Pastor's Message:

"A GLIMPSE OF OUR FUTURE HOLY CITY"

Revelation 21:10-14, 22-23

In this my last article to your newsletter, I want to share with you a sermon I had written on one of my favorite books of the Bible. That is the book of Revelation. It gives me such great joy and hope for the future, and I pray it does for you as well.

For thousands of years, people have wondered what heaven is really like. A poet helps us with these words: "Think of stepping on shore, and finding it heaven; Think of taking hold of a hand, and finding it God's hand; Think of breathing new air, and finding it celestial air; Think of feeling invigorated, and finding it immortality; Think of waking up, and finding it home!" Human language cannot describe that which is indescribable. Through this special revelation to John, Jesus allows us to look into the future and see the heavenly home awaiting all who are His faithful followers. John had received several visions of the Holy City, but here, this vision focuses on the "doxa" in Greek, the "shekinah" in Hebrew, that is the glory of God in the new heaven and earth. We can't envision the reality of what heaven is like, but God graciously gives us a symbolic picture to help us appreciate it and long for it. We don't press the symbolism, but we learn from the general impression. And so, we stand beside John on a high mountain and catch "A Glimpse Of Our Future Holy City."

To live forever in this heavenly city means to live in the very presence of God Himself. John describes the city as "having the glory of God, and its brilliance was like that of a very precious jewel, like a jasper, clear as crystal." Jasper is a rare and precious jewel, and to my knowledge, it might not even exist anymore here on earth. But the brilliance of jasper gives us an impression of majesty, and purity, and absolute truth. In this world, the sun and the moon are needed to sustain life. We can't exist without them. That's why environmentalists are so concerned about the pollution of our atmosphere, because pollution might one day block out the sun's energy. In the new heaven, there will be no sun or moon, because God will be with us visibly, providing the life-giving light we need. There will be no day or night in heaven, no periods of darkness, no places where the light of God's presence will not reach. Light is also symbolic of perceiving and understanding. Living in the light of God's presence will enable us to learn the answers to all of those mysteries which God has kept hidden from us.

John tells us that our new Holy City will have God's glory. We are reminded here of the "shekinah" of God in the pillars of cloud and fire that led Israel in the wilderness. It symbolized God's presence. Throughout the Bible, we find events when God allowed His glory to be seen by mankind — the burning bush, the Temple and the Tabernacle, the Transfiguration. Moses saw God's glory. Ezekiel did too. Peter, James, and John saw it. Paul saw it. Even Stephen saw the "shekinah" of God. In eternal life, God's glory is the sum of all of His attributes. As citizens of heaven now by faith in Jesus, God's power, His creative ability, His flawless wisdom and knowledge are all directly and immediately available to us. As we struggle day in and day out with such limited resources in life, we are awed by the possibility of having divine resources directly suitable for any situation.

(Covers period from Dec 10 to present.)

- 1, Meeting was called to order by Chairman DuWayne Galow. 35 members registered.
- 2. Opening prayer led by Pastor Polege.
- 3. Minutes from December's meeting was reviewed with no corrections/additions and the motion was made to approve by Jim W, 2nd by Merlin B. Motion passed.
- 4. Financial Report for February and Dec- Feb Designated Projects were reviewed. Note in Designated Projects the West Entrance and the 125th Anniversary funds are moved to the general fund, closing those accounts. The Vernon Rigge memorial of \$60 has been moved to the general fund per Jim Rigge. Thrivent Choice Dollars are coming in and a reminder that they need to be acted on by the end of March. Also note that minimum IRA's for those over age 70 can be donated to the church, saving taxes on both ends. It was reported that a \$300 donation was received this week from the Building Bridges Choir. Motion to approve both reports by Nancy C, 2nd by Jim W. Motion passed.
- 5. Pastoral Report: Pastor Polege shared his commitment to the church as vacancy pastor for as long as he can with Bible classes and confirmation classes, as well. He has been visiting our home bound usually on Mondays and tries to visit once a month.

