## CONGO MISSIONARIES HERE MARCH 21

Please join us as we welcome Glen and Rita Chapman for the first time to FBCC. Missionaries to the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Glen and Rita live at the remote mission's station our mission's team visited in 2010.



Wednesday night March 21, 7:00 P.M. we will gather together in the worship center. Our youth ministry praise team will lead us in worship and we will have the opportunity hear what God is doing in Kikongo. Rita makes the best dried caterpillars I have ever eaten, maybe she'll bring some!

The Chapmans keep some unique animals in their backyard including crocodiles, an antelope that looks like a miniature deer, two exotic birds and the only known Congo clawless otter in captivity. While it might sound like they care for these animals for fun they are actually using them as an ongoing lesson of conservation for the locals.

Glen and Rita Chapman train Congolese students and their spouses, preparing them for ministry in their hometown in the rural environment. Glen teaches pastoral students at the Kikongo Pastor's Institute where he is professor of Old Testament, African religions, and Baptist distinctives. I had the privilege of teaching a couple of classes at the institute as well as speaking to the pastors and their wives.

Glen also projects evangelistic movies as well as educational videos on medical and health issues such as malaria, HIV, dysentery, etc. in the rural areas where he travels by boat. He has now envisioned a new means of transportation, using a PPC (powered parachute) flight which would take only 3 hours to reach the villages as opposed to 3 days. Both Angela and I were taken on rides by Glen on the PPC which was an amazing experience.

A PPC can carry 2 people at a time, plus luggage/cargo, so it is a good means of getting medical supplies to the interior clinics in a timely manner, which is particularly vital during vaccination campaigns as it is crucial to get the vaccines out faster without damage caused by the high temperature.

Rita directs and teaches at the Women's School. She continues to develop and improve course materials for the pastors' wives. She teaches illiterate women to read, and also serves as an active member and counselor of the parish women's fellowship. Jackie was able to teach sewing skills to the ladies over a couple of days at the school.

Please plan to join us as we encourage Congo missionaries and hear more stories of God's amazing work in the DRC.

## DOWN ON THE FARM - HOGS AND HOPE

Up to my elbows in quilt pieces, I'm a bit aggravated when the ringing phone breaks my concentration. Setting a stack of fabric down, I growl "Hello" into the mouthpiece.

"We've got a pig out." My husband's aggravation filters through the receiver along with his unspoken plea for help.

"Where?"

"Sheep pasture, below the manure pile." (Landmarks are always helpful!)

"I'll be down in a minute." My attitude switches from grumpy to goget-um in a flash.

Of all our animals, pigs are the hardest to corral. They turn on a dime and give you change and explode from a standstill to an all-out-run faster than you can say pork chop. Today we're more blessed than usual. Our truant porker is anxious to join his friends and allows us to herd him back to their pen with a minimum of chasing.

Once contained, the next step is to find where the pig escaped. Since we use an electric wire around their pen, this is the first thing we check. Mike barely gets through the gate when he hollers, "Grab me a pitchfork, will you? I've got to get the dirt they dug up off the wire."

Retrieving the implement and returning, I see just how much our five pigs have changed their pasture since May. The acreage they're on looks like it has been plowed. rocks have been moved and new ones dug up. Several stumps are substantially smaller than before. The dark brown soil is exposed where a green pasture used to be.

"Wow. They sure have been busy." I offer as I pass the pitchfork over the fence.

Pigs love dirt and the worms, grubs, bugs, minerals and vitamins they unearth contribute to their healthy diet. If their well rounded bellies are any indication, they've been busy munchers.

"Yeah," says Mike. "They've flipped strips of sod over the hot wire all the way around the pasture. Go unplug the charger and I'll get the electricity working again. Don't want to have to chase pigs again tomorrow."

"Okay, I'll head back to the house and put some fresh coffee on."

Trudging back up the hill, pondering the pros and cons of raising pigs, I suddenly realize the torn up pasture is actually an unexpected blessing. It had been overgrown on one end with blackberries. Thistles had taken over another section. Rocks and stumps littered the whole hillside. The pigs had loosened rocks, eaten the blackberry roots, torn up the weeds and given us an opportunity to replant with a better grade of grass seed.

How often, I wonder, have I faced some unexpected change with resentment or resistance, seeing only the down side of the situation? Have I missed seeing the blessings that were attached to those changes? I know in my "BC" (before Christ) days, I would not have seen the positives. During the "AC" years, God has helped me to see the blessings.

Within my first two years as a Christian, I lost my job, developed several muscle spasms in my back and despaired over problems with both my teenage children. The blessings? I discovered my newfound church

family was there to listen, counsel and pray with and for me. I learned to pray for my family in ways I hadn't thought of before. God provided a temporary job where the manager was a Christian woman who was willing to let me work standing up if I needed to.

Just as the pig tore up the pasture, life circumstances chewed up my life. The blessing is that it opened my eyes to seeing new beginnings with a Heavenly Father whose plans were bigger than I could ever imagine.

Although I didn't understand all of this immediately, it became apparent God was working and I could trust him. The love, prayer and comfort offered by other Christians encouraged me to keep moving forward spiritually. I felt assured the choice I'd made to accept Christ overshadowed the changes the world threw at me.

For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. Jeremiah 29:11NIV

I have hope.



## Mission of the Month

Our church has a long-standing relationship with Camp Bethel. For many years our children, youth and adults have attended Camp Bethel. Several members of our church have directed camps or served as camp staff, and several have served on the Camp Bethel Board (there are presently 3).

We have held Men's Retreats, Women's Retreats, and Family Camps at Camp Bethel. We have been a major supporter of the camp for many years.

Camp Bethel is located north of Hoquiam, on Kirkpatrick Road between Copalis Crossing and Humptulips. The original section of camp lies between Kirkpatrick Road and Damon Lake. It includes a large lodge with a recreation room, seven cabins, a bath house, RV spaces, a large athletic field, and hiking trails. The lake is good for boating and fishing. Across the road is the retreat center, staff lodging, garages, sheds and trails to the Humptulips River, which

is good for rafting, swimming and fishing.

Last April a 62 acre farm was added to the camp property. It included a large farmhouse which is now the director's home, several outbuildings, lots of pasture, and a lot more river shoreline. Last summer we were able to introduce horseback riding at a youth camp, and plan to have it available at all three youth camps this summer. We are presently developing a paint ball course to be available year round.

What can you do to help this invaluable ministry? Certainly you can contribute dollars, there is never enough to do all that we want to do. You can volunteer at camp on various projects, work parties, camp maintenance or volunteer staff. You can go to www.escrip.com on your computer and search for Camp Bethel. 

### Then Sings my Soul



150 all time favorite hymns and the story behind them. Did you know? Little Brown Church in the Vale was no longer in Fredericksburg, Iowa where it was when the words were written but now is alongside highway 218 in the town of Bradford in northern Iowa.

Did you know? It Is Well With my Soul was written after the author lost a fortune in real estate during the Chicago fire. About this same time his four year old son succumbed to scarlet fever. Two years later is 1873 he decided to take his wife and four daughters to Europe and at the last minute he couldn't go. The ship Library

collided with another ship and went down. The 226 fatalities included all four of his daughters. His wife was one of 47 survivors and sent him a two word cable. "Saved Alone"

On the way to meet his wife he prayed "It is well; the will of God be done". He wrote the words to the song a little later.




### **Thunder Dog**


Thinking about membership at FBCC? That's fantastic! Membership at FBCC is a pretty big deal. That's not because we think members are


