A Moment's Reflection



All the Center for Disease and Control Ebola updates are getting me down. Listening to Director Thomas Frieden give another press release is almost more discouraging than listening to Secretary of Defense Chuck Hagel brief the Senate on the threat of ISIS.

There is no isolation in a global society. The Ebola virus has made that clear. Even if we didn't learn it in grade school social studies, we now know there is a place in the world called West Africa where real people live, work and raise families in countries with names like Sierra Leone, Guinea and Liberia. Even though Jared's get some of its most beautiful diamonds from these countries, and Michelin tires uses some of their rubber, we're

now forced to pay attention to the plight of these people because of a nasty virus called Ebola. Ebola is the name of a river in Zaire (further down south), but now it's also a plague and a worldwide nightmare. And now Presbyterian Hospital is taking a limited number of new patients, and some of us are concerned about the possibility of a real life-threatening pandemic on American soil.

Who's to blame for this inconvenience?

It's not God. Really. It's not God. I don't usually resonate with secular-based theologians, but I heard myself whisper a deep "Amen" after reading something Joel Baden and Candida Moss wrote in a recent <u>Slate</u> post. In response to Christian leaders meeting at the Liberian Council of Churches who unanimously agreed: "God is angry with Liberia," they wrote: *"There's something insidious about the notion that God protects the health of the faithful and punishes the sick."* I beg you. No matter how disgusted you might be with the Ebola outbreak and the fact that Thomas Duncan brought it to Dallas, please don't spiritualize this horrible disease by insinuating that God sent a plague upon him or any of the poor people in West Africa. The picture of the anguished mother, on her knees, wailing in grief, makes me remember that God weeps, too.

And then, please don't blame the Christian missionaries for going there and coming back here with it. I'm not shocked easily anymore, but I found columnist Ann Coulter's August 6, 2014 comments downright jaw-dropping. In an article tartly titled, "Ebola Doc's Condition Downgraded to 'Idiotic,'" Coulter wrote in part: *"There's little danger of an Ebola plague {in America}, but why do we have to deal with this at all? Why did Dr. Brantley have to go to Africa?.... Can't anyone serve Christ in America anymore?"* Coulter says Brantley should have spent his time saving some sin-sick soul on the streets of NYC or Hollywood rather than *"marinating himself in medieval diseases of the Third World.... There may be no reason for panic about the Ebola doctor, but there is reason for annoyance at Christian narcissism."*

Dr. R. Albert Mohler, Jr., President of Fort Worth's Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, has written perhaps the most deeply Christian words I've read about the Ebola outbreak. *"These two missionaries (Brantley and Writebol) and all those who have gone to West Africa as authentic missionaries in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ haven't been driven by {narcissism, or idiocy} or mere humanitarian impulse. They've gone because they believe that every single human being on the planet is an individual made in God's image." This is the most compelling reason for our concern as Christians, Mohler concludes: not for mere nationalistic interest, nor health concern precautions, but for sake of the global Great Commission truth that says when one suffers we all suffer. And as to who's to blame? Job can't tell you, and neither can I. In the face of any suffering I side with John Claypool who says asking "why" is far less helpful than asking "how" am I to be a Christian in the face of this present suffering. -Dan*
