Moment's Reflection

"I have learned to be content with whatever I have." -Philippians 4:11

I thought I'd share picture from this past summer's vacation. We had other plans, but at the last minute, and by City of Garland necessity, we "chose" (I'm standing my choice of words), to stay at home while for 7 days, an assortment of workers tilled our ground trenching and digging and laying a brand-new gas line!

There's more, of course. To pass inspection, the plumbers pumped the required 3psi of air through the line and waited in their truck to see if it would hold 30 minutes. It did not. And so, through the course of the next 7 days, they repaired no less than 11 gas leaks in our house. The expense was sobering. The collateral damage was even more so. To repair these leaks, they carved out holes in our fireplace brick, sawed holes in the dry-wall, and power-sawed in the attic.

By day three, morale at the Jones home was low.



I've been re-reading Viktor Frankl's best-selling account of his years in German captivity during WWII, Man's Search for Meaning. The book lays the experiential ground-work for his so-called theory of logotherapy. Simply put, Frankl made a profound discovery during his years in captivity: he learned that despite what happened to him (and it was far worse than a gas-line repair), he had the power to choose how to respond to the circumstances of his life. No matter what his captors took away from him (and they took literally everything), they could not take away this freedom.

Despite every imaginable deprivation, Frankl said some survived because they refused to succumb to the temptation to be defined by their circumstances. Some of the book's most poignant passages speak of Frankl's determination to celebrate glimpses of beauty (a sunrise across a Bavarian forest), or to focus one's thoughts on the future, or to see that even in a suffering moment, one had a choice to find some meaning in that suffering.

Frankl's account puts my frustration with an unexpected home repair to shame. There is, of course, no comparison between his experience and mine. But there was for me, nevertheless, a challenge to rise above my circumstances—to harness personal freedom to say with determination that this setback would not have the power to define my outlook on life or happiness. And so, I used that freedom to give thanks for the brick man in Illinois who sent me exact matches for my fireplace. And I gave thanks for the worker who accidently put his foot through our garage ceiling. He made me laugh and reminded me that none of us is perfect. And for the fact that though I would never choose to make these repairs, I was thankful that Jenny and I were kept safe until we did.

Some of you face great challenges. Some of you face cancer. Some of you face the anguish of broken relationships. Some of you face incredible stress at work. Some of you nurse the pain of grief. While neither I, nor Frankl, ask you to ever minimize your suffering, we do challenge you to use your personal freedom to find ways to rise above these circumstances. -Dan

Covenant Group Begins







Note: This selection was written in Dottie's own words.

I was born September 1, 1923 and raised in McKinney Texas. My paternal grandmother was a "McKinney".

Being raised during the depression, I remember times being hard, but with my father having several brothers, who were all farmers, we made do on simple meals. My mother made all our clothes and all of the families traded clothes back and forth as everyone grew. My first job was standing on a box at the cash register at my father's barber shop. Though I was raised an only child, when I was pregnant with my second child, Leanne, my mother announced she too was pregnant. I remember taking her to the hospital when she went into labor and they put me in the wheel chair instead. We had our second children together just 8 days apart.

We were members of the First Christian Church in McKinney so our "Disciples" heritage goes way back. I graduated from McKinney High School where I met Earl. We were married on a cold day January 8, 1943. We eloped while he was home on a weekend pass from the Army Air Corp.

Earl and I had three children, Nick, Leanne and Paul and made First Christian of Garland our church in 1952. We were active in the Crusaders class for a long time and I was active in the Disciples Women's CWF group for many years. We had a night group and a day group. With three children active in youth groups, I can tell you I made a lot of Sunday evening suppers when we had a small kitchen off of the Fellowship Hall; which is now the Ruth Mix Class.

I was a stay at home mom until Earl's heart attack in 1960. I went to work at the counter at Garland Laundry and Cleaners. I learned the trade and moved on to managing the Holiday Cleaners that had around 15 stores. I gave that up to help Earl start a business in 1972 that we ran until his death in 1991.

Earl's mother as well as my mother transferred membership to First Christian Church of Garland. At one time, when my mother was active in the Ruth Mix Class, some Sundays I would have five generations of my family in attendance. I am grateful to have had First Christian Church Garland and its family in my life.

I recently celebrated my 95th birthday with cake and ice cream. I was blessed to have several of my family members in attendance.
