

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE "Relationships in God's Family"

Our Pastor has been preaching for many Sundays about relationships in God's family and about our own family members maintaining their relationship with God and studying the WORD to gain a relationship, or a closer relationship to God, or turn back to Him as your first true love. 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MidCity Development Update Rev. Oran W. Young, Pastor

I want to give you an update on where we are with MidCity Development and the proposed 363 unit apartment complex. On February 24th, Miles Memorial CME Church, First Rising and the community showed up in good numbers to make a showing at the Zoning Commission meeting to oppose their moving forward with the project. The commissioners agreed the

developers need to do more to blend into the neighborhood and granted an extension of time until March 30th to see what more MidCity could do.

We are concerned about:

1. The difficulty the displaced tenants will have trying to move back into the new development. Many were members of Miles Memorial.

- 2. The low number of affordable units that have been set aside by MidCity, which does little for a city with a housing crisis.
- 3. The high income required to be eligible for those set asides, and
- 4. The likelihood the proposed parking will be inadequate and intrude on our parking on the street which is already strained.



Coronavirus **Pandemic**

Thank you for taking the Coronavirus, public health crisis seriously and for doing your part to keep your family and fellow neighbors safe.

We ask you to continue to participate in this effort. It is important that you only go out into public areas and spaces when you absolutely need to. When in public, avoid gatherings of more than 10 people. Avoid spreading illness by staying at least six feet away from people. Avoid touching your face and highly touched surfaces (e.g., elevator buttons, handrails, etc.) in public spaces. Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds or use hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol, particularly after coughing or sneezing or having been in a public place. Stay at home if you are sick. Avoid close contact with people who are sick and wear a face mask if you are a caregiver of a sick person. At home, keep frequently touched hard surfaces (such as your door knobs, cell phones, computers, remotes, table, counter tops etc.) cleaned and disinfected. Also, remember to call and give support and encouragement to our seniors during this critical time.

In the words of Dr. Tony Evans, "God allows us to be concerned about situations, but He does not want us to worry because He is a Father and He loves and cares for us." God's Got Us! Pray and trust Him.