Our life in the Holy City will be in exclusive company. The text tells us that this city is surrounded by a great wall. "It had a great high wall with twelve gates. . ." Walls are constructed to divide. They leave some inside and some outside. Having seen a heavenly city with walls, John is telling us that there are some who will not enjoy living in eternal bliss. They are those who refuse and reject God's gift of faith in Jesus. They are those who have no time for God or His Church during their earthly lives. They are those who will be condemned to eternal darkness and damnation. In Biblical times, cities were constructed with walls to keep invaders out. And so, the walls of the Holy City will keep those who Jesus said will be "thrown into outer darkness where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth." But to be brought to faith in Jesus in this life is like being brought from darkness into God's marvelous light.

In the Holy City, we are told that angels are assigned to guard the twelve gates in the great wall. They check the credentials of those desiring to enter. Some people deny the existence of this place beyond space and time. They can't see it, so it doesn't exist. Others believe that all people will live in heaven, because God is all good and merciful. He could never condemn anyone to eternal torment in hell. Others strive with their pious and self-righteous lives to save up enough merits for admission. For them, the price is too high. But then again for others, the price has been paid for by Jesus. Our admission to the Holy City cost the life of the Son of God. Those in the vision standing before the throne are those who have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb.

Even though our new life in the Holy City will be in exclusive company, it is not too late for others to be included. The opportunity for eternal life is open to everyone – to family members or friends who now see no relevance for Christ in their lives, to those who have drifted away from Jesus, to those in our communities who couldn't care less about any kind of relationship with God. The opportunity is still available to them while there is still time. How does one provide any real comfort to the survivors of a deceased person, who had no use for God in His life? On death's bed, it is too late. One can approach the Holy City from any direction. No one is excluded because of race, age, social status, or any other human criteria. In heaven, there is no skin color, no age, no social classes, no human sources of envy and jealousy. The names of God's chosen people are inscribed on the gates. God knows we are coming even before we get there. Our names have already been written in the Book of Life the day we were baptized.

The divine revelation conveyed to us through the apostles is the foundation of our future Holy City. There were twelve foundations, each with the name of an apostle of Christ. The way into this place is not hard to find. In fact, the way is found in the Bible. God has given us His Word by direct inspiration. We find in this holiest of books the true Gospel, the living Gospel, the very power of God for the salvation of everyone who believes. Do you really believe that God's power to save is found in the Bible? If you do, then the apostolic Word is your Word of life, your access to repentance, your means to faith and forgiveness, your ticket to eternal splendors.

Catching a glimpse of our new home should be motivating us every day to build our faith in the foundation of the apostles and the Lord Jesus. With Jesus reaching out and holding on to us through His Word, we won't be left out in the darkness of our sin, remembering what we had been offered in this life and what we had rejected. The Bible is the Book of Life, the means through which Jesus guarantees our entrance into the Holy City. We must not hide it away in our closets, stick it away among other books on a bookshelf, leave it out on a coffee table so that others can see it. We must not ignore its relevance for our lives today and its relevance for our lives tomorrow. We must open its covers often. We must wear out its pages. We must grow in its knowledge. We must let it become a part of us, a part of our lives. When we are united with His Word, we are united with Jesus. Through it, we receive strength against temptations. We receive saving faith in our forgiveness. Through it, we receive comfort and hope for the future awaiting us. AMEN.

Honoring our Veterans

On May 26th we will celebrate Memorial Day to honor our veterans. How many of us have seen this cross in the courtyard and ever looked at the engraving on the bottom of the cross. It says: "In Loving Memory of Gene Krongard 1933-1951." This cross was first displayed at the old church and then moved to our current church after it was built. A loving memorial from his family.

This young man who at the age of 17 passed away in the Korean War. Gene Kent Krongard was a Seaman Apprentice who served during the Korean War. Born on December 10, 1933 in Yellow Medicine County, he tragically lost his life on May 13, 1951. Krongard was aboard the USS Lofberg in Yokosuka, Japan, touring the ship with his fellow shipmate Irvin McDaniel when a tragic

accident occurred. The ship's Hedgehogs fired, resulting in the deaths of both Krongard and McDaniel on Mother's Day in 1951. He is buried at St. Paul Cemetery. Krongard's sacrifice is remembered, and his name lives on as part of the history of the Korean War.
