from the Pastor's Desk...

Grace and Peace to you from God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. 2 Corinthians 1:2

The world turns, the seasons change and the Holy Spirit continues to move in powerful ways here in our midst at CAPC. As another ministry program year comes to a close and we dive into our summer respite, I cannot help but note that the ministry and life at our church has evolved and changed in significant ways We, too, enter not only a new season in our world, but a new season of ministry and mission.

Just as we note the passing of the seasons of the earth by the changes we see around us, there are changes in our church life as well. We are listening to God more closely as a congregation. This year has seen the introduction of the online devotional, "Oasis" which has had two special editions (one for Advent and one for Lent) in which members and friends of this church have offered their reflections and prayers on Scripture. In addition, we even had an online Bible study wherein a number of us read through the Gospel of Mark together. Our Sunday School engaged in a season of learning about the Parables of Jesus, and even organized a Lenten journey for the smallest among us (and allowed even us adults to participate!). Our prayer labyrinth was opened on three different evenings and attendance soared. Did you know that the season of Lent engaged 200 more people than we had last year?

Missions has experienced change and growth as well. As our Missions Committee and our congregation have sought to discern where God is calling us to serve and what missions to support, we cannot miss God's hand at work in our Food Ministries program. This ministry reaches out beyond our doors not only into the community in which we live, but engages a number of people from other churches, businesses, and communities as well. The Keyes Foundation has led the way in giving and has even offered a benefit concert that engages world-renowned talent from Ireland in support of this ministry and seeks to raise funds for the renovation of our kitchen. In addition, we have been recipients of a Greystone Grant through the Elizabeth Presbytery to help in that endeavor as well. This is a significant venture and is one that hearkens to the history and traditions of CAPC that still resonates through our halls today.

And speaking of halls, our building improvements continue as our Sanctuary floors have been buffed and cleaned, our first floor hallway has been completely stripped of over 30 years of wax (most contractors had said it couldn't be done but our own Henry Ward proved them wrong single handedly!). Our cleanup day garnered the largest number of volunteers in years, you will note that overgrown shrubbery and bushes are now gone and even the large tree on the Watchung side will be removed (but more on that later). We are all enjoying the new walkways and the Soup Kitchen even had their inaugural launch of the brand new stoves that grace our kitchen.

Our halls have echoed with wonderful discussions regarding race relations, Bible studies, church meetings, concerts too many to number, community group gatherings that have sought to enrich the lives of people even

beyond our walls (Boy Scouts, Alcoholics Anonymous, Learning for Life), and the list could go on.

Our officers will be heading out to a CAPC Leadership Summit in July to spend time together and listen for and discern God's call on this congregation for the program year to come. In addition, look inside for more information regarding upcoming summer events at CAPC (incredible summer camp event led by Camp Johnsonburg, online Bible study, Leadership Retreat information, and a special memorial tree program to name just a few!).

God is doing a lot here at CAPC and we invite you to join us as we continue to learn, study, serve, and grow in Christ's love. God is doing a new thing here in our midst, you are invited to come and be a part!

Crescent Avenue Presbyterian Church in the News...

The following article appeared in the Courier News on June 8th and a successful concert was held on the 13th. Buses took CAPC parishioners to the concert. A wonderful night for a wonderful cause!

PLAINFIELD — Every Tuesday, volunteers gather in the morning at the Crescent Avenue Presbyterian Church's soup kitchen to begin preparations for lunch. By noon, lunch is ready, guests have arrived, and volunteers are busy ensuring no one leaves hungry.



One floor above, the office of the Tim Keyes Consort, a non-profit organization for charitable cultural programs observed the growing demand for the soup kitchen, said executive director Meg Poltorak and decided to help.

"We saw that it is an incredible resource in Plainfield and it is an underfunded resource," Poltorak said. "It has always been the center of Plainfield and we've moved forward to help preserve that area."

The consort will be celebrating its 20th year anniversary with a performance in Princeton on June 13 to benefit the Crescent Avenue Food Ministries. The performance called Ubi Caritas est Copia means "where there is charity, there

is abundance," explained music director Tim Keyes. The consort has conducted several concerts with the Crescent Avenue Food Ministries in the past, including a New England Tapestry performance last November, Keyes said.

The soup kitchen began in November 2012, in the aftermath of Hurricane Sandy, when a local resident visited the church kitchen to borrow some pots. Valarie Fisher, who now manages the kitchen, said she was aware many people were left without electricity and decided to make some soup and distribute it to the residents.

"We put candles and candlelight (in the church) and little by little, people started coming in," Fisher said. "There was a need."

Need is one of the main motivations behind the soup kitchen running today, said the Rev. Lynn Santulli, pastor of Crescent Avenue Presbyterian Church. On average, the kitchen serves around 150 people on Tuesdays, she said, with around 200 people coming at the end of the month. The full meals offered are healthy and organic, Santulli said, with bagged lunches distributed every Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

"The service is a support to certainly the homeless and also as a service to those who are day jobbers," Santulli said. "Also, we see some families with their savings account running out towards the end of the month; they'll come by and have some lunch."

