

<u>I. The Woman (12:1-2)</u> Verse 1

A great (megas) and wondrous sign (semeion = a marker of significant events) appeared (horao) in heaven:

The first of seven signs John lists

A woman
 clothed with the sun;
 with the moon under her feet
 and a crown (stephanos)

5) of twelve stars on her head.

The Catholic church sees Mary Magdalene as the woman



However, other times in Revelation a woman is talked about in symbolic terms it

- represents a religious system.
 Jezebel false teaching system (Rev. 2:20)
- **Great Harlot** false religion (Rev. 17:2)
- **The Bride** the pure church (Rev. 19:7-8)

This image fits with the Joseph's dream in Gen. 37 which is a dream about the tribes of Israel. Israel or Jerusalem is referred to as a woman in Isa. 54; Jer. 3; Ezek. 16; and Hos. 2.

The woman = Israel

<u>Verse 2</u>

6) She was pregnant (gaster = with child in womb) and cried out in pain as she was about to give birth.

If the woman is Israel then this would remind us of a time of great travail and trouble and a time of change as the birth of something new is arriving.

<u>II. The Dragon (12:3-4)</u>

Verse 3 Then another sign appeared (horao) in heaven:

Sign #2 in John's list of seven

We will see 14 hints about the dragon's identity:

- 1) an enormous (megas)
- 2) red (pyrros = the color of fire)
- 3) dragon (drakon = comes from "to look")
- 4) with seven heads (heads = territories)
- 5) and ten horns (keras = usually refers to kings)
- 6) and seven crowns (diadema = royal crowns) on his heads.

Daniel 7:7 – The fourth beast had 10 horns

<u>Verse 4</u>

7) his tail

swept a third of the stars (Rev. 1:20 = angels) out of the sky and flung (ballo) them to the earth.

8) The dragon stood (histemi = dig in/stand ground) in front of the woman who was about to give birth so that he might devour (katesthio) her child. This dragon's intention is to destroy this child!



III. The Child (12:5-6) Verse 5 She gave birth (tikto) to a son, Sign #3 - Six hints to the child's identity: 1) a male child (arren) 2) who will rule 3) all the nations (world wide) 4) with an iron scepter. (Psalm 2:9) 5) And her child was snatched up (harpazo) to God 6) and to His (God's) throne.

It seems clear that the only child who is birthed out of Israel, who will rule the world and was ascended to God is Jesus the Christ.

<u>The Timing Question:</u> When did these events happen?

Vs. 5 is the key to the chronology!

- It depicts the birth and ascension of Christ.
- Therefore we have a known date in time. Put this date in the middle.

Vs. 1-2 talks about a pregnant Israel (1900 BC) Vs. 3-4 talks about Satan sweeping $1/3^{rd}$ of the angels from heaven. So this was before the life of Christ.

Vs. 7-9 talks about a war in heaven and Satan and his angels cast down to earth – this happens AFTER vs. 5 – therefore some time after the life of Christ on earth.

<u>Verse 6</u>

The woman fled (pheugo) into the desert to a place prepared (hetoimazo) for her by God,

> where she might be taken care of (trepho = nourished) for 1,260 days. (3 ¹/₂ years)

This idea will be repeated later. Jesus explained in Matt. 24 that when the abomination that causes desolation happens – that the people should flee to the caves and deserts. God has prepared a place of protection and will supply the needs of his people during the second half of the tribulation period.



Verse 7 And there was war (polemos) <u>in heaven</u>. Michael and his angels (Dan. 12:1) fought against the dragon, and the dragon and his angels fought back.



Verse 8

But he (the dragon) was not strong (ischyo) enough and they lost their place in heaven.

Michael (mikaheel = like God) – arc angle and Lucifer (helel = brightness – arc angel (Ezek. 28:14) – battle of equal powers. Until this great war – Satan and his angels appear to had access to heaven and to the throne of God. Afterwards access is denied. The first step in the ultimate defeat of Satan is his denial of heavenly privileges.

