

"Be Still...."

PASTOR STEVE RATH

My daily devotional time recently has taken me again through wondrous journey of the Psalms – a wonderful intersection of life and faith, hope and fear, promises and provision. One of my favorites is Psalm 46, which reads in part:

God is our refuge and strength, always ready to help in times of trouble.

So we will not fear when earthquakes come and the mountains crumble into the sea.

Let the oceans roar and foam.

Let the mountains tremble as the waters surge!

Be still and know that I am God!

...the God of Israel is our fortress.

Psalm 46:1-3, 10 (New Living Translation)

All of us can relate to times and seasons when it feels like our world is coming apart. Sometimes life has its unexpected circumstances and situations that come upon us without any warning. When they do, we're tempted to forget God is in the midst of them too. Our tendency is to make the storm bigger and God smaller, but that's not the truth the psalmist wants us to remember. God is greater!

With the words of this psalm fresh on your mind, fast forward to the life of Jesus and you might recall a night in



which Jesus and his disciples are out in the middle of the Sea of Galilee and a storm comes suddenly. The disciples are scared stiff, certain that they are going to be consumed by the wind and the waves.

Jesus awakens from the commotion and does something so simple and yet so powerful. He says, "Peace, be still!" and all is calm again (Mark 4:39, New

King James Version). Winds and waves cease and fearful hearts can find an anchor in God.

I continue to pray for us as a church, mindful of the transitions, uncertainties, and changes you have experienced together, ever so grateful to be with you and know that God is always faithful to his promises. May God in Christ, be our peace as the hymnwriter once penned:

Be still, my soul: your God will undertake to guide the future, as in ages past.

Your hope, your confidence, let nothing shake; all now mysterious shall be bright at last. Be still, my soul: the waves and winds shall know the Christ who ruled them while he dwelt below.

All of us are leaders in some way, shape, or form, even if we don't think we are "leadership material...." We lead families, committees, coach sports teams, oversee staff or coworkers.... 2019 West Ohio Conference Report

Hope was in the air as the 50th session of The West Ohio Conference gathered on the shores of Lake Erie at Lakeside Chautauqua. Bishop Gregory V. Palmer presided over the conference, which was held June 2-6. The conference theme of "Be Not Afraid – HOPE," was based on Romans 15:13, "May the hope of God fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit."

Palmer addressed the conference, speaking into the unrest in the denomination regarding human sexuality.

"If there was a memo that came from Holy Ghost headquarters that said 'all of you United Methodists are free to suspend your attention to the primary mission of disciple-making and world transformation until you resolve the challenge of human sexuality," signed God, Creator, Redeemer, Sanctifier, Father, Son and Holy Ghost, I just need you to know I missed the parchment and I didn't get a digital version," Palmer said.

"I am not going to be defined by a single conversation and a single story. And you ought not to be as well," he said.

Five people shared their personal testimonies with the conference. From twins with Cystic Fibrosis to returning citizens and recovering addicts, each expressed their gratitude for the faith and hope they found in God through The United Methodist Church.

One week before the session met, 18 tornadoes devasted parts of the conference. A special offering of more than \$10,000 was received with numerous online contributions yet to be counted. Earlier in the year, Bishop Palmer challenged conference members to bring contributions for Light the Way, a focused plan to develop new faith communities and increase the number of highly vital existing congregations. An offering of more than \$100,000 was collected, bringing the total of gifts and pledges to \$2.6 million.

During the session's times of holy conferencing, members:

- ELECTED, in one day, the 14 General Conference, 14 Jurisdictional Conference, and 8 Alternate delegates to represent The West Ohio Conference in 2020.
- PASSED Recommendation #1 the 2020 Budget of \$19,572,211, a reduction of \$500,000 (2.5%) from 2019. These reductions are possible in part because of Conference staff sharing and attrition, no 2020 raises for extended cabinet members, and the benefits of owning the Conference center.
- PASSED Recommendation #2 Board of Pension & Health Benefits, which keeps healthcare coverage the same for active and retired clergy. The Conference has added an Employee Assistance Program for additional mental health support, and all eligible clergy will see an auto-escalation in their pension contribution rate of 1% per year, until a maximum of 10% is reached (unless clergy opt-out).
- PASSED Recommendation #3 Commission on Equitable Compensation, in which the recommended minimum salary for clergy is 2% higher than last year. Key Conference staff and Cabinet took no increase in salary for 2020.
- PASSED as amended Recommendation #4 Petition to the 2020 General Conference to Amend Paragraph 316.1: Clarification of Context of Ministry Regarding Licensed Clergy. The amended text provides that a charge for licensed local pastors is defined as "the people within or related to the community in which it is located."

PASSED Recommendation #5 – Petition to the 2020 General Conference to Amend Paragraph 319.2: Annual Licensing for Local Pastors. The recommendation allows for district committees on ordained ministry to choose to continue the licensing for a local pastor each year without meeting with the person, unless requested.

Membership stands at 148,153. Worship attendance was 88,978, and church school attendance stands at 28,745. Professions or reaffirmations of faith: 2,856. Adults and young adults in small groups: 96,152. Worshippers engaged in mission in 2018: 49,847. WOC churches served 2,403,556 people with ministries of outreach, justice, and mercy.

The 51st session of the West Ohio Annual Conference is scheduled for June 7-11, 2020, at Lakeside.

Administrative Council Report

We had 15 members at our June 10th meeting. The following is an overview of the actions/reports that were taken/given during this meeting.

