GOSPEL READING Matthew 13:1-9,18-23 Rev. Lynn Santulli

That same day Jesus went out of the house and sat beside the lake. Such great crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat there, while the whole crowd stood on the beach. And he told them many things in parables, saying: 'Listen! A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seeds fell on the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. But when the sun rose, they were scorched; and since they had no root, they withered away. Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Let anyone with ears listen!' 'Hear then the parable of the sower. When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what is sown in the heart; this is what was sown on the path. As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is the one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy; yet such a person has no root, but endures only for a while, and when trouble or persecution arises on account of the word, that person immediately falls away. As for what was sown among thorns, this is the one who hears the word, but the cares of the world and the lure of wealth choke the word, and it yields nothing. But as for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty.'

The Parable of the Sower

Sowing Hearts – Reaping Love

A sower goes out to sow, throwing seed it seems everywhere, on good soil and bad, even on rocks themselves. Birds swoop down and eat the seed and some of the seed probably bakes on the hot Palestinian rocks. Some of that living seed never even has a chance to take root. This is the practice of first century farming, something the listeners to Jesus' parable knew all too well. Something we in 2020 have to unpack a bit to understand.

As with any parable, we ponder these stories, reflect on who we are in the story, with whom and with what do we resonate? We research first-century practices and examine the Greek in the texts to mine for deeper meanings. What can we learn from our research and ponderings? Where and how does the Holy Spirit move in our thoughts and hearts as we read this passage yet again? How does this story challenge us in our faith? These are all exceptionally good questions.

My husband, who used to love gardening, doesn't garden any more. Instead, I have tried to take up the trowel (so to speak) and, as a gift of love for him, plant and tend the plants that adorn our home often desperately trying to remember all of the things I heard him talk about in years past. Prepare the soil for the plants, knowing

what you are going to plant and what nutrients that plant needs in order to thrive, were some of the things I remember. I also remember his horror when I made the mistake of calling the soil 'dirt' – he quickly and emphatically explained that dirt was what I removed from the house (I chose not to be offended by this remark) and soil was what God gave us to plant in.

First century farmers may not have paid much attention to the ground they were throwing seeds onto, but this generation certainly does. Seed is too expensive to throw away and keeping pests away from eating the fruits of our labor now seems to be something worthy of our time (I discovered this as I waited for the hour our local deer, named Susan by our neighbor, would pass through our plantings. I go out and tell her to 'move along, Susan, nothing to eat here!')

Are we as passionate about the planting of God's Word in our own lives? I hope so. How do we know if we are bearing fruit (or as Mother Teresa would advocate, blooming in place)? Are we caring for ourselves in the midst of this pandemic, especially as we have had to endure so many disruptions of our lives and accommodated changes that are coming at rapid-fire pace? You experienced gardeners (and you know who you are) can provide much more depth to this reflection, but here are some thoughts from an elementary gardener.

- 1. Just as plants need to be watered, we, too, need refreshment for our souls. If we have deep roots we can sustain droughts longer, of course, but we all need a long, cool drink of God's refreshing streams of mercy and grace to fill us with life. Imagine yourself in the Lord's garden and a cool stream flowing through it that is beautiful, clear, sparkling and cool. Take a drink from it and allow this image to fill your soul. Note where the dry and brittle places are in your life and imagine new life coming to them.
- 2. We need to be fed with God's Word as well. We make time for so many things, and some things take longer than they used to, but we should always make time to read and study God's Word, Online options, our weekly Wednesday night Zoom class, bible study books or Christian living are just some of the options. Worship is another place we come and are filled, opening ourselves to God's Word and quieting the noise and distractions from our own lives.
- 3. Plants naturally seek the light (some more than others, of course, I learned this with shade plants that I left in the burning sun). Seeking God's Light in serving others, singing, writing, praying, fellowshipping (socially distant, of

course), are just some of the ways we grow towards God and realize that we grow because of what He has done in us.

- 4. Weeding and dead-heading is important as well. If you find yourself complaining (about others, yourself, life in general), recognize this as a bitter weed that needs to be removed. Name it and pull it out of your life so that room can be made for joy and new growth. Do old ways of thinking no longer serve you? Perhaps it is time to ponder anew.
- 5. Honor the diversity of creation. We are not all created for the same purpose. Flowers or vegetable; ground cover or shrubs, shade-loving plants or plants that soak up the glory of the sun are all part of God's creation. Together we are part of a garden that is rich, diverse, loved by God and beautiful.

As one gardener has recently written, it's time to get back to the garden! In this summer season, nurture your soul, grow in faith, deepen the roots of your understanding and reach for the Light. Make time for worship, for study, for prayer, for service. That is where you will discover joy and life abundant!
