From the Desk of Pastor Lynn

In Loving Memory

On Sunday, June 10, 2018 we gathered as a community of faith to honor and remember Valarie Fisher who passed on June 6. Valarie was the heart and soul of the CAPC Soup Kitchen and the food ministries here at Crescent Avenue. Her tireless efforts to feed the hungry and reach out in Christ's love to some of the humblest of God's children stands as a testimony to her faith and her dedication to Christ and service in His name. She leaves behind a large hole in the heart of our church, but even as we grieve we are reminded that we do not grieve as those who have no faith but as those whose hearts are also forged in the faith of Christ that promises a reunion yet to come. Valarie's works have followed her into her eternal rest, and they leave a legacy here in our midst as well. We will be honoring Valarie as our kitchen renovation comes to completion and reopen this incredible ministry once again.



Following is a copy of her obituary shared at her memorial service, which is but a glimpse of the tremendous love she held for her family, her friends, her church, the people she served but most of all her Savior who has guided her home. We hope you will join us in keeping the Fisher family in your prayers.

Valarie Ricciuti Fisher, 70, passed away on Wednesday, June 6, 2018 at Center for Hope Hospice in Scotch Plains. Born in Plainfield, the daughter of Thomas and Viola Ricciuti, she was a lifelong resident of Scotch Plains. Val was a 1965 graduate of Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School.

She was always active in the community and working on various projects. She was the former director of the Scotch Plains Recreation Commission and President of Coles School PTA. She also worked in the family businesses at the Arrow Lounge, Club Malibu and Associated Plastics while raising 3 kids and sending them through college at Georgetown University (Rick), Seton Hall University (Jamie) and Rider University (Tom).

Valarie was a longtime active member of Crescent Avenue Presbyterian Church in Plainfield. In 2012, in the aftermath of Hurricane Sandy, Valarie started the church soup kitchen after running Grace's Soup Kitchen in Plainfield for many years. Valarie's passion to help those in need quickly spread to other volunteers, and the CAPC soup kitchen grew to feed 200 people each Tuesday. She dedicated her life to caring for and helping others. Whether caring for family and friends or volunteering to help those less fortunate at the soup kitchen, she was always there with a kind word and a smile.

Val is survived by her beloved husband of 52 years, Richard "Rick" Fisher, Jr.; her three sons, Ricky (Donna Bond), Jamie and Tommy (Erika). She is also survived by her cherished grandchildren, Zack and Francesca; and her brother, Frank Ricciuti. She was predeceased by her brother, Tom Ricciuti and her sister, Michelle Immordino.

Building & Grounds

Update on Kitchen Renovation.

The kitchen renovation is 50% complete.

Demolition has been completed

The plumbing and electrical behind the scene work (Drains, Pipes and Electrical Wiring) has been completed. The existing electrical and plumbing in crawl space and inside kitchen area were replaced with new plumbing pipes and electrical wiring.

Ceiling tiles were removed in March, it was revealed that we have a leaking roof and peeling lead paint on the ceiling. The small roof over the kitchen vestibule was replaced, other parts of roof was patched and the lead paint was remediated.

Renovation and painting has begun. The new utility room has been built and old dishwashing area has been patched and primed.

1st phase of Inspections for electrical (5/11) and plumbing (4/30) has passed

The week of May 28th the kitchen will be painted and then the new floor and ceiling tiles will be installed. The appliance and electrical outlets installation will begin around the 2nd week of June.

The estimated completion of Kitchen is expected between the end of June and 2nd week of July.

Additional projects completed

- Hot water heater in basement had a leak, replace with new hot water heater
- Barbara Wensburg and Janna Peterson spent many hours cleaning and redesigning the memorial garden and they have done a great job. More work to do.
- Wendy Reid purchased fabric for *Upholstery* of additional chapel chairs.
- Curtains in Guild room was sent out for cleaning
- Tom Rowe rehung Guild room curtains and repaired hardware.
- 1st floor ladies room toilet will have to be replaced soon because of a leak.
- Multiple roof repairs to stop leaks on 2nd floor old kindergarten room, Guild room and back stairs near assembly room. (Some repairs are patches)

Campus renovations, improvements and repairs reflect the pride we have in this amazing facility and our continued work to ensure it remains a viable, vibrant part of our community. Thank you to everyone who works so hard to make it happen!

