

Go Guatemala 2018!

This next year looks like an exciting one as Faith Community Church is planning a mission trip to Guatemala in 2018. There is a lot of interest in our church and a strong desire to serve. Praise God!

I was truly blessed to have been able to participate in a youth group mission trip to Guatemala in summer of 2011 through Faith Community Church, and later experience the country's culture for four months through a study abroad semester. Because of that, I have not only read about the daily struggles that Guatemalan people face, but also witnessed them firsthand.

Guatemala is located in Central America, just below Mexico. It borders Mexico, El Salvador, Honduras, and Belize. The country is full of mountainous regions, coastlines, jungles, volcanoes, and beautiful landscapes and tourist destinations. Guatemala has a very rich culture-- primarily due to its Mayan history. The Mayan people were thought to have been in Guatemala as early as 2000 B.C. Although the Maya mysteriously disappeared, much of the Guatemalan population today are indigenous descendants of the Mayan people. Guatemala is primarily either Catholic or Evangelical Christian, but there are still many ancient Mayan beliefs, sometimes mixed in, especially among the older generations. There can be a great deal of tension between the Catholics and Protestants, and this is important to keep in mind when doing mission work. The primary language is Spanish, but there are over 20 Mayan dialects still spoken among indigenous populations. Food is primarily rice, black beans, and corn tortillas. Guatemalans are generally very generous, hardworking, hospitable, and friendly. Overall, Guatemala is often remembered for its bright traditional clothing, textile work, landscapes, Mayan history and food.

Although Guatemala is an undeniably beautiful country, it is very much in need. It's important that the need is not sugar-coated. As a nation, Guatemala faces extreme poverty, poverty, malnutrition, political corruption, gang violence, domestic violence, a lack of infrastructure-- especially in regards to healthcare availability and education--and the list goes on.

Guatemala has faced a 36-year internal civil war between 1960-1996 leaving as many as 200,000 dead or missing. The country is still trying to recover from such a hard period of time. Not only did the war leave the country in greater poverty and shambles, but there is still a great deal of emotional pain that is relatively fresh when considering the war only ended 20 years ago and many loved ones were lost.

Guatemala's poverty rates are alarming. While not every Guatemalan is living in poverty, a statistic from 2014 shows 59.3% (9.37 million people) are living in poverty, and 23.4 percent (3.69 million people) are living in extreme poverty (thedawnnews.org). Extreme poverty is when one has trouble meeting basic human needs-- like food or water. There is also a great deal of economic inequality. A few families own close to 90% of the country's wealth. A majority of individuals living in poverty belong to the indigenous populations who have historically been treated unfairly.

It is evident that Guatemala is in need. However, God is doing tremendous work in Guatemala through missionaries, mission teams, and programs throughout the country. In many areas, conditions are improving little by little. Praise God for the work that is being done! It's so exciting that we can be part of the world being done to help and care for the poor right now through Faith Community Church.

Short-term mission trips are only a week-long; however, they can still have a great impact on both those we will serve and ourselves, as servants. It's eye-opening in many ways. It's important to see another culture to get a better perspective of the world God has created. In Guatemala, there are often opportunities to pray and worship with our brothers and sisters from a different part of the world in different languages. It's such a powerful experience!

We are also made aware of the need in the world. We can learn so much about the Lord by going out of our comfort zones to do His work! God doesn't call us to a life of comfort. He often does tremendous things in our lives when we go out of our way to do His work! In my personal experiences on mission trips in Guatemala specifically, I have experienced God's peace (Philippians 4:6), been shown God's power to conquer fears and anxieties, and learned that God can use us regardless of how unskilled we may feel we are. God teaches us each something different. A trip to Guatemala was entirely life-changing for me.

We are currently setting dates and working through details. There are many options for locations in the country and list of various ways we can serve depending on the group's strengths and interests.


Believe this for yourself? Does this give you any sense of just how precious you are in the Father's eyes? 
Birth Announcement


Make this craft to display a bit of springtime year-round!

What you need:

- An old shirt
- Tempura paint (brown, dark pink, light pink and white)
- Paintbrush
- Light blue or white construction paper
- A paper plate
- Q-tips
- Paper towels

What you do:

- 1. Roll up one sleeve and paint your arm and the palm of your hand brown.
- 2. Lengthwise on the paper, carefully place your painted arm and hand, with fingers spread apart. (This is the tree trunk and branches.)
- 3. Place the other paint colors on the plate.
- 4. Using Q-tips, place dots of paint (blossoms!) all over the branches.
- 5. When dry, display your tree or give it as a Mother's Day gift.

Appreciation

Those who volunteer at the local prison were recently honored with a Volunteer Appreciation Day. There were a number of speeches given by staff and inmates regarding the positive impact of volunteers in the institution. There were hand-made items prepared by the inmates for each volunteer to take home as well. The incarcerated men gave us hearty handshakes, friendly greetings, and even tears of gratitude as they walked through the reception line.

Some statistics were given for 2016 in one of the speeches from the staff. She quoted that inmates attended meetings with volunteers more than 16,000 times during the course of the year. Those meetings included many kinds of activities that could not have happened without a volunteer present. Volunteers can be an essential part of helping to prepare offenders to become valuable contributors to the communities in which they will live when they are released.

Comments that inmates made in their speeches include the following:

- I am so thankful for the love you all have shown me. I was a stranger, and you opened your hearts and showed me the love of Christ.
- You have opened your hearts to us, sacrificed your time, and you look upon us simply as people who are paying for their past mistakes...you have given us hope.
- ...in my short time here...I've grown tremendously and have learned that it's not all about me.
- On the days that I find myself reading from the old script that said I was a loser, a reject, dysfunctional, and hopeless, you all have helped me write a new script...I am who I am because you are who you are. Thank you!
- We see His light shining through you brighter than any star in the sky on the darkest of nights...I am grateful and appreciative beyond words.
- Your thoughtfulness and selflessness has been a guiding light. It shows that people can and do love in spite of the harm we cause. You teach us that problems and struggles can't be solved (by) being selfish.
- The next time someone asks, "Where are you going?" you simply say, "I just came from the bank of LOVE, and I thank God that I get to go inside a prison to invest it in guys' lives that need a healthy dose of love deposited within."

Some Moms are Green

Chickens aren't the brightest creatures in the animal world, but the mother hen knows to protect her eggs and keep them warm. Many species of snakes also care for their young. Amazingly, scientists have learnt that even some plants have been designed with "motherly" instincts.

The plantain is a common North American weed, and when it blooms, the warmer it keeps its developing seeds, the more seeds its offspring will produce. Researchers have found that cooler air temperatures cause the mother plant to produce a darker bloom cluster. The darker color absorbs more radiant energy from the sun, and this gives its offspring a boost in life even before they sprout. The shooter plant, as it is commonly called in America's southeast, does something similar. It blooms for several months over the southern summer. The leaf-like bracts that sheathe each flower-cluster have a brown pigment. Researchers observed the plants over several months and found that the bracts that formed in cooler April were darker than the bracts that formed in warmer June. The increased levels of brown pigment in April enabled the bracts to absorb more near-infrared light that helps to warm the flowers.

Just where did those plants learn the necessary physics, not to mention the genetics, to produce these motherly provisions? Of course, the answer is God's Intelligent Design from the very start.


Food for Thought