<u>Verse 9</u>

The great dragon was hurled down (ballo)

9) that ancient serpent (ophis) 10) called the devil, (diabolos)

11) or Satan, (Satanas)

Clearly Defined by the text

12) who leads (planao) the whole world astray.

He was hurled (ballo)

to the earth

and his angels with him. (stars explained) The answer! The dragon is Satan himself! He is cast to earth – after the ascension of Christ (vs. 5)

<u>V. The Declaration (12:10 - 12)</u>

Verse 10 Then I heard a loud voice in heaven say:

> "Now has come (ginomai = has come to the finish) 1) the salvation (soteria = deliverance) 2) and the power (dynamis = miraculous might) 3) and the kingdom (basileia = rule/ownership) of our God,

4) and the authority (exousia = right to power) of <u>His</u> Christ. For the

13) accuser (kategor = slanderer) of our brothers,
14) who accuses them before <u>our</u> God day and night,
has been hurled down.

Satan's mission is to destroy the image of the saints in the mind of God by accusing them of their sins and worthiness of death due to the law. However, God by his grace has removed our penalty of sin and has chosen to forgive and forget our unrighteousness.

<u>Verse 11</u>

They overcame (nikao) him (spiritual warfare) 1) by the blood of the Lamb

Blood calls to remembrance that the first and final defeat of Satan already happened – at the cross! Satan's threat of death was removed by Christ's proof of resurrection. (Rom. 5:8)

2) and by the word (logos = word of God) of their testimony (martyria);

We have to speak the word to be a testimony! 3) they did not love (agapao) their lives (psyche) as to shrink from death.

greater anger and bitterness toward God.

To value Christ is to live in peace with life (Phil. 1:21).

<u>Verse 12</u>

Therefore rejoice (euphraino), you heavens and you who dwell (skenoo = tabernacle) in them! But woe (ouai) to the earth and the sea because the devil has gone down to you! He is filled with fury (thymos = slow burning) because he knows his time (kairos) is short." Satan accepts that he can't win – but that only drives him to

VI. God's Protection (12:13 - 17)

Verse 13 When the dragon saw that he had been hurled to the earth, he pursued (dioko) the woman who had given birth to the male child.

Satan has been persecuting Jews and Israel throughout history and those Christ followers that have been birthed through her. From the time of Abraham until today, Israel holds a primary role in God's plan for the ages – therefore, Satan will continue to attempt to destroy God's plan by destroying God's people, God's city (Jerusalem) and God's saints.

Verse 14

The woman was given the two wings of a great eagle, so that she might fly to the place prepared for her in the desert where she would be taken care of (trepho = nourished) for a time, times, and a half a time. (3 ½ years) out of the serpents reach.

Eagles wings are a reference to the Exodus experience (Ex. 19:4) God will do again what he has done before. During the tribulation.

Verse 15

Then from the mouth of the serpent spewed water like a river, to overtake the woman to sweep her away with the torrent.

It's interesting that the serpent <u>mimics</u> God's judgement during the days of Noah. However, God has promised NOT to use water to judge the earth again.

<u>Verse 16</u>

But the earth helped (boetheo = to run to the cry) the woman by opening its mouth and swallowing the river that the dragon had spewed out of his mouth.

Once again God delivers His people in times of trouble. This reminds us the promise of Isaiah 43:1-3a:

"But now, thus says the LORD, your Creator, O Jacob, And He who formed you, O Israel, "Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name; you are Mine! "When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; And through the rivers, they will not overflow you. When you walk through the fire, you will not be scorched, Nor will the flame burn you. "For I am the LORD your God, The Holy One of Israel, your Savior;"

<u>Verse 17</u>

Then, the dragon was enraged (orgizo = bursting anger) at the woman and went off to make war against the rest of her offspring <u>Two indicators of her offspring</u>: 1) those who <u>obey</u> (tereo = keep or abide) God's commandments 2) and <u>hold</u> (echo = to keep or defend) to the testimony (martryia) of Jesus. For the 144,000 and those who become Christians during the

For the 144,000 and those who become Christians during the tribulation, the persecution from earth now add to the difficulty. The true measure of Christian faith is stated simply here.
