Do You Have the Christmas Spirit?

A question we hear often during this time of year is: "Are you getting the Christmas spirit?" What does it take for you? Going to a children's Christmas program? Seeing an Advent wreath in church? Putting up the tree, or listening to Handel's *Messiah*?

For some reason, as a season like Christmas approaches, we find in ourselves an ever-increasing desire to get in touch with some deep feelings. Feelings of reverence, of joy, of mystery.

Do you know what I mean? It's a desire to be closer to what we know – deep inside – is the really *valuable* side of life: The "spiritual" world. Maybe that's why we call it the Christmas <u>SPIRIT</u>.

But with all the activity, visiting, eating, shopping (hard work!)—the "spirit" we yearn for may seem farther away then ever. And in spite of all our attempts to usher in the Christmas Spirit with food



and prayers and carols and family fun, we might notice within ourselves (if we take a moment to be alone) a haunting feeling that maybe even God is a bit far away. And that it would take an extreme amount of *effort* on our part to get Him to come closer.

Have you ever felt that way? I have. And especially at times like Christmas, when the "spirit" is supposed to be so evident.

Perhaps this is the time to remember that, ultimately, Christmas is about the **incarnation**—the "enfleshment"—of the living God. That is, God came to earth in flesh and blood, in the person of Jesus. It is an

amazing, if not shocking, event. Yet it was prophesied for centuries before it occurred, and its effects still ripple down through our lives today.

In fact, what we celebrate during Advent and Christmastide is an event so unlike any other philosophy or religion. This was an historical claim that could be checked—verified, proved or disproved. This was a claim that touched real life. How does that claim touch *you* during this season?

Christmas says so many things to us—but one of the most important things is: "God is *not* far away; He is very close." He proved it once by taking on a human body and touching people like you and me. And this longing we feel for the "spirit"—not *just* the Christmas spirit—but the LOGOS, the Word (see John 1), the *realness* behind the externals, the *meaning* behind the routines of life ... this is a longing for which God has provided satisfaction.

With gratitude for this great gift at Bethlehem, we can hardly avoid enjoying the warm glow of the Christmas spirit.

So let us not become so concerned with external considerations that we fail to take advantage of the opportunity to deepen our relationships during this season—with our Lord, too. He calls us from the hectic pace and says: "A deep relationship with Me is always ready for further cultivation. Turn to Me. I really am so close."

Then, after December 25, which is Christmastide, we sing the grand old Carols (Hymnal, pages 77-115). Come, let us adore Him!

We are off to a great

start with the "Shop With Scrip" program here at Good Shepherd. Thanks to everyone who has already begun to use the program to do their everyday shopping (groceries, gas, pharmacy, restaurants, etc.) as well as to all who are taking this opportunity to shop for Christmas gift cards for their family, friends and others on their holiday lists.

A special thanks to Rusty Shelley who approached the company for whom she works, Pacer Marine, and told them about this program. With her encouragement, they purchased 155 - \$25 Walmart gift cards for their employees for Thanksgiving. What a way to kick off this program for Good Shepherd! And the best news is that they are doing it again for Christmas!!!

Just FYI – Several retailers are increasing their percentages for Christmas. Those retailers include Bath and Body Works – up 5% to 18%; Hallmark – up 2% to 6%; Bass Pro Shops – up 4% to 13%; Walgreens – up 2% to 8%; and Aeropostale – up 3% to 10%.

Here is how it works - Good Shepherd members buy gift cards through the parish at full face value and use them in place of cash, checks, or credit cards for their <u>everyday</u> **shopping**. Good Shepherd then purchases the cards from Great Lakes Scrip Center® at a reduced cost. The difference is immediately credited to the Good Shepherd accounts.

A display that includes flyers describing the program, retailer lists, and order blanks are available in the Parish Hall for your use. Orders for the gift cards are collected by the coordinators on Sundays, and the gift cards are delivered the following Sunday.

We will continue to receive orders for your cards through Sunday, December 14, with delivery of that last order on Sunday, December 21. As this is an ongoing project, we will resume taking gift card orders January 4, 2015.

Cursillo Ultreya



Ultreya is a Spanish word, derived from the original Latin, meaning Onward! It was in common use by pilgrims to greet and to encourage one another along their way. This word is now used by the Cursillo community to identify the monthly meetings that are held after a Cursillo experience.

De Colores – a phrase conveying the blessings of "all of the colors of God's love" - is a greeting often exchanged by those who have experienced joy of the Cursillo weekend.