- 1. Jane Farmer, Worship chair, reported they are working on a magnetic name tag project. The outside summer service at Smeck Farm Park is being deferred this year.
- 2. Jim Thompson, Outreach chair, reported on a church-wide mission trip in July 2021 to the Mid-West Distribution Center in Illinois. Council voted to reserve rooms for this mission trip.
- 3. Finance chair, Jerry McCreery reported the Mortgage Reduction Drive total is \$27,399.00.
- 4. Rob Sayre, SPPRC, Joe Famer and Pastor Steve attended a Start Right Seminar.
- 5. Tom James, Trustees, reported workday went well and we received approximately \$700.00 proceeds from the sale of the steeple. The Safety Committee will be working with the Trustees to re-key the church and family life center. A policy for the keys is in the works. This is a preventative measure and not a response to an incident.
- 6. Pastor Steve stated he is working with Jennifer Lodge on Vacation Bible School. The Pre-School year ended well. Pastor Steve asked us for ideas on how to bridge the gap between pre-school and church attendance among pre-school families. Any ideas would be welcome. Please contact Pastor Steve or David Brookover if you have any ideas. Pastor Steve is working on visitations with shut-ins and hospitalized congregants. He is also working on intermediate and long-range goals.
- 7. Tricia Rath is going to form a Health and Wellness committee.

Pastor Steve closed the meeting in prayer.

I would like to thank everyone that attended for their dedication and leadership to our church. Our next meeting is Monday. July 8th at 7:00pm in Fellowship Hall.

Mortgage Reduction Challenge

Jerry McCreery, Chair of Finance made the following announcement Sunday, March 17: The late Dale and Joan Landis will give a gift of \$100,000 to be applied to the Family Life Center mortgage principal. This gift is contingent on matching funds from church members. The church will receive this gift if we match it dollar to dollar. The maximum gift is \$100,000. If we fall short of the \$100,000 and match a portion, the gift will match our donations. We can donate more than the \$100,000 gift, but donations over \$100,000 will not be matched.

The challenge to match the gift dollars will run through December 31, 2019. During this time the church will continue to make the monthly mortgage payment. Our matching dollars will be above and beyond our 2019 pledges and regular giving. Check or cash donations can be put in the Sunday collection plate and must be designated to the mortgage principal either on the giving envelope or check. Donations will be tracked and communicated during the challenge.

At the end of each month, all designated Mortgage Reduction Challenge donations will be forwarded to the mortgage company and applied to the mortgage principal. As of June 23, 2019 we have a total of \$28,894.00 Look for the "Challenge Thermometer" out in the Narthex area!

"Living out Christ's love by responding to our neighbors' needs."

I visited an unfamiliar hospital recently on a stressful day in a stressful year that has caused me to spend way more time in hospitals than any other year of my life. A volunteer wearing a blue smock approached me with a reassuring smile and asked if she could help me find where I needed to go. I didn't realize how tightly I was wound, but I nearly cried with relief as she walked with me to my destination, the surgical waiting area. It was a simple act, but it meant a lot to me just then not to be navigating that short distance alone.

Sometimes, being a Good Neighbor is just that: *walking with* someone over a barrier, through a hard time, on a learning curve – offering simple kindness and encouragement.

Walking with. Increasingly, that's how I view the role of Good Neighbors in the Village, a partnership of Baltimore-area churches. We work year-round through a number of initiatives meant to improve the quality of life of our neighbors in ways that are both direct and indirect. Our project areas shift or change with our growing understanding of unmet needs in the community. We try to maintain good working relationships with local institutions and groups (the food pantry, the school, the library, 4-H, Community Chest, civic groups, the Village, etc.) and focus on efforts that make a positive difference in the lives of our neighbors. At the very least (and perhaps this is the most important part), we walk with friends for a while, providing connection and assurance.

Good Neighbors in the Village

If you are looking for a way to be involved in an active ministry or community service, GNIV has many volunteer opportunities – for teens and for adults, for handyfolks and bookworms. You don't need to come to meetings or take charge of a project area; you really can just offer an hour or two of time each week, serving in a way that uses your particular skills, or develops skills. To get connected, leave a message with the Christ UMC office, 740-862-4343, and we'll return the call, often the same day. Or call me.

We have received a grant from the and George and Dollie L. Zimpfer Memorial Fund of the Fairfield County Foundation to help support our awesome Healthy Kids Food Box Project, underway now. This project combines weekly cooking demonstrations with healthy ingredients families take home to make the dish that was demonstrated. The Tree of Life (TOL) is a relief agency of the UMC serving people who live on the Rosebud Reservation in South Dakota. Christ Church sent a monetary donation through Coins for Mission last year.

Program highlights are as follows:


- * Soup Kitchen that serves 200-300 meals 4 days a week
- * Food coop and Pantry serving 200 families a day 4 days a week
- * Thrift Store that provides free items to the homeless and at a minor cost to 100-200 people per day
- * Construction ministry that accomplishes home improvement projects
- * Prom Dress give away, provides dresses, shirts and ties to as many as 200 HS students annually
- * Serves as distribution point for Feeding South Dakota Sr. boxes, a senior nutrition program
- * Partners with "When No Means No", an international sexual and physical abuse educational program
- * Partners with Rosebud Tribal programs to do construction projects, health and nutritional programs
 - * Hosts 36 VIM teams for 2019 from as far away as Ohio
 - * Partners with Indian Health Services
- * Conducts mobile thrift store activities with the many communities scattered across the Reservation
- * Partners with Solar Oven Project to train local Rosebud residents with solar oven training.

Update from the Selways

Clay and Emily Selway say 2018-19 at Ohio University has been a very difficult year. Serving as missionaries for Campus Crusade for Christ, they say they have been tested in every way; physically, mentally, emotionally, relationally and financially. "We had many ministry problems that needed to be solved - some that still aren't solved. Disappointments and unmet expectations piled up. Are we even making a difference?"

Clay says, "By the end of the school year, we both felt pretty worn. So much so that both of us began
