opportunity to reach inside the prison and into the hearts of these inmates by writing notes/letters to them.

We must obey the Kairos/Prison rules. The rules are:

All forty (40) letters must be handwritten with the same content.

Letters can contain no personal data that is traceable back to you. Please sign your first name only. Letters should include encouragement and the joy of Jesus' love. Bible quotes and/or citations are encouraged. FYI: the men receive a personal Bible at the same time they get the letters.

Letters should be placed in unsealed individual envelopes.

The 40 envelopes should be placed in a clear plastic Ziploc bag with a copy of the letter showing.

All letters are a true blessing. Let your love of Jesus burst out from your letters. Please pray about how you can be a blessing to these men in prison. Once inside the prison, the notes/letters are screened and sealed before they are given to the en.

In so doing, we can all hear our Lord saying, "Truly I say unto you, whatever you did for the least of these My brethren, you did it unto Me."

Here is an example of a letter written by Art Deming:

"My brother in Christ, I'm so very proud that you made the decision to learn more about Jesus during the Kairos weekend. As you share the cookies with others, may they see your love of Jesus in all you say and do. Please know that I'm praying for you as you share God's love in Yard "C".

Testimonial letter from an inmate...

Greetings to you in the glorious name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. I am a servant of Christ, even though I am doing life in prison. It is my joy to share with you a brief part of my testimony when the Lord opened my eyes to the truth.

I was on the verge of committing suicide by killing as many correctional officers as I could before being taken out. The darkness that had invaded my mind, heart, and soul was so powerful that I was convinced that death was my only refuge. I was so deeply tormented by guilt, shame, and loneliness that I believed that there was no hope and I just wanted it all to end.

Until the day when a very odd but happy encounter occurred. Unknown to me someone had put my name in for Kairos and I was selected. The Kairos weekend just happened to be a few days before I would go on my rampage. I decided it could wait until after Kairos.

On the first day of Kairos I remember telling all of the volunteers, "All I want are your cookies, not your religion." For the first three days I listened to all of the talks from the outside team. I tried to be patient and kind as they demonstrated God's love in action, not just words.

On the third day of Kairos I was given a gift of unimaginable worth. It wasn't money, or food but it was what I needed more than anything. It went much deeper that the physical, it went right to the heart. I was given a bag of letters. Letters of encouragement and grace, from complete strangers. Each letter was full of love and prayers, for ME! I couldn't believe it. To be honest, I was so overwhelmed with emotion that after reading the first three I had to go to the restroom to cry. I received over 120 letters that day. As I continued to read them God's love began to break through the darkness of my heart. The light of His love was almost too much to bear. His glorious light illuminated my dark murderous heart.

The next morning around 2:30 am, I couldn't sleep so I read some more letters and ate some more cookies. I stopped and cried out to God, "If you are real, show me a miracle." It was then when God spoke to my heart. He said, "son, you are reading your miracle." It was true since my mom died three years ago, I have not received one single letter. My mom was the only person who ever wrote me.

I cried out to the Lord early that morning while in my cell and He saved me. But I want you to think about this, where would I be today if you hadn't taken the time to write those letters or bake those cookies? It's been almost two years since I've given my life to Christ. I have never been so happy and content. Even though I am doing a life sentence I have seen God use me in theis place to bring others to the saving knowledge of

Christ. I no longer want to die, I want to live and I want to serve Jesus with my whole heart.

Thank you, volunteers who come into this place regularly to bring the hope of God's love to us. You remind us that there are brothers and sisters in Christ who care about us. You bring the love that most of us never knew. God bless you.

Pre-existent Intentionality

O often the day gets away from us. I don't know what exactly happens between the strokes of the second hand on our clocks, but whatever it is it has the ability to take all that we have planned or hoped to accomplish and simply disintegrate it leaving us looking back on our time wishing we would have done things differently. I can't tell you how many times I've woken up in the morning and thought to myself, "I have so much I need to do today." I also can't tell you how many times I've laid myself down to go to sleep and thought, "I hardly made a dent in that to-do list."

Intentionality is somewhat of a pop-culture word today that I see strewn throughout the words and wisdom of pastors and effective people. It's a word that I use often when I teach the youth about how to grow in their faith in Christ. Maybe it's a symptom of the current generations, but there is this seemingly constant feeling that life will just come to us. That we are like fields of grain blowing to and fro in the winds of life. Incapable of accomplishing anymore or any less than life presents to us. Intentionality is an old concept that has been reinvented to combat this socially acceptable brand of laziness. So why is it so difficult to apply to our lives and our daily regimens?

Intentionality says, "I am going to make it a point to go shopping today so that my wife doesn't have to. She already does so much, and I would like to bless her in this way." American mentality says, "I am hungry, someone better go shopping. I really don't have the time today to do so, so my wife better." In my quest to be more intentional about my life, I have realized that intentionality is more than just a spiritual strength that we long for. It is the very same lens that Jesus viewed life through. Another word you could use here is "purpose."

What constantly blows my mind about scripture is the intentionality God had every moment. There is not a millisecond that goes by that God cannot ascribe purpose to. Isn't that amazing? Think about your own life. Your highest highs, or your lowest lows. Maybe in the moment you didn't feel or see any purpose or intentionality there, but through an eternal perspective can't you now see that God has always been at work? Bringing everything in your life, every little drop, into something good and righteous? Now imagine this: What if we could go throughout our days with that same sort of perspective? What if going to the store wasn't just to get food, but to serve our spouses? Or to meet someone new and invite them over for dinner? Or to simply observe people who God is passionately in love

with, and pray for them as you move throughout the aisles?