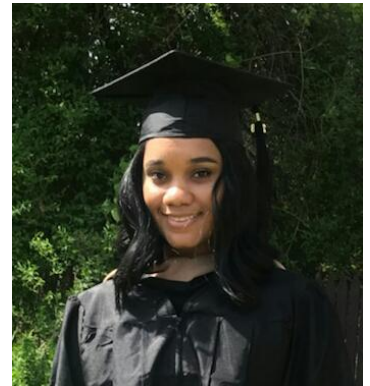

Darcella Anita Patterson Sessomes is a well-known leader in correctional social work education, policy and professional practice. On September 7, 2004, she assumed the position of Assistant Director for the Office of Transitional Services (OTS) with the New Jersey Department of Corrections. On May 5, 2007 she was promoted to the position of Director. After having served almost 10 years in state government, on April 19, 2014 she was promoted to the esteemed rank of Assistant Commissioner.

The New Jersey Department of Corrections (NJDOC), headquartered in Trenton, is one of the largest law enforcement agencies in the State of NJ, with over 7000 civilian and uniform employees. NJDOC is comprised of three divisions: Operations, Administration, and Programs & Community Service. Assistant Commissioner Sessomes manages the Division of Program & Community Services which is responsible for the following prison system services: social work, education, religious services, victim services, volunteer services, residential community reentry programs (RCRP), intensive supervision program (ISP), and county services.

Her career in social work spans over 20 years. During the past two decades Darcella has worked in various areas of social work policy and practice which includes, but are not limited to: domestic violence, HIV/AIDS, addictions, homelessness, juveniles and incarceration. She is a Licensed Clinical Social Worker (LCSW) with the State of New Jersey and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

As an educator, Dr. Sessomes is certified as a student in field instruction (SIFI) supervisor, and is responsible for the oversight of the field placement experience for many social work students in the tri-state who are interested in a career in forensic social work with a specific concentration on reentry and corrections. Dr. Sessomes also serves a part-time lecturer for Rutgers University, School of Social Work, where she teaches coursework on Diversity and Oppression. Additionally, she serves as a part-time lecturer at the University of Pennsylvania where she teaches courses on American Racism and Understanding Social Change: Issues of Race and Gender and at Montclair State University.

As a scholar, Dr. Sessomes received both a Bachelor of Arts in Sociology and a Masters of Social Work from Rutgers University, New Brunswick campus. She received her Doctorate from the University of Pennsylvania, School of Social Policy and Practice. Currently she is pursuing a Master of Divinity at Princeton Theology Seminary. Dr. Sessomes credits all of her success to her faith, loving family, and strong mentors.

What's New with Mission & Outreach...

Request and Solicitation of New Members – A sign up form for new members ran in the Bulletin in April and existing members were asked to reach out to others to join. The opportunity to join us is still open, so anyone interested in joining the Committee or learning more about it should contact Pat Fleming. We welcome suggestions from the Congregation on new projects or activities that will increase our presence in and outreach to the community.

Blanket Sunday Collection – This project of Church World Services (CWS) collects and distributes blankets and kits to families around the world, providing comfort and care to people fleeing their homes or affected by natural disasters. This has been an annual project and CAPC has always provided generous support for it. Notices were placed in the Bulletins and on the Bulletin Board and special envelopes were placed in the pews by the Committee members. This year Blanket Sunday was held on Mother's Day, May 13th, so the amount collected is not final but will be reported later.

Grooming Products Giveaway - In March, grooming products, such as soap, shampoo, razors, and other items were collected and/or purchased with donated money and distributed to community members, many of whom were our former soup kitchen guests.

Giving the Gift of Sight – A collection receptacle has been placed in the Library for the collection of used eyeglasses for RestoringVision.org. This organization supplies the collected glasses to volunteers who carry them on mission trips and distribute them to people needing them. To date they have supplied glasses to 10 million people and their goal is to supply 20 million people by 2020. If your prescription has changed or you just no longer like or need your glasses, please consider donating them for use by this organization.

Potential Collaborative Food Ministry - We have been contacted by First Unitarian Church about exploring the use of CAPC storage space for their food pantry supplies and freezer because of their impending move. They would also be interested in exploring a possible food ministry partnership. A meeting is planned between the appropriate representatives of CAPC (Pastor Lynn, Nick Stevens, Building and Grounds Committee, and Pat Fleming, Mission and Outreach) and representatives from First Unitarian Church to explore this further.

