Have you ever thought that you knew someone but you discovered, to your surprise, you only knew one side of the person's life? Well, I'd like to share with you "some" of what I have learned about of our President's life. Are you interested?

Sister Jean H. Whitley joined First Rising Mt. Zion Baptist Church in 1953. She immediately began serving diligently in many organizations within the church. In 1979, she joined the Annie Barnes Circle in the Missionary Society. She was a committed member who was eager to study God's word weekly with the Circle. Years later, she was appointed President of the Missionary Society and remains in that position today. Additionally, she is a member of numerous other organizations in the church; namely, Adult Sunday School, Senior-Choral Choir, New Members Orientation, Senior Citizens Ministry, and Baptist Training Union.. She serves on many committees, such as the Women's Day Committee, Mothers' Day Committee, and any others when asked to serve.

Her service in the missionary arena extends beyond First Rising. She is a Past President of the Women's Auxiliary of the Baptist Convention of DC and Vicinity (BCDCV); Past First Vice-President of the Women's Auxiliary (BCDCV); member of the Mt. Bethel Association; member of Lott Carey Convention; and represents Washington, DC as Past State President in the National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc.

Now that you have been brought up to date on our President's religious side, let me introduce you to what I call the "lighter side" of her life. Sister Whitley was born in Selma, North Carolina. She had five children. "When we were growing up in North Carolina she would leave notes of encouragement all over the house for us, such as 'don't quit', 'hang in there', etc.," stated her daughter, Minette. "Those notes meant more to us than she will ever know. I still remember them and still live by them. She is an encourager! "She always carried her children with her wherever she went if it was feasible." Sister Whitley loves to travel and has traveled much during her lifetime – Bermuda, Alaska, California, to name a few. She loved to ski. Surprised? In her younger days, she and her daughter, Minette, often traveled to Liberty Ski Resort in Pennsylvania. She likes to stay active and will try anything, once. "She is very independent and is co-dependent on Jesus," says her daughter.

She exhibits compassion for her family as well as others. She is her family's Historian. Remember the "Armageddon" snowstorm some years ago? Well, during that snowstorm, she provided shelter in her home for four families. Also, there was a fire that completely burned down a house in the community. She provided shelter for that family in her home for two months. She loves her neighbors as herself. She never seems to get tired of working for kingdom building.

Sister Whitley was a hard-working woman. She was the first African American entrepreneur who opened a shop in Georgetown. In 1970, she opened her first business –"Jean Moni Boutique" in Georgetown. And, she has worked alongside the late former Mayor Marion Barry and former Congressman Walter Fauntroy, She is still a civic and community activist.

It seems as though she got stuck in Washington, DC, when she got off the train from North Carolina. But not so! She still travels back and forth to California to check on her daughters and to the various state conventions. Yes, she still enjoys boarding the plane to 'wherever!' Her hobbies are arts and crafts, storytelling, and writing. She loves to write plays and is an avid bowler. Praise be to God for our President, Sister Jean H. Whitley.
