What is "Normal"?

The "new normal" is an expression that is used quite frequently to describe current realities of living in a world affected by a pandemic, being socially distanced from each other, unable to spontaneously drop by an elderly neighbor for a visit, societal unrest, looming national elections, parents and guardians working extra hours as de facto home school teachers, the uncertainty of what is yet to come. Then we come across a Bible verse like 1 Thess. 5:18: "...give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you"... and wonder. Is it even possible to feel thankful in those circumstances? Consider these three things: 1) when Paul wrote those words, it was after he was forced to leave the city of Thessalonica under cover of darkness because of a violent mob opposition to the Gospel. He was, in effect, socially distanced from his Thessa-Ionian brothers and guite frustrated by that situation. He did something about it: he sent Timothy to exhort and assess their spiritual welfare. 2) God is omniscient and is not "caught by surprise" by the things that disrupt our "old normal"; 3) God is sovereign and we can rest on His word and not give into fear "though the earth gives way, though the mountains be moved into the heart of the sea..." (Psalm 46:2). Just picture this scenario for a moment. When our circumstances change, we can always look for opportunities to help further His kingdom. One such opportunity is the ministries and services we now have online: The ILC reports having students attending from far flung places. Our Wednesday Night Bible study/Discipleship training frequently receives guests from Gainesville, south Florida and Atlanta. These blessings come our way when we're willing to invest in prayer for and outreach to those God has placed in our sphere of influence. Even in the "new normal", even in a time of leadership transition. the Great Commission and Great Promise endure. That is exciting. That's something for which we can be very thankful.