Ongoing Projects – Collection of non-perishable foods for StarFish is ongoing and the Congregation is asked to please continue placing their donations in the collection box in the Church office. Small items that can be used for Bingo prizes by residents of local nursing and long term care facilities continue to be needed and there is a receptacle in the Church office for them.

Finance

Inquiring minds want to know how is Crescent doing?

Will we make it in the short term and in the long term? Well I believe that the answer is YES.

Our regular operating budget is always a challenge but with careful spending and the generous spirit of current and former members we have been able to avoid drawing down our Endowment Fund so far this year. It is wonderful to witness how generous people are when they realize how Crescent has affected their lives and can potentially influence many lives in the future.

We hope to implement a planned giving program later this year so that this generation can begin to make plans to include Crescent in their wills to demonstrate their continued support.

Our kitchen renovation project is progressing nicely and as expected in an old building there were a couple of surprises when we opened up walls, ceiling and floors. We find that cost overruns have caused us to be about \$50,000 behind in our funding. We have begun another funding campaign and already several former members and friends of the Church have come forward. We have applied for several grants as well. Please consider a gift or another gift to fund this worthwhile project. It will allow us to reopen our Soup Kitchen ministry that has served thousands of meals since its inception following Super Storm Sandy.

After we finish the kitchen we can move on to the Stonework project. That project will take all of us working together to make the building safe and secure for generations to come.

If you are reading this and haven't checked us out in a while, please consider coming back. We are determined to remain a beacon in the center of Plainfield for all to see. You will be surprised at all we have done and how welcoming we are. We are not going anywhere, so let the Spirit move you to come back and find what you may have been missing.

Anyone who wants to find out the hallmarks of a godly woman need only turn to Proverbs 31:10-31 and Solomon delineates all the aspects of this special woman's character. Should someone in the Plainfield area want to find a true Proverbs 31 woman s/he need only take a trip over to Bethel Presbyterian Church to meet Marilyn Upperman. For the last few years CAPC's Christian Education and Nurture committee has had the privilege of distributing "goodie bags" and other crafts lovingly and skillfully prepared (samples pictured below) by Mrs. Upperman. Our children love Mrs. Upperman's handiwork, and our committee members love the fact she willingly gives of her time and talent to help us bless the children. At a recent committee meeting we discussed how it might be nice to feature Mrs. Upperman in an upcoming Crescent Connections article.



Marilyn Upperman has been a member of Bethel Presbyterian Church, located at 300 East 5th at Roosevelt for 59 years. She has served as an Elder and a Deacon, as well as being actively involved in Vacation Bible School during her younger years. Mrs. Upperman has been blessed with far more than threescore and ten years. In fact, she describes herself as 90+ years old. She currently resides in Plainfield with her son, Michael, and though she's wheelchair bound, Mrs. Upperman still does many things for herself.

She takes great pride in being a long-time member of Church Women United, a group in which its members range in age from about 65 – 100 years old. The group is dedicated to doing community service and providing money to helping local organizations. For many years Mrs. Upperman was also a member of the Black Women's History Group, which focused on the African American culture and experience. This was a very enriching group for its members.

Marilyn married Mr. Arthur Upperman, in 1960. At that time it was decided that the family should worship together and as a result they all began to attend Bethel. Mr. Upperman was raised as a Presbyterian and the entire family was baptized at Bethel. The family became a vital part of the Bethel congregation. Both Marilyn and Arthur's previous marriages ended with the death of their spouses. Together they raised 6 sons, 5 of which were born during their previous marriages. Mrs. Upperman prefers not to use the term

"step" to describe any of her sons. Their names are Arthur Jr. (Arty died of a heart attack), Ronald (Ron), Antonio (Tony), Lawrence (Larry was killed in a car accident), Michael, and Jeffrey (Jeff). All of the sons attended college and have made contributions in the fields of education, business, medicine, law and culinary arts.



Very little of the previously mentioned information was known to me when I excitedly made my way to BPC on Sunday, May 6th for what was for me a long-awaited interview. I was thrilled to have the opportunity to get to know Mrs. Upperman a bit better since I had been admiring her from afar long before I became a member of CAPC's CEN committee. My son, Quinn, was an apprentice musician at BPC during his high school years, and though we were members of another Plainfield church at the time, I was in attendance quite frequently at Bethel services, so I could readily see that Mrs. Upperman was a virtuous woman. As you read the answers to my interview questions, I think you'll also share my point of view.

