(150 YEARS IN MISSION)

On March 23, 1869, in Boston, Massachusetts, Clementine Butler and Lois Parker informed six women members of the Methodist Episcopal Church about the desperate health care and educational needs of women in India. Their Call to Action raised funds to send Isabella Thoburn, a teacher, and Clara Swain, a doctor to India. The meeting in March led to the formation of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, the first of many Methodist women's mission organizations to address the injustices imposed on women and girls in the 19th century. United Methodist Women is their successor, and we celebrate 150 years of changing the lives of women, children, and youth.

From the beginning, United Methodist Women members have led the way in countless endeavors. Our membership is comprised of women from all backgrounds and experiences, compelled by their Christian faith to serve and lead in places near and far. These areas include tutoring children and youth in after-school programs, volunteering at community food pantries, visiting the infirmed in hospitals, advocating against legislation and policies that marginalize women and children, and supporting the 100 National Mission Institutions in the United States and the 107 international organizations in 110 countries that provide a pathway to healthy, productive and empowered living.

From United Methodist Women living out their faith in Liberia to girls dreaming of college education in China; from women farmers feeding their families in Haiti to women and children receiving treatment for Tuberculosis at a missionary hospital in the Philippines; from crisis intervention for migrant domestic workers in Hong Kong to unlocking financial opportunities for rural communities in Mozambigue; our membership and contributions to United Methodist Women impacts more lives than can be counted.

St. Andrew UMC has 4 active UMW Circles each which support missions such as: Redbird Mission, Feed the Creek, Greene County Family Violence Prevention Center, Wesley Community Center, and many more local organizations.

Little did we know when we planned for the first garden season in 2014 that after 5 growing seasons we would have grown and delivered over 1600 lbs. of vegetables (plus the 14 trunk loads from the first season before we weighed our produce), involved the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts and over 65 church and community members in service to others, and sponsored a Growing Gardeners program for the children from the St. Paul neighborhood. Main plans submitted to General Conference of the UMC Feb.23-26 2019 in St. Louis

The most prominent plans submitted for consideration at the special conference are:

The One Church Plan would shift to churches and conferences decisions regarding ministry with or by LGBTQ persons rather than maintaining a single standard that operates throughout the worldwide church. It would also remove some of the language in the Book of Discipline that limit LGBTQ people's involvement as United Methodists.

The Connectional Conference Plan would create three connectional conferences based on perspective on LGBTQ issues. The three connectional conferences would function throughout the worldwide church and the five existing U.S. jurisdictions would be abolished.

The Simple Plan would remove all language from the Book of Discipline that excludes LGBTQ people from full participation in the church.

The Traditional Plan would affirm the current language about homosexuality in the Book of Discipline and seek to strengthen enforcement for violations.

<u>The Modified Traditional Plan</u> would add to the Traditional Plan a committee with authority to hold bishops accountable to the sexuality standards in the Book of Discipline. It would offer a \$200,000 grant to annual conferences that want to leave the denomination because of disagreement over LGBTQ issues.

2018 Financial Summary


We celebrate that SAUMC is debt free for the first time in our recent history. The payoff of the building loan was done with contributions from the capital campaigns of recent years. In addition the fulfillment of paying those pledges have allowed us to begin building up a reserve fund for future building and mechanical repairs. At December 31, 2018 we had \$10,096 in that fund. If you made a commitment to the Building fund we want to encourage you to continue giving as there are several projects that need to be made to repair our building.

We ended the year with total receipts of \$319,311 (pledged giving and loose offerings) and total expenses of \$319, 193 with a balance of \$118. We are grateful that God provided for what we needed. We had major savings in professional staff costs (\$12,141) developed because of vacancies, our new Pastor and changing job definitions. Despite one time increases in parsonage expenses, lower energy costs and lower insurance costs were significant contributors to our expense savings. All apportionment and mission commitments were fully paid by year end.

All this is great news, however the Finance team have made some observations in our pledged giving and want you to be aware and prayerful about our giving for the coming year.