Good Shepherd's Ultreya is a monthly gathering of those who have been to a Cursillo weekend where Christians are challenged to take the "next step" in deepening their life in Christ, through renewing their faith and commitment to Him. The Cursillo Cross proclaims: *"Christ is counting on you!"*

You may also attend a Cursillo Ultreya at Good Shepherd if you would like to learn more about Cursillo and how to live out your faith in your church and community.

The Ultreyas begin at 5:30pm with a Pot Luck supper, followed with singing, fellowship, listening and sharing with one another as we seek to deepen our faith and expand our knowledge of the Christian life. In a climate of friendship, members share their life experiences based on the three tenets of the Cursillo life - Prayer, Study and Action.

Christmas Traditions



We usually associate Saint Nicholas with many Christmas traditions. Nicholas was born during the Third Century in the village of Patara. At the time the area was Greek and is now on the southern coast of Turkey. His wealthy parents, who raised

him to be a devout Christian, died in an epidemic while Nicholas was still young.

Obeying Jesus' words to "sell what you own and give the money to the poor," Nicholas used his whole inheritance to assist the needy, the sick, and suffering. the He dedicated life his to serving God as



serving God as a priest and was consecrated Bishop of Myra while still a young man.

Bishop Nicholas became known throughout the land for his generosity to those in need, his love for children, and his concern for sailors and ships. What a contrast this is to the image we have in popular culture of Santa Claus as an old man living at the cold north pole!

One story tells of a poor man with three daughters. In those days a young woman's father had to offer prospective husbands something of value—a dowry. The larger the dowry, the better the chance that a young woman would find a worthy husband. Without a dowry, a woman was unlikely to marry. Without dowries, the alternative for this poor man's daughters was to be sold into slavery. Mysteriously, on three different occasions, a bag of gold appeared in their home, providing the money for the dowries. The bags of gold, tossed through an open window, were said to have landed in stockings or shoes left before the fire to dry. This led to the custom of children hanging stockings or putting out shoes, eagerly awaiting gifts from St. Nicholas. And so St. Nicholas became known as a gift-giver. He did many kind and generous deeds in secret, expecting nothing in return.

We remember St. Nicholas on his feast day, December 6th. Over the centuries, people have reenacted the stories that surround this beloved man. In Germany and Poland, boys would dress as bishops, begging alms for the poor—and sometimes for themselves. In the Netherlands and Belgium, St. Nicholas arrived on a steamship from Spain to ride a white horse on his gift-giving rounds. In the Netherlands St. Nicholas is celebrated on December 5th, the eve of the feast day, by sharing candies, chocolate initial letters, small gifts, and riddles. In Holland, children leave carrots and hay in their shoes for the saint's horse, hoping St. Nicholas will exchange them for small gifts.

By simple gift-giving in Advent, many Christians throughout the world preserve the focus on the Christ Child on Christmas Day.

Saint Francis is also the source of one of our Christmas traditions. Born in the 12th Century, we discover this founder of the order of servants of the poor was the originator of the story of the Christmas crèche. Francis had his brothers create a model of the barn where Jesus was born. He had all his close friends, and all his close animal friends, take their places in this replica of Bethlehem.

Francis' mirroring of Christ's love for all creation was so real, it was said, that in the manger appeared the Infant Jesus. The hay in which the Christ child lay was fed to people and animals who were ill, and it freed them from their diseases. F. L. Cross, in *The Oxford Dictionary of the Christian Church,* records "The night was lighted up like the day, and it delighted (people) and beasts...The woods rang with the voices of the crowd and the rocks made answer to their jubilation."



The tradition of the crèche has continued all over the world since Francis inaugurated it in the Thirteenth Century. The crèche placed each year in the nave of Good Shepherd Church is to remind us that Christmas is not so much about exchanging gifts and gathering with family members or friends as it is about honoring with one another the nativity of Jesus Christ.

O blessed be Babe Jesus who comes with stars of light; And blessed be His Mother and all the angels bright. We welcome Him this morning, who in a manger lay. He comes to be our Savior this blessed Christmas Day.

The shepherds will adore Him. The wise men come to see. With myrrh and gold and incense, they humbly bow the knee. We'll praise His name forever, this infant child so small. He comes to bring salvation; He comes to free us all.

Let bells ring out rejoicing, let every voice be heard Proclaiming this great morning the birth day of the Word. So tiny and in swaddling, He as a baby came We celebrate his birthing. We praise his holy name.