SD: *Tell us about your background.*

MU: My family relocated from New York City in the 1920's and I was born in Plainfield in 1926. Initially we attended Mount Olive Baptist Church. I was very active in the Sunday School program and the Junior Choir there. First Lady, Mrs. Jones of Mount Olive, always had us doing many activities, usually including some sort of crafts, which I always liked to do. I was a member of the first Girl Scout Troop # 30 and we met at St. Mark's Episcopal Church. There were many Girl Scout projects, often using items found in nature. During those days all groups encouraged crafts and we had fun with paper and crayons and other things. Now crafts are easier with craft kits.

I graduated from Plainfield High School in 1944. My desire was to go to Muhlenburg's nursing school, but at the time I was not enrolled because they said they had no accommodations for colored girls. Though I was crushed by Muhlenburg's actions I still took many nursing courses, always getting good marks, and eventually going on to gain my LPN license in NYC. I was one of the first African-American nurses in Plainfield.

It was while I worked the 11 pm – 7 am shift at Gouverneur's Hospital in NYC that I first noticed homelessness, seeing many people living on the streets eating out of trash cans. That sparked my interest to start a soup kitchen at BPC while Dr. Leonard Bethel was the pastor. I was used to cooking in big pots for a large family, so I was happy to do the cooking. I also went to thrift shops and picked up gifts for our guests.

****Although Mater Marilyn as she was called by her sons, and would never share this, our sources reported that she worked the night shift in hospitals, **walked home from work** and always made sure that her sons had lunches and dinners prepared daily.**

SD: What role did Christian Education, in particular Sunday School play in your life?

In addition to what's already been mentioned by Mrs. Upperman, she said:

MU: At Bethel I really enjoyed teaching Sunday School. I worked with Sunday School classes and Vacation Bible School, which was very active for many years. Eventually we started an evening VBS, and as part of that program served supper to the children.

SD: If you could ask Jesus one question, what would it be?

After a long pause:

MU: I believe the question would be, Dear Lord, are you really pleased with what I've done these 90+ years, or should I have done some other things?

SD: What advice would you give to our young readers (those younger than 21 years of age)?

After another long, thoughtful pause:

MU: Always remember that as you grow older you might have challenges, so do something you'd like to do as you go along.

SD: What advice would you like to give to our adult readers?

MU: For those that are seasoned, have a smile on your face and say, I did the best I could, when I could. Also, don't dwell on challenges or misfortunes, and it's good to have friends of all different ages.

