#### James 1:19-20a NIV

My dear Brothers and Sisters, take note of this: Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak, and slow to become angry because human anger does not produce the righteousness that God desires.

Gabe said "You are more likely to regret what you say when you are angry, than when you are calm."

#### Proverbs 18:17 NLT

## Read 1 John 1:8NIV

8If we claim to be without sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us.

How does claiming you are without sin make you quicker to anger?

## Read Proverbs 15:1 NLT

A gentle answer deflects anger, but harsh words make tempers flare.

How can a gentle answer be deflective and how can it be preventative? Which way do you hang the toilet paper?

# Read Matthew 5:22b NIV

Anyone who says to a brother or sister, 'Raca,'[d] is answerable to the court. And anyone who says, 'You fool!' will be in danger of the fire of hell.

Why is Jesus so serious about insulting others?

Can you think of any examples of expressing your critiques as desires? Do you think this would help you be slower to anger if someone expressed their critiques as desires instead of doing the opposite?

What can you do this week to communicate for a change?
