Pastor's Message

Some people have questioned the history of Halloween. Many claim it is a pagan holiday. It is, in fact, not a pagan holiday. Albeit abbreviated, here's why:

It all starts with All Saints' Day. In the first three centuries after Christ's resurrection, the lives of the martyrs of the Church were commemorated on the day and in the place where they were killed. During this time, a special day being dedicated for the commemoration of all saints began too. November 1st was just the day chosen around or before 800 AD.

OK, so what does this have to do with Halloween? In the Bible the day begins at sundown or evening. This is why we have Christmas Eve. Halloween is All Hallows' Eve', that is, All Saints' Evening. Halloween is the beginning of All Saints' Day starting at sundown on October 31st.

Claims that Halloween has its origins in the Celtic festival of Samhain (pronounced Sow-in) are false. The celebration of All Saints' Day didn't originate in Ireland or any other area populated by Celts or their descendants. All Saints' Day started in the Middle East in the first few centuries of the Church. Also, the particular day chosen doesn't have any significance to the Celts or Samhain. Samhain was a Lunar festival of harvest, which means that it can vary up to a month. Samhain taking place on October 31st would only happen once every 30 years. The Christian Church didn't get Halloween/All Saints' Day from the pagans, the pagans are trying to claim that Christians stole it from them.

Then why would there be claims to undermine this holiday?

All Saints' Eve (Halloween) and All Saints' Day have a special place in the commemoration of the Christian Church because of the Reformation. It was on October 31st, Halloween, that Martin Luther posted his 95 Theses on the door of the church at Wittenberg, Germany. It was on that date he chose to challenge the corruption in the official church about the notion that salvation in Christ could be bought with money or works. All Saints are saved by grace, through faith, revealed by God's Word in Christ. It was on that date that the Church of Jesus Christ began to return to the authority of Scripture alone over the traditions and will of man. It was on that date that the Church began to return to salvation by grace through faith in Christ alone.

It should not be surprising that Satan and the World have gone to such extremes to defile Halloween with anything that would distract Christians and the unbelievers from this.

Most of the traditions of Halloween are not even a problem in and of themselves. And if there are pagan claims to these traditions, they are usually a lie.


Carved vegetables, particularly pumpkins, with candles inside, called Jack o' Lanterns, are an American invention of the mid-1800s. The term referred to the man a town hired to keep the street lamps lit through the night.

Haunted houses started in the early 1970's in Cincinnati, Ohio where the Jaycees (Junior Chambers of Commerce) introduced them as a way to keep kids entertained on Halloween.


Thanksgiving Eve Worship

- 3. Minutes from June's meeting was reviewed. Motion by Jim Wegner to accept as written, 2nd by Gene Stengel, motion passed.
- 4. Financial/Designated reports from August were reviewed. A question was raised regarding cutting expenses. This will be considered in upcoming budget meetings for next year. It is noted there is not much to cut. People who give money into Thrivent mentioned they do want it used. It has been used for the checking account if falls below a certain point. And money will come out for some of the parking lot repairs, resurfacing and painting. Motion to accept by Dennis, 2nd by Molly, motion passed.

Trick-or-treating comes from the Middle Ages (1300s to 1500s) where the church or the poor would go from door to door to beg. In some places these beggars would sing or perform in order to get gifts of money or food. While this happened every day of the year, they were particular active on holidays. In Shakespeare's 1593 play The Two Gentlemen of Verona, the character Speed accuses his master of "puling (whimpering or whining) like a beggar at Hallowmas." That's all Hallows' Eve.

Wearing costumes on Halloween is first known in Scotland in 1895 and in the United States in 1911.

Halloween, Reformation Day, All Saints' Day are very special days of the year for the Christian Church. Go in peace and enjoy your holiday, knowing that Halloween is indeed a Christian holiday and come to Church the first Sunday in November to celebrate All Saints' Day!
