Pastor's Message

Our Sunday morning Bible Study just finished studying the Liturgy. We took a deep look at what we do and say on Sunday morning, its significance, and its Scriptural foundation.

A main problem we have among some pastors and congregations in American Christianity is not knowing how liturgy works. Many churches treat liturgy like a paint brush. It's an instrument used to give expression. It matters not how many styles of brushes there are, but only that what is conceived within the mind and heart is able to be birthed into a reality upon the canvas. In other words, the liturgy of contemporary worship is like a paint brush in the hand of a pastor who uses it to express his (or her) artistic creativity from week to week.

A better way to understand liturgy is to think of it as a seed. We just finished planting season around here, and what are farmers doing now? Seeds need to be planted, nourished, and left undisturbed. You cannot dig it up every week. Otherwise, it will never be able to do what it is meant to do, that is, germinate and sprout.

The liturgy is meant to be planted within our hearts and given time to do its work. Unceasing change to the liturgy that happens in the likes of contemporary worship prohibits this from happening. While some may think that creative contemporary worship is life, it is death to the liturgy and uproots the spiritual life that it tries to implant in the hearts and minds of Christians.

Liturgy needs a stable text. Stability permits frequent repetition which allows the text to become part of the spiritual life of those participating in it. One pastor who does contemporary worship once said, "I wish there was a way that we could say parts of the Bible and people would just respond and say it along with us." Stable, traditional liturgy does exactly that. Rather than focusing upon what needs to be said next, the liturgy is already present in the mind and on the lips, allowing the Holy Spirit to draw one into the present gathering of the Church around Christ's Word and Sacraments.

There is a variety to our traditional worship. We follow the Christ's birth, life, death, and resurrection throughout the Church year, and the Propers of the day give us new prayers and readings which cycle every three years. However, there is always a great focus on the Word and Sacraments, we never miss proclaiming the Gospel, and we do not have change just for the sake of creativity.

Think of it like this: the state of American Christianity is like what Dante saw upon entering Hell. He recounts, "And I, beholding, saw a banner fly, whirling about racing with such speed that it seemed that it would scorn to stand, or pause, and all behind that flag in a long file so numerous a host of people ran." (Inferno 3.52-55). Pastors and congregations are driven to run after the banner of fads that whirls ahead promising growth and prosperity to any who catch it.

Midweek School Year Review

Midweek/Confirmation Classes: Midweek K-6 and Confirmation 7-8 meets Wednesday night. K-6 class time is from 5-6 pm. Pastor leads the older kids, and Laura Beyer and Lindsay Varns lead the younger kids. K-6 classes studied the Old Testament Bible stories and the older class began memorization of the Catechism. There are 4 in the older class and 8 in the younger class. Confirmation class time is from 7-8 pm, led by Pastor Varns. Each student works on the module they are currently on with their parents. This year there were 3 students, with one of those participating in the Rite of Confirmation at the end of the year. Parents are required to participate in the material with their children and during class, pastor is present to facilitate this and answer any questions. Unfortunately, there has been some contention with Confirmation as parents are struggling with participating in classes with their children. Pastor requires their participation because God has made them the primary educators of the faith to their children. Luther writes in his Small Catechism, "As the head of the family should teach it in a simple way to his household." Studies also show that parental involvement is the primary factor for whether or not a child will retain the faith as an adult. Since this congregation has a void of frequent church attendance by young adults, the requirement of parental participation is solely for the building up of the faith of the congregation and its families. In other words, as many wonder if the next generation will have faith to keep the church open, parental engagement is the greatest way to bolster the chances of their children having faith into their adult years.