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, 21.9 percent of individuals in Plainfield are living below the poverty level, compared to the state average of 10. 4 percent. With growing amount of individuals looking towards the soup kitchen for a meal, it is in need of renovations.

"As the need increased, our kitchen isn't designed to handle that kind of volume, so our appliances are failing," Santulli said. "This is where the benefit concert is coming in: we can't afford as congregation support to the renovation of the kitchen by ourselves."

The concert will feature the world premiere of "Bread of Life" by Keyes, a piece he describes as a companion to "Famine Remembrance" by Irish Composer Patrick Cassidy. Cassidy will be traveling in from Ireland to perform, Keyes said, as he actively supports soup kitchens in Ireland. Both pieces deal with the issue of hunger, Keyes said.

"Cassidy's piece deals with the physical hunger, my piece deals more with the spiritual hunger," Keyes said. The concert will take place 8 p.m. at the Richardson Auditorium. Poltorak said she hopes the concert will spread awareness about the issue.

"We're really hoping to help people understand what hunger is," Poltorak said.

Race Relations Forum May 16, 2015

On Saturday May 16th, nearly 50 people from the greater Plainfield community gathered in our assembly room for a seminar on race relations. "WE ARE THE WORLD UNITY IN RACE RELATIONS FORUM" brought together a distinguished panel to discuss the status of race relations in today's environment. The forum was a joint collaboration of the non-profit organizations Nubian Cultural Center and the New Covenant Christian Association, Inc. Organized by Stephanie DeGeneste,

the forum included interactive breakout sessions that addressed race relations at home, school, business and the community. With the brutal murder of nine African Americans last week in a church in South Carolina by a lone white gunman, it still proves that there still remains a need for dialog between races.

The panel Moderated was **Carlos Sanchez**, who immigrated to the U.S. from Columbia in 1977. With a background in business

administration, Carlos worked his way up Deputy City Administrator for Economic Development in Plainfield where he oversees the revitalization and redevelopment of Plainfield.

The panel members included **Detective Rodney Blount** of the Middlesex Procsecutors's office, **Carolyn Burton R.N.**, experienced in healthy living and disease prevention, **Adrian Council**, co-founder and publisher of faith based Positive Community magazine for the African American Community, **Amaree Gardner**, student representative for the Plainfield Board of Education and Vice President of the French Honor Society, **Mateo Gilsilvetti**, New Jersey Scholar in Ecology and Italian Honor Society President, **Erika Jungblut**, **Esq**, a Harvard graduate lawyer and principal at Jungblut Law, **Reverend Edwin Leahy**, Headmaster of St. Benedict's Prep, **Alma Meza**, a real estate broker associate at Century 21 in Scotch Plains and **Marlie Hall**, an award winning Haitian-American Broadcast Journalist at CBS News.



Floored by God's Grace

Thirty-five years of wax lay embedded on the tile floor at the church and I understand that a number of contractors had looked at the floor and pronounced it dead. 'Nothing could be done' they had told the pastor, 'you might as well jackhammer the tile out and put in a whole new floor.' No one seemed willing to tackle the project of restoring a floor that seemed beyond hope. I knew it wasn't' going to be easy, but I knew it could be done. A floor that even I had walked away from years ago now seemed to nag at me until I said that I would do it. At least I hoped I could because I knew that others were counting on me to come through.

It took me over 90 hours of back breaking, tiring work to go over the floor again...and again...and again, to remove the layers that had accumulated. It was a job that would have costs thousands of dollars if I were to bill a customer for the herculean task, but no bill was rendered because it was for my church.

I completed the job on Memorial Day, feeling as dead tired as I could ever possibly remember feeling. I looked at the floor and was pleased. I had saved a floor that was considered by 'experts' to be beyond repair. I had proven that I could accomplish something that others could not or would not and although no one would ever see how hard it was to accomplish, I knew that God knew what had been done.

Not longer after I received a call from a colleague that said he had a deal for me. Unbeknownst to him I had lost nearly all of my business' equipment after Superstorm Sandy and I had not quite recovered financially from the aftermath of the storm. Business had been slow and it seemed like I hadn't caught a break in quite a long time.

The deal my colleague spoke of was the purchase of all of his equipment, his truck and carpet cleaning equipment as well as his mailing list of customers. My heart was in my throat as I pulled out my checkbook waiting to hear the cost of it all. I quickly calculated the value of such a purchase in my head and was estimating the worth to be well over \$12K. I didn't know how I was going to pay for it all, but I waited to hear his cost, pen poised, checkbook readied to receive the blow...which never came.

He told me the price was \$500. I could hardly believe my ears. Here I had lost all of my trucks and cleaning and drying equipment in the storm of Sandy and did not know how I was ever going to be able to replace all that had been lost and this man was telling me it would only cost \$500!

I thought back to the floor restoration project I had just completed at the church and realized that I had just been paid in full, by God! In seeking to be a blessing to someone else, I had been blessed. I guess you could say that I was truly 'floored' by God's grace and saw firsthand His hand at work in my life. Perhaps what had been restored was not just a tile floor in the church, but my faith and my hope that I, too, could be restored.
