A Message from Pastor Matt

This is the day that the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it. (Psalm 118:24)

"I don't have to go to church in order to be a Christian."

As a pastor, I have heard that said to me many times, as I would imagine that many of you probably have, too. And in the final analysis of the statement, I would say that it is correct. Our salvation and relationship to God is linked not to visible or demonstrative actions, or good works (like going to church), but to the saving grace found in Jesus Christ. However, I would like to respond with, "but as a Christian, shouldn't you want to go to church."

Think about the gratitude that a person shows for a present that they have received, particularly when that present was unexpected or a surprise, or maybe something that they have wanted for a really, really long time. In such cases, it's not out of the ordinary for shouts of joy, or maybe tears of happiness to be joined with such a wonderful and special gift.

Can it not be said that there is no greater gift, than the gift of life given to all humanity by God through Christ.
One of the ways that God calls His people to honor and thank Him for what he has done is to be in community together.
And the most significant way that we are in community as

Christians is in worship. In essence, church and worship becomes an effective "thank you" card back to God for what He has done for us, and a witness and manner to share that message with others.

While many times the schedules and demands of 21st Century life make every Sunday attendance difficult, nonetheless, the invitation and expectation of God is still given. To gather to hear the Gospel and to share in the Lord's Supper, is a privilege and gift that all are afforded each week. As best we can, we should endeavor to take advantage of that gift, and the strength...and peace...and healing that it brings. May the peace and grace of God be with you now and always.

While I have been on vacation from work I have had the opportunity to visit places that have assisted living places for the elderly to reside. One place in particular is the Augsburg Lutheran Home. While visiting with the chaplain, he asked me if I would like to visit some of the residents with him and give them communion. Naturally I said yes and while I was there, we visited over a hundred people. Most of the residents we visited were single individuals and enjoyed seeing us and talking to us about anything in general. After visiting the residents the chaplain and myself, returned back to his office.

He introduced me to some devotions, he uses during his visits and one in particular caught my attention. It was entitled "A SIGN FROM GOD" and the passage was from the Gospel of Matthew. It said as follows.

Matthew chapter 12 verses 38-40 - Then some Pharisees and teachers of the law said to Him. Teacher, we want to see a sign from you. He answered. A wicked and adulterous generation asks for a sign! But none will be given it except the sign of the prophet Jonah. For as Jonah was three days and nights in the belly of a huge fish, so the Son of Man will be three days and nights in the heart of the earth.

The point I am trying to convey here is this. That asking God for a sign is fraught with difficulty. If we demand a sign from God or if we think a sign can eliminate our needing to walk by faith and not by sight then we are becoming part of the wicked and adulterous generation Jesus is talking about. Remember this Brothers and Sisters in Christ, if you need a sign today that God loves you, don't look at your circumstance. Everything around you and me may be in

shambles. Look to the cross and especially to the empty tomb of Jesus. Jesus compares his life to Jonah. Jesus was put to death on that horrible cross because He was obedient and had set His face toward the place God wanted Him to go: Jerusalem. Jesus was resurrected on the third day. Jesus resurrection proves His sacrifice for our sins and that God now declares us innocent and sets us free for Jesus sake. Having this sign from Jonah how could we ask for anything more.

Thank you for your generous donation of quilts and kits for LWR's distribution overseas. These gifts of your hearts and hands are beautiful expressions of God's grace and love to people all around the world.

Last month, LWR staff and partner CARITAS were busy distributing quilts and kits in Peru, to Peruvians who are the most vulnerable due to proximity to disaster risk areas, lack of access to clean water, and high unemployment rates. Many have also been ostracized from public and private development efforts and policies due to their class, age, sex, ethnicity and health. Mission Quilts, Personal Care Kits, School Kits, Baby Care Kits and Fabric Kits were distributed to 30,600 Peruvians across the country in order to alleviate some of the financial constraints that families find themselves under. In addition to being practical, the quilts and kits will provide a source of comfort, security and hope to those who receive them.