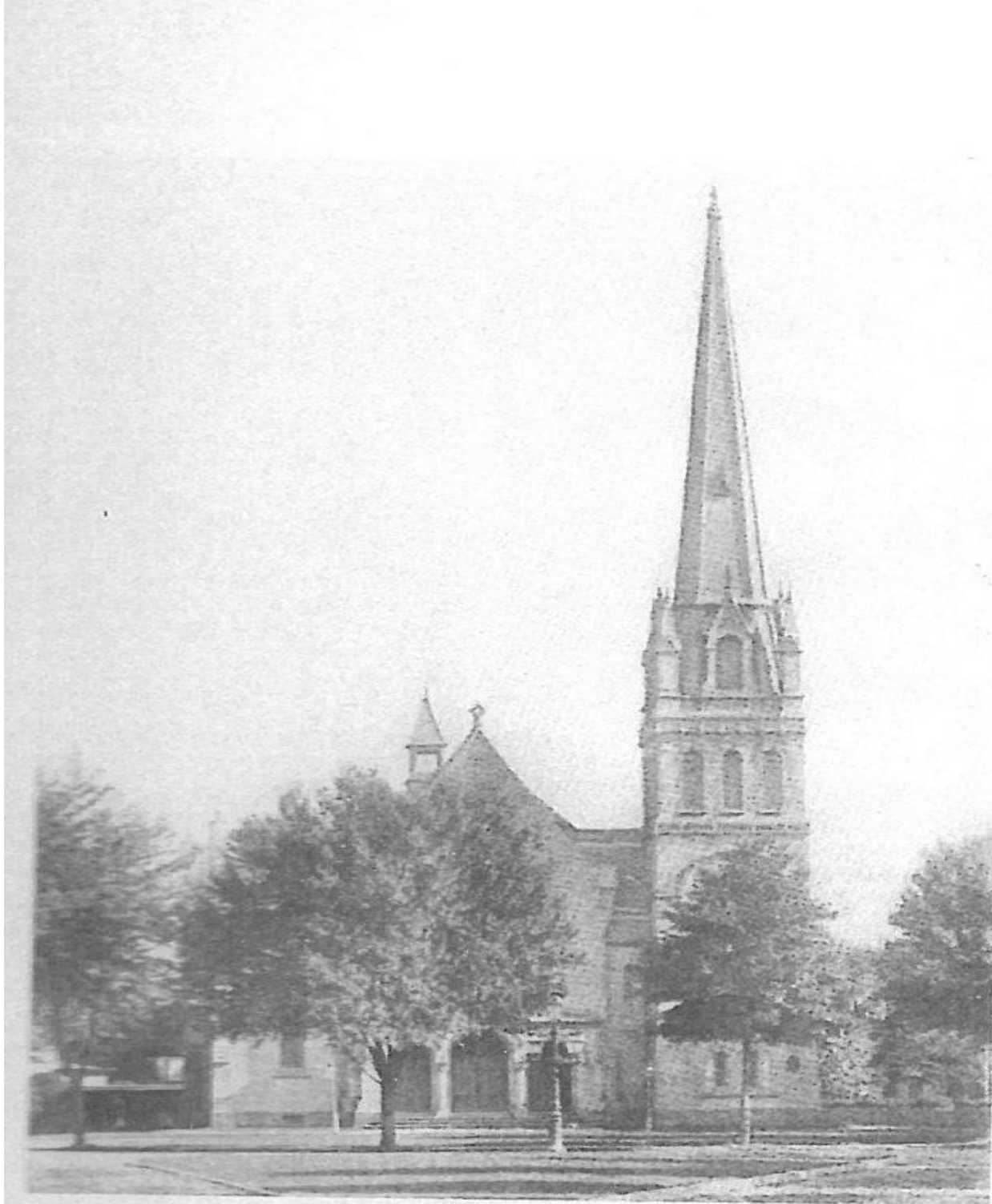
SD: Is there anything else you'd like to share with us for the benefit of Crescent Connections readers?

MU: My thought is I never know what task I'll be asked to do.

It struck me as amazing that Mrs. Upperman's focus remains others oriented; and even after so many years, she still has a heart that is eager to serve. The final verse in Proverbs 31 states, "Give her the fruit of her hands, and let her works praise her in the gates." How appropriate this verse is to describe Mrs. Marilyn Upperman, someone who is so willing to work with her hands. A virtuous woman's worth is far above rubies, and now not only do the Upperman sons and grandchildren, Bethel Presbyterian Church congregation, neighbors and friends of Marilyn Upperman cherish the treasure of this godly woman, we at CAPC know her a tad better and we can admire her as well.

CHRONOLOGY

- Mar. 21, 1844 -- Crescent Avenue Presbyterian Church organized as the Second Presbyterian Church of Plainfield.
- 1845 -- Church erected on Main (now Front) Street.
- 1862 -- Manse built on Front Street.
- 1872 -- Moved to present site on Crescent Avenue.
- 1883 -- The Church was incorporated.
- Nov. 23, 1883 -- Crescent Avenue Presbyterian Church name adopted.
- 1884 -- Bethel Mission started at the corner of Fifth Street and Roosevelt Avenue.
- 1887 -- Bethel Mission rebuilt as Bethel Chapel.
- 1890 -- Bethel Chapel called its first minister.
- 1888 -- Hope Mission Chapel organized in West End of town..
- 1888 -- Fire started by lightning destroyed Chapel and Sunday School rooms of the Crescent Avenue Church.
- 1893 -- Warren Chapel, established 1864, transferred to control of Crescent Avenue Church.
- 1908 -- Church renovated under the guidance of Arthur Ware, architect.
- 1916 -- Warren Church was rebuilt and organized as Watchung Presbyterian Church.
- 1919 -- The Cook residence on the corner of Crescent Avenue and First place was bought and remodeled for the use as a Parish House.
- 1930 -- A new building was erected for Hope Chapel at Grant Avenue, and the Chapel was organized as the Grant Avenue Presbyterian Church.
- Oct. 2, 1911 -- Dedication of new Church House.
- Nov. 17, 1931 -- Crescent Avenue Presbyterian Church destroyed by fire.
- Feb. 25, 1934 -- First service of worship held in new church.
- Oct. 7, 1934 -- Church dedicated.
- Feb. 18, 1940 -- Indebtedness on Church buildings paid in full.
- May 8, 1943 -- Bethel Church organized as independent church.
- Mar. 21, 1944 -- Crescent Avenue Presbyterian Church holds its One Hundredth Anniversary.

