

Moment's Reflection

"Go stand on the mountain before the Lord, for the Lord is about to pass by." -1 Kings 19:11

I've been reading Mary Pipher's memoir, *Seeking Peace*. Like most adult children, Pipher recounts the ways her parents failed. Yet towards the end, Pipher begins to look at her life story critically and ask: "Given what's happened to me in my life journey, what do I need to do to heal?" This is where her reflections offer the broadest application.



Pipher acknowledges that she's spent the greatest portion of her childhood and adult life trying to control life--spent inordinate time ruminating and rehearsing. She "over-functioned" as mental health experts might say. And for most of her life, this approach worked. Until it didn't. Largely because of the success of her publishing career and the incessant demands of promotion, Pipher experiences what she calls a "meltdown."


How she heals from that period of meltdown touches on spiritual wisdom. Pipher heals from this broken place by practicing mindfulness—a discipline of being in the moment, practicing something as simple as attending to the rhythm of her own breathing. Pipher writes: "At first, meditation made me conscious of how infrequently I inhabited the present moment. I was mostly lost in my usual obsessions and ruminations. While I was hoping for a better moment, I missed the one I was in. I once read a bumper sticker that proclaimed: 'Having a Good Time. Wish I Were Here.' That could have been coined for me."

Elijah lived in the toxic clutter of such preoccupation, too. Caught up in the frenzied movement of his vocation, Elijah had his own "meltdown." Then God begins to heal him. Elijah is instructed to come out of his hiding place, stand on the mountain and attend carefully for signs of God's coming. At first Elijah hears a great wind. But that's not God. Then Elijah feels the rumble of an earthquake. But God isn't in the rumble of the earth. Then, the heat of a raging fire. But God isn't there, either. Finally, there's a moment of sheer silence. This is the sign of God's presence.

Look at the picture in this week's article. It's not the people in the picture that fascinate me. It's the person behind the camera. Renowned photographer, Walter looss, Jr. snapped this photo of a moment in Super Bowl IV (January 11, 1970). looss reflects on the picture in a recent *Sports Illustrated* expose on "50 Years of Super Bowl Photos":

"Hank Stram's and quarterback Len Dawson's hands about to meet, congratulating each other on the victory—it's sort of perfect. You really get a feel for the stadium and the moment. Even Robert Holmes—his body and hand reaching in—leads you right into Stram's and Dawson's hands. All the pictures come down to about five-hundredths of a second. If their hands clasped, it was already over. And if Dawson were a half step farther to the center of the field, it wouldn't be interesting."

That phrase. All the pictures come down to a fraction of a second. And then they're gone. Think about that. How many moments have we already missed? **-Dan**