Your quilts and kits provide important necessities to our neighbors around the world, and serve as reminders that they are not alone or forgotten. In the first part of 2016, we also shipped quilts and kits to India, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Tanzania, Honduras, Georgia and Uganda. Prince of Peace Social Ministry

The temple talks on July 24 by Carolyn Wagner and Robin Darago were an impassioned call for everyone to help with the Food for Thought program that will be starting this month and continuing through the school year. This is a coordinated effort between Prince of Peace and Red House Run Elementary School, to provide nutritious food directly and confidentially to five needy students at the school. Carolyn and Robin highlighted the hunger right here in our community, often hidden, that many children come to school with. These children are served two free meals a day when they are in school, but weekends can be problematic. That is where Food for Thought comes in – to provide food over the weekend for the most needy children, as chosen by the school counselor and the principal, and put it in a handy sack that goes directly into their backpack.

Our congregation will collect food, and purchase what is needed outside of what is collected, to make up the sacks with specific kinds of food. Once a month the sacks will be made up and taken to the school, where they will be stored for each week's dispensing through the counselor's office. We have lists of the kinds of food to bring in for this program, just like the lists for the food pantry, to help when you go shopping. Our children may enjoy choosing and bringing in the food, too, as they are often compassionate about the needs of others their age.

This program is being operated as an extension of the Food Pantry that continues to provide supplemental food to over thirty families each month. The pew envelopes provide an easy way to make contributions to the Food Pantry fund. That way we can purchase what we need to make up the difference between donated food and what is needed for the weekly food bags and the Food for Thought backpacks. We know we can count on the generosity of our congregation to make it work. God bless you for this!



Food for Thought

Our Food Pantry is running strong, helping about 30 families per month in our area with bags of food. This program will continue. Now, The Food Pantry has discovered another way we can make a difference in our community, partnering with Red House Run Elementary School. It is a program called Food for Thought, where we give a backpack of food to a needy child at Red House Run Elementary at the end of each week. This backpack will feed the child for the entire weekend, 2 breakfasts, 2 lunches, 2 dinners and snacks. PoP will sponsor 5 needy children per week, completely confidentially. Only the school counselor and principal will know to whom the backpacks are going. I have watched this program be extremely successful the past school year, and I know it is time Prince of Peace got involved. We are asking for donations of individual, serving size, shelf stable foods.

This food is approved by Baltimore County Public Schools. Approved food lists are available in your bulletin and in the Narthex, along with a sample of our backpack. We will have yellow flyers in the bulletin at the 1st of each month as a reminder about the foods we need, so donations can be brought for packing near the 20th of the month. We will pack once per month, and drop the 20 backpacks off to Red House Run for distribution.

Sign-up sheet for food donations will be in the Narthex, but anyone can bring food in at any time. Monetary donations will also be accepted through the envelopes in the pew. Designate Food Pantry on your envelope. Each backpack costs about \$10 to put together, so I urge you to please donate for the children.

In Baltimore County alone, there are 3,100 students in the public school system who fall into the category of "homeless and in desperate need." During the school week, these students have access to at least two meals each day; however, on weekends and extended breaks from school, these students are not guaranteed access to food. They are "food insecure," that is, their access to nutritious food is chronically unstable.

Food for Thought is an affiliation of organizations whose goal is to address student food insecurity in Baltimore County Public Schools through direct service (weekend) backpacks.

Currently Food for Thought services 53 students in more than 7 county schools. Prince of Peace will be the first church to support this program in the Northeast Area of the county, but most importantly here in Rosedale. I could continue to share statistics with you that relate to all of Baltimore County Public Schools, but let's be honest we need to hear about our children, living in our neighborhoods. At

Red House Run ES just up the street on Weyburn Road, over 63% of our children qualify for either free or reduced meals. That number can be shocking to some of us that live here in Rosedale. Please understand that there are only a handful of children who we believe truly need this program. The fact is that even a small amount of children who go hungry is still too many.

The stories of students gathering food from the lunchroom to take home with them or the child who carried an empty lunchbox back and forth to the cafeteria because they were either too embarrassed or didn't know how to ask for help. Having to watch a parent ask for the leftover food from a holiday party because they didn't know how they were going to feed their family during the extended break, was absolutely heartbreaking.

These stories are our students, the kids we see waiting at the bus stop, the kids who are at recess playing with our children and grandchildren. As the saying goes, "It takes a village to raise a child", WE are the village. We are the educators, neighbors, church family and fellow parents. What can we do to help? It's simple, please help us fill these backpacks, so that our Rosedale children get the nutrition and stability that they need to not go hungry on the weekends.