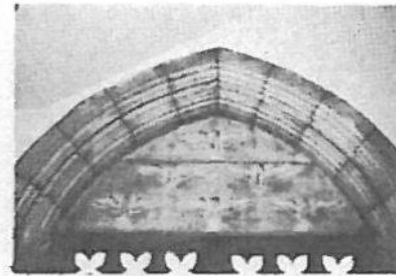

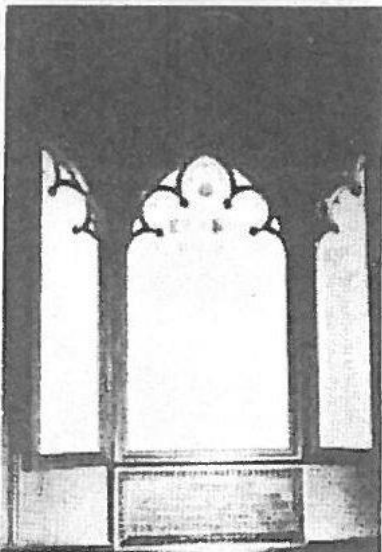

ARCHANGEL MICHAEL, BAS-RELIEF

(wall to right of main nave entrance).

Unauthenticated date, 1431. Archangels, one of nine orders of angels, were the messengers and defenders of Heaven. Rev. 12:7.

Over the bas-relief is a carved canopy which is a replica of two which hung over the altars in the Antwerp Cathedral in the early 1800's.



WORLD WAR II HONOR ROLL

(left of center nave entrance).

This carved triptych bears the names of all communicants of this Church who served in the armed forces during the war years, 1941-1945.

CAPC -- A History**Stephen Hegeman Voorhees**

August 3, 1864 – February 11, 1940

Stephen was born in Griggstown NJ, where he lived on a large farm. He hated farming and eventually left the farm to make his way in New York City. He got a job with the City Farmers Trust Company as a messenger and worked diligently to climb the corporate ladder. He lived in a rented boarding house room which served meals and eventually put himself through college, attending Columbia University where he majored in Business Administration, and graduated Cum Laude.

He was raised in a very religious home and was a member of the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church in New York where he met Helen Walton Gray whom after courtship, he married. They lived together in a small apartment off Fifth Avenue and eventually bought a house in Plainfield, NJ at 943 Madison Ave., a three story house with a lovely rose garden. Together they had two children Ruth Suydam Voorhees and Helen Voorhees. He loved the church and attended the Crescent Avenue Presbyterian Church in Plainfield, NJ regularly.

