Pastor's Message

A rich, young man asked Jesus a seemingly simple theological question: "Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus responded, "You know the commandments: Don't murder, don't commit adultery, don't steal..."

This is one of those places where your eyebrow comes up. It seems like Jesus answered the question wrong. Jesus' answer to, "How do I inherit eternal life?" is a list of commands? Did Jesus forget about grace?

Now, the young man believed that he had kept the commandments, but Jesus responded, "Go, sell everything you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven." And the rich, young man walked away. Sad.

As we share the message of the Scriptures, we have the same difficult choice that Jesus faced. What words do we share? The use of God's Word in the Bible can be broken down into two things — Law and Gospel. The great art for the Christian is distinguishing Law and Gospel. In short, you point those who are secure in their sins to the Law so that they may know their sin, and you point those who are despairing over their sins to the Gospel so that they may be comforted by God's grace in Jesus Christ.

The rich, young man was arrogant in judging his ability to keep the Law, and he needed to hear a word that would bring him back to reality and realize his sin. He was gravely attached to his wealth, which was a great source of pride as well as comfort and pleasure. He must recognize his sin, so the Law is given to him.

The young man's response to Jesus's words wasn't surprising. In fact it's all too common a response even centuries later. Christianity, numerically speaking, is in a decline. Everyday, people are walking away from their faith. Many walk away like the young man, arrogant enough to believe that they are good enough on their own.

And Jesus let the story end. That was really the end. There is no follow up with this man ... no personal visits, phone calls, e-mails or texts that offer grace. The final scene was the lingering sting of the Law.

The disciples on the other hand responded much differently to Jesus' conversation with the young man. Jesus' preaching of Law led the disciples to ask the question, "Well, who then can be saved?" This is the point. The Law did its work for the disciples; they recognized their inability

The Law did its work for the disciples; they recognized their inability to measure up to God's demands. They knew that what they had to offer would never be enough.

So the disciples needed a different word. The disciples didn't need words that condemned. They didn't need more rules and laws. They didn't need "Seven Steps to a Life of Discipleship." They needed the Gospel.

If you feel the sting of the Law, know that you are not alone, but also know that there's a point to it. You need the Law in order to know the Gospel. You need to know you are a sinner in order to understand that Christ died for your sins. And that's the point of Lent: we face our sinfulness so that we may repent and claim the victory of Easter.


