From the Desk of Pastor David Maxfield

Dear Friends in Christ,

February 14 brings together two seemingly opposite celebrations—Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday. **Valentine's day** is a day for love and chocolate, for flowers and chocolate, for Hallmark cards and chocolate and oh yeah did I mention chocolate?

Ash Wednesday seems discordant and out of place, sort of like wearing a polka dot tie with a plaid coat. It is somber as we begin the 40 day journey of Lent. Its symbol is not heart but a smudge-a cross shaped smudge" and its slogan? *Remember you are dust, to dust you shall return.*

So what does Valentine's day and Ash Wednesday have in common?

Valentinius was a Christian who lived in Rome in the 3rd century. Although many legends and stories have been associated with him this much we know. He was a lover of God and highly regarded by the emperor. They had a falling out when Valentine tried to convert the emperor. Thrown into prison he was sentenced to death. There he had conversations with the jailor's daughter. On the day of his execution, he left a hand written note simply signed "your Valentine" By the end of the century roses became associated Valentine and the day-February 14— was set aside to remember his martyrdom and faithfulness to Christ. Over time he became known as the saint of lovers, of engaged and married couples. Over the centuries February 14 became a feast day and in the early 20th century became Valentine's celebrating love, roses (and chocolate-especially chocolate chip cookies)

Ash Wednesday and Lent have their origins in early second century Christianity. Originally adults (and their families) who desired to be baptized into the faith went through an extended time of teaching called the Catechumenate. During this time they were a part of worship but excused from the assembly when it was time to share the Lord's Supper. Baptisms occurred on the eve of Easter and the 40days prior to this life-changing immersion were set aside as a time of prayer, fasting and doing works of compassion and mercy. Baptized Christians also took on these disciplines as a way of preparing for the celebration of the Resurrection. The ashes of Ash Wed have their origins in the Jewish burial ritual as a little dust was sprinkled over the body as it was laid in the tomb, and the mourners would sprinkle a handful of dirt over their heads to remind them of their own mortality.

So?

Well, lets see if we can tie the two together. We could begin with saying that Love, although known in life has its origin, its heart beat in God. Remember the verse *Everyone who loves is born of God.*.. for God is love. (I John 4:7-8). We also know that the deepest, most profound love is discovered in the mystery of giving, of sacrifice of the self for another (See John 3:16 and John 15:13). Valentinius, as a witness to the love of God in Christ was willing to give his life for the one who called him beloved in his Baptism. As he listened and taught the jailor's daughter about the mystery of God's love in Jesus his note was a final act of friendship, prayer and yes of love.

So this year as I celebrate the love Margaret and I have shared for *almost a long time* I marvel at this journey of life and how something as wonderful, ordinary, joyful and frustrating (*yes we have our ups and downs*) is the very place we learn about life, love and if we are attentive—a bit of the heart of the One who is Love. All of this this year with a smudge on the forehead reminding me of the gift and limits of life, but in the Cross, Love is eternal.

Gathered in the *Prayers Around the Cross* we have the opportunity to bring our lives and the lives of those we love together with the needs, joys of the world into the healing presence of God

Supper will be serviced in the Fellowship Hall Wednesday night at 6 PM during Lent.

Prayer Around the Cross is a meaningful devotional prayer service that was originally developed at Holden Village. Holden is an intergenerational retreat next to the Glacier Peak Wilderness Area in Washington State. It is a contemplative service filled with music, scripture and silence. It stems from the ancient and emerging worship movement with a Post-Modern component. It is sort of Holden's response to Taize' style worship. Worshippers can either sit in their pews or come up to the cross, light a votive candle, sit or stand and pray and meditate while music is played or silence is observed. Please join us for this special time of meaningful and engaging worship.



A Monthly Update from the Synod Office

Witnesses of the Gospel...

As I write this (mid-January) a group of people from Western North leave for the Central African Republic. We hope to share word from these witnesses of the Gospel in coming months.

Rev. Janis Sloka, Executive Director of Camp of the Cross has a long standing relationship with Campamento Luterano Eduardo Roig near Dorado, Puerto Rico. He along with seven others who have a connection to Camp of the Cross made the trek to help with hurricane recovery work. We thank God for their efforts and look forward to learning more from them.

Meanwhile, Rev. Taryn Montgomery, Bread of Life, Minot is spending a little over a week visiting our companion church – the Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Central African Republic. Through her visit she will get a chance see the ministries partner with in CAR. We look forward to learning more from her upon her return.

Plan to Attend...

Unhealthy conflict in a congregation undermines the proclamation of the Good News of Jesus Christ, that is a fact. One of the ways to avoid unhealthy conflict is to be clear about your congregation's purpose, according to Rev. Dr. Peter Steinke. Steinke has spent his career working with congregation's in conflict, writing about creating healthy congregations and teaching around these areas.

We are glad to welcome Dr. Steinke to Western North Dakota for an afternoon workshop at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Bismarck on Sunday, February 11th from 2:00pm until 5:00pm. The cost is \$10 per person. This is an incredible opportunity to learn from an excellent teacher – we hope to see you there.

Synod Council to Meet...

Your synod council meets February 9th and 10th at Christ Lutheran in Minot. If there are issues you want discussed please let me know. Also, a reminder – the deadline for submitting resolutions for this year's synod assembly is March 31st. Contact Faith Simonieg if you have questions about the process of bringing forward resolutions.

Staffing Reorganization...

Some changes are in the works for the structure of synod staff. A decision has been made to outsource much of the bookkeeping work for the synod. This move is being made to reduce staffing costs within the synod but will result in loss of long time employee Monroe Madson.

Monroe has faithfully served as the synod's Financial Administrator – always doing his best to oversee the gifts shared with the synod from individuals and congregations. He will continue to work in the office through mid-February. I am thankful for his servant's heart.

This means that duties will shift within the office and that we will be bringing on a new part-time position. As with any change there will be a learning curve and we ask that you be patient with us as we engage this new staffing pattern.

At the same time staff is looking closely at the synod's budget to make sure that we are best positioned to continue to provide for face to face contact with congregations. While Mission Support has been consistent it has not kept pace with inflation and rising costs.

What am I reading...

From time to time I am asked what I am reading. Here is what I am spending time with now:

-Original Blessing: Putting Sin in its Rightful Place by Danielle Shroyer. In this Fortress Press book, Shroyer argues that the concept of original sin was an add on to the Christian faith several hundreds years after the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. Instead she argues that scripture instead speaks of original blessing, being beloved one of God.

-The Agile Church: Spirit Lead Innovation in an Uncertain Age by Dwight Zscheile. Written by a Luther Seminary Professor, this book does an excellent joy of describing the sociological changes impacting the church today.