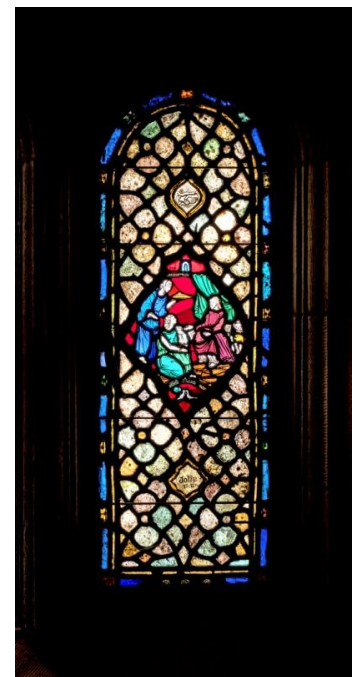
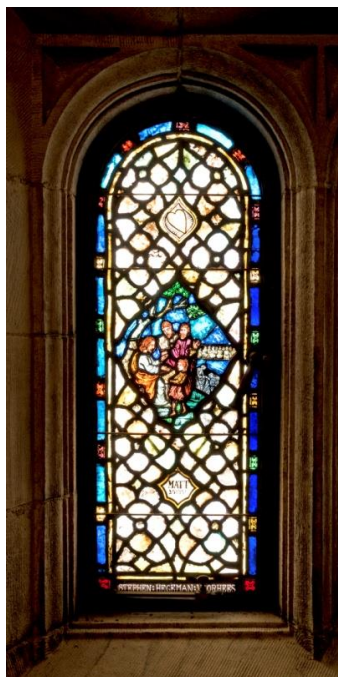
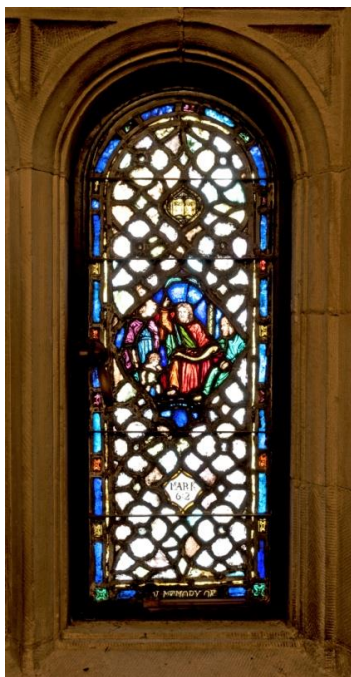
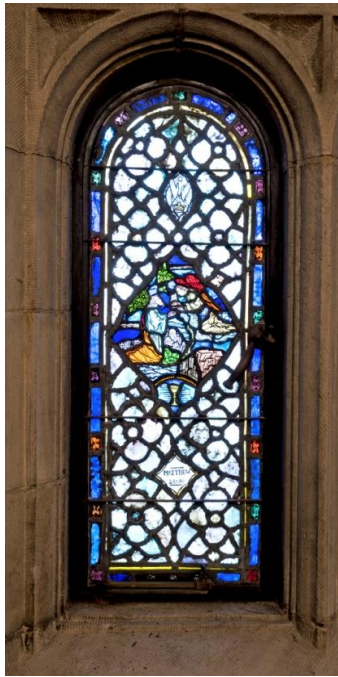
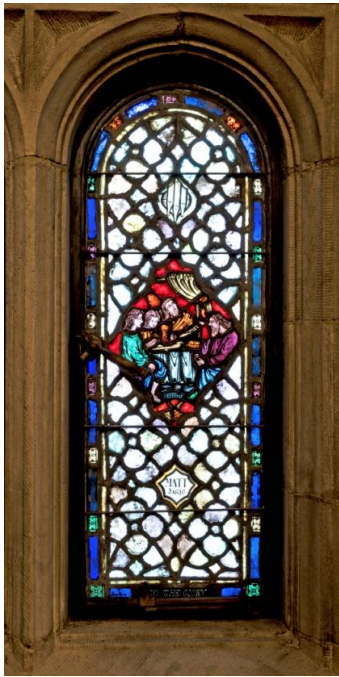
Stephen rose through the ranks to eventually hold the position of President of National City Bank in New York, and sat on the board of the Hayden Planetarium and President of the Board of Health in Plainfield. He was also a member of the St. Nicholas Society in New York. He died of a sudden heart attack in Dunedin, FL while singing the Doxology at the Presbyterian Church service on February 11, 1940. Funeral services were held at his beloved Crescent Avenue Presbyterian Church in Plainfield on Wednesday February 14th and he was buried at the Hillside Cemetery. The stained glass windows in the chapel of the Crescent Avenue Presbyterian Church were donated by his wife Helen Gray Voorhees in his memory.

Helen Gray Voorhees was born in New York but moved to Plainfield and resided at 815 Park Avenue the remainder of her life. Helen passed away on December 22, 1966 at the age of 93. Her funeral services were held in the chapel at the Crescent Avenue Presbyterian Church on Saturday December 24th and she was buried next to her husband in the Hillside Cemetery. Helen was the founder of the Sesame Club, one of Plainfield's oldest literary clubs, which was organized on November 10, 1904. The name comes from John Ruskin's "Sesame and Lilies" - the first book read by the club. Three local ladies, Mrs. Stephen H. Voorhees, Mrs. Louis H. Ross, and Mrs. William M. Sandford, are credited with founding the club, which began with twenty-five members. Each year, the club focused on a reading topic, such as a particular author, place or time period, and members prepared programs on it and would review a book or read a paper. Past subjects included: Ralph Waldo Emerson, Rome, and a Winter in Florence. Sometimes members would bring special guests, with topical knowledge or experience, to speak at club meetings. (Plainfield Public Library)