I want to share a quick story that really penetrated my heart utilizing something we take for granted every day. Words. And what happened when people use their words with an intent to lift up.

At the end of our camps we often spend time encouraging each other. It is a good thing to do to celebrate everyone who was there. When you spend a week with a group of Jr. High or High Schoolers you really become like family. And when love is abundant and pure, it often desires to pour out adoration through encouragement. In my mind I am always aware that what we do, as silly or often as we do it, has life-changing impact. Although I am aware of this, I sometimes have a tough time believing it in the moment. When the time came for one of our younger female volunteers to take a seat on the "hot seat," the hands started going up (as they do for everyone) of peers who had something they wanted to say about the person.

Now most of the time the encouragement is generic; "You're, like, really nice." "I like totally love your dress." And the timeless classic, "You're cool." You know, words and phrases we think don't make much of a difference when they're uttered?

So this young woman sits in the hot seat, and I start selecting the individuals one at a time to speak to her. "You are, like, so sweet and caring." "You were so much fun to be around." "I really loved getting to know you."

Something happened in that moment that I knew I would never forget. These fairly standard compliments were being spoken to her. And almost immediately, the young woman found it hard to allow her face to be seen. She placed her face halfway into her right hand. As another encouragement started, she brought her other hand to her face almost covering the whole thing. At some point the words became too strong for her will to keep out of her heart, and she buried her face in her arms and sobbed deeply in front of the whole group of people. And I knew exactly what was happening.

One of the sins I feel we all as Christians who fellowship together fail to really combat is the sin of forgetfulness. We forget that when we come together to church on Sunday, or bible study on Wednesday, or whenever you fellowship, that almost all of us come with extremely heavy burdens. We lose the purpose in our interactions with each other. But in this story about the young woman on the hot seat, the purpose was there for all to see.

In her life, at that moment, she didn't feel sweet. She didn't feel caring. She didn't feel fun. And she didn't really feel like she was the kind of person people wanted to be around. What goes on when these students leave our facilities is often times tragic and heart-breaking, and now a group of about 30 mixed staff and jr. high students were speaking a familiar yet foreign language into the soul of this girl, and the results were eternal.

As she sobbed deeply a silence fell over the room. Everyone could see what was happening. But it wasn't a pity or sadness that someone who was so clearly loved finally, actually felt for the first time in a while. Instead, it was like a Holy reverence as we sat together in the presence of our intentional God who was unlocking the mysteries of her heart and using our tongues as platforms to penetrate her being. I simply asked her one question in that moment. "It feels good to hear something good for a change, doesn't it?" To which she could only nod with her face in her hands.

How many people do you come into contact with on a daily basis who are feeling similar feelings? Unloved, broken, shattered, not good enough, empty, rejected, like a failure? I think some of you are reading this now thinking, "That's me!" For as of-

ten as we talk and communicate, why do we spend more time nagging and criticizing than we do lifting up and encouraging? Why don't we seize the time we have to think about and mourn for what people in our lives are carrying throughout their weeks?

To be honest readers, I can't tell you how many times I've been carrying a heavy and impossible burden when I've entered into the presence of 'Christians' and immediately been met with a discouraging critique or challenging word of divisiveness. And I can't even imagine how many times someone has been in my presence with a similar burden and I've instead given them more difficulty than soul care. My challenge to you who have made it through this article is this: Don't try to be more intentional. Instead, realize that everything is already intentional. It's our task to seek God's purpose in everything. And maybe, just maybe, we lay ourselves down to sleep at night and our last thought will be, "Thank you God, for what you allowed me to do today."

I've seen the Lord doing some amazing things in the lives of teenagers this year. I know it's because of the work of God and the result of prayer.

Call me crazy, but I believe this generation of students will have an amazing impact on our world and will pursue God with a greater zeal and passion than the generations before them. I invest more time now in prayer for young people than I ever have.

Recently, I felt the Lord urging me to return home to visit my aging mother, so I went. A couple of days driving, some time spent with family, a few tears shed – a fairly normal American experience. For missionaries Sarah and Jay, being directed by the Lord to return to her childhood home in Africa has been another experience entirely. Eighteen years ago, the country where she grew up, became a believer, and finished school was unraveling, so her parents urged their children to leave, while they remained behind, financial prisoners, until they passed away.

Sarah writes, "Watching the tragic demise of (her home country) I'd never dreamt I'd return...I had no desire to witness the collapse of a country I'd loved as a child. Jay made numerous ministry trips there, birthing a desire in him to live

(there), to deepen existing relationships, and further his ministry despite the problems and challenges. I prayed earnestly, not wanting my reluctance to be an obstacle."

She continues, "First I had to deal with the grief of my personal loss regarding (this country). Then I experienced a season of deep mourning... About a year ago, after a time of deep brokenness, I found myself embracing Jay's desire to move (there). It seemed impossible, given the country's political and economic condition. However, this last year has proven that God is so much greater than any earthly power, so that by early April every obstacle had been removed save one - a house!"

While the exodus of people from this country over the

last 15 years has left many vacant homes, there has been little to no maintenance and many are in poor condition, with basic services unreliable at best. As Sarah says, "Once again we trust the Lord for his provision."

Jay and Sarah ask for continued prayer and support as they and their teenage son make this transition in their lives for the Lord's service. Sarah concludes, "Flexibility and patience will be a big part of our lives there, but we've said our goodbyes and we're ready to embrace this next chapter."
