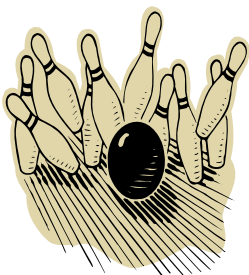

## MISSION TRIP REPORT - Excerpt from "Now That We Are Home" - Posted July 20th

When we were in Galveston this week, we went into inner city neighborhoods and worked with a mission group called Galveston Urban Ministries (GUM). GUM taught us they have three concepts to guide and develop the community: 1) Engaging the community, 2) Equipping the church and the local community to serve, 3) Empowering programs that are holistic.

The things this mission group taught us – 1) LOVE is a choice. 2) The only difference between us and anyone else is where we were born. 3) Almost every situation there is a reason for it, we were encouraged to ask the question WHY?

Mentally, I believe this was the hardest mission trip I have ever completed. I went outside of my comfort zone a lot this week. In the mornings we did physical work while in the afternoons we worked Street Camps with local children of all ages. Were able to make connections in sharing our faith, hope, and love with them. On Thursday afternoon we were challenged with a "scavenger hunt" list which put us in the streets with people of this community and with the homeless.

I will never see Galveston in the same way again. I will always see the side of town where this community is and will always remember these people, homeless or not, are the same as you and I, only born and living in a different town than I do. My challenge to you: next time you see a homeless person on the corner begging for money, take a moment to show them God's love.

## Moment's Reflection

At our church's July Board meeting I closed my report by sharing some times in the last few weeks when I'd seen Christ. I said, "I don't ask myself that question often enough—'Where have I seen Christ today?' But it's a deeply spiritual question and so, in the midst of things to do, I trained my eyes to see, ears to hear." I was amazed by what I saw.

In all his life Laymon Christian wasn't a member here. Probably never came to Sunday worship. But for the last thirty years he's come to our church to attend AA meetings. When he died recently his AA friends asked if they could use our church to have a memorial service for him. As I worked on Sunday's sermon in the relative quiet of my office, I could hear some of the music they played to remember his life. And then snippets of kind words. And laughter. And finally the sounds of caring fellowship. I always hope people will come to church, but I saw Christ the Thursday afternoon Laymon Christian's friends came to celebrate his life.

A week or two before this year's Vacation Bible School, we leaders gathered to think together about ways to care for our kids, especially the ones that need extra attention. We were concerned that some of our little ones had needs so great that we wouldn't be able to help them in right ways. Midweek of VBS, as I sat there eating dinner, I looked up and saw a child dart through the building. He had a big smile on his face. He was enjoying himself. We'd succeeded in creating a loving, safe place for that child. And I saw Christ.

We gathered to hear Casey recite her ordination vows, July 13<sup>th</sup>. The presiding minister preached to set the meaning of the moment. He spoke from many years of having served the Church. As he spoke I remembered when he and I had begun our similar walks of ministry. Young men back in those days. But now I was struck by how much older we'd become. Then, I saw her kneel at the altar to receive our prayers of blessing. She was young, and vibrant, and I was overwhelmed by how wonderful it is that God's Kingdom call continues to impress each new generation. Seeing her, only just beginning; seeing him passing the baton, I was struck by Isaiah's words, "My word shall not return to me empty, but shall accomplish all that purpose." I saw Christ in all His resurrection glory.

Holly served our church faithfully many years as secretary. She was the first voice people heard, the first person so many saw when they came to our church. But life turned hard for her. And in the blink of an eye she made some decisions she deeply regrets. And yet, rather than cast stones of judgment, I was struck by how loving and kind and generous so many church members were to her, giving to help her despite her mistakes. And in each of those acts of loving-kindness, I saw Christ.

I was making a call to one of our church's most venerated members. She's been sick. She fell recently and is down on her back. In the course of our conversation I learned that acts of ministry were being done for her, many of them behind the scenes. Quietly. Generously. Mercifully. And again I saw Christ.

I'm packing my bags as I write this article. Jenny and I are heading for a travel adventure to the great Northwest (Washington and then Canada and parts around). We planned this trip back in the first days of Jenny's cancer treatments. So much good has happened since those first days of diagnosis. Strength. Healing. Peace that passes understanding. Many kind people (you) willing to do kind things for us. Perseverance that surprised even us. We've seen many glimpses of Christ in the past year. Now, as we set out on this week's adventure, as we look to work alongside you in what promises to be a great year of ministry, we expect to see Christ yet again.
