### Late Night Bowling for Families and Professionals



## Exciting Changes in Tri-Area Camping Program

As I mentioned in my sermon on Sunday, there are some very positive changes coming in our youth camps and conferences program. I want to take this opportunity to explain what is happening and how we got to this point.

The Southwest Region of the Disciples Church is broken up into eight smaller geographic areas. Traditionally, each of these areas have run their own summer camps and school year retreats. As we look towards the future, almost all of the eight areas have decided to restructure their programs and combine in some fashion. We live in the NTA (Greater Dallas area) and are connected geographically to the TBA (Fort Worth/Waco) and NEA (East Texas). For years, these three groups have each run separate programs especially for high school youth. Recently, however, we moved to combining the camping program for our 9<sup>th</sup> grade and younger youth, which allowed them to form bonds and friendships with youth from East Texas and the Fort Worth/Waco area. Now that those youth are 10<sup>th</sup> graders, they would have to attend camps with youth from the Greater Dallas area only, away from the relationships they formed in the Tri-Area camping program.

In order to honor our youth's friendships and spiritual development, we (the NTA) are joining with the NEA and TBA for our camping programs. After much consideration and discussion with our youth, we are going to start combining retreats and camp this year! This way, our youth can continue strengthening the relationships they formed over years of attending Tri-Area church camp together.

The main concern in this move was what to do with our Youth Ministry Council (YMC) which is comprised of 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> grade youth who plan our retreats and camps. No one wanted to do away with this wonderful outlet for youth leadership development. Instead, we have found an exciting new model which we believe will enable us to train more youth leaders and offer them greater depth of training. We are combining the three YMCs into one large group. From that large group, the youth are able to split into groups based on interest, strengths, and weaknesses. Having witnessed the beginning planning for the coming year at CYLS (Christian Youth Leadership Seminar), I know we are going to have an exciting year full of new and spiritually enriching activities. ## A Moment's Reflection

Jenny and I loved this little place, The Galley, set up against the waters of Vancouver's Jericho Beach. In the distance you could see a glimpse of downtown. In the near foreground, you could see a variety of sailboats and cargo freights.

We found it by chance. Seems to be the way of lot of extraordinarily joyful things happen in life. We don't find them by any design of our own. They're given to us, as if little gifts of God. Moments of refreshment. Places that fill our souls. Special portions of daily bread. We were tired from the road leading there, some 150 miles from Seattle. Packed with more cars than the 5 o'clock traffic on 635, three lanes of traffic trying to squeeze into one lane to go 10 mph through a narrow little tunnel. Border crossing is now a whole lot more complicated compared to my college days when you didn't need passports and nobody cared if you were American or Canadian. Now in these post-9/11 days, serious agents are eyeballing you like you're a potential homeland security threat.

It was overcast the evening we sat down. In the low 50s, a stiff wind coming off the bay. We zipped up our jackets and just sat there to admire a moment of beauty that was nearly spiritual. We wrapped our hands around a hot cup of coffee. You don't need to talk in holy moments like these.

We went back later that week on a Saturday night. The city was buzzing with the excitement of a so-called Festival of Lights. Fireworks were set to go off at dark and everybody was trying to get a good seat. We found ours there by the water. We got to know the owner while we waited, a big burly man named Keith who said we sounded like Texans. Whatever that means. We joined the patio host in counting down the festival of lights.

We do fireworks a whole lot better here in Texas. But I suppose when you live through the long, cold Canadian winters and short summers, you celebrate light whenever, however, you can find it.

Jenny and I admired all the Canadian beauty. And it was good to get away. As I've shared before, this past year was a tough year. But towards the end of our time away, I actually got homesick. I wanted to get back to my country, my community, my home, my dog, my stores, and my church.

Jenny finished her last cancer infusion Friday. Today we got the word that her 1-year scan is clear. So, next Wednesday she'll have her port removed. And maybe, just maybe, we can look forward to many years of health and good living. But today, I'm happy. I'm home. And I know, from having been away, that this is where I belong.
