

Christianity and Immigration



The Bible is filled with references and guidance for dealing with “strangers” who live among us. Jesus was a refugee, taken by his parents to Egypt shortly after his birth to escape the wrath of Herod. Today, our country faces an immigration crisis—from border security to unaccompanied minor children to paralysis in Congress to cities and counties taking immigration matters into their own hands. How are Christians to respond to these profound circumstances?

The Families and Professionals group will join together for a combined Sunday School class in the chapel during the month of September to strengthen relationships and share study and discussion about the difficult issue of immigration. Some of this gathering time will be led by a special guest speaker, Chris Kelley. Chris is the author of *I Was a Stranger: Hope for a Hidden World* (Brown Books, 2008), the memoir of Feliberto Pereira, Founder and Executive Director of Southwest Good Samaritan Ministries of Los Fresnos, TX. Chris currently works as a Dallas-based strategic communications consultant, is a member of Northway Christian Church, and serves on the North Texas Area (DOC) Board. He also currently serves as communications director for two organizations active in immigration-related programs at SMU. Previously Chris served as Editor of Dallasnews.com, the website of the Dallas Morning News, where he rose to the executive ranks before leaving to start his consultancy.

A Moment's Reflection

There's a reason moderate thinkers frustrate us: in a polarized world of black and white thinkers, moderates seem so irritatingly indecisive.

Take Ferguson, Missouri, for instance. Missouri, for heaven's sake. Not Harlem, or Haight-Ashbury, or Detroit. Missouri. Heartland. Midwest. The nation's northern outskirts of the Bible Belt. Farm, folks, and family fun. Missouri. The Show-Me state.

Frankly, I don't like what Missouri has been showing me. I've been watching the nightly news and honestly, when I see what's going on in the streets of Ferguson I can't tell if I'm watching something from Ukraine, Syria, Iraq, or some other troubled country region of the world.



I don't know all the specifics. I'm not sure any of us ever will. The event has become deeply politicized. But the words that reporters use to describe the events there evoke disturbing images: tear gas, armored vehicles, autopsy reports, rubber bullets, Molotov bombs, barricades, protestors, "shots fired," stand-off, mustard gas. Good heavens. I remember the riots following Martin Luther King's assassination. The killings at Kent State. Watts. The protests in Chicago outside a national convention. But those were the 60's. I thought we'd grown up from all that.

I'm showing my bias, of course. I'd rather see peace than disturbance. Orderliness and not social anomie. Restraint and not protest. I tend to give the benefit of the doubt to police, not fallen teenagers. I think there had to be a reason. And I see no justification for burning buildings.

And that's why we probably need a few good moderates. No matter our distaste for the violence in Ferguson, there are two sides to the story. Maybe not to what happened to 18-year-old Michael Brown last week, but perhaps the tension that's been building over many weeks, months, years, between black and white, richer and poorer, in that community. And the only way the mess there will ever get resolved is if both sides believe they're heard. Coercion and military police presence aren't working. Protesting and looting aren't working. And so now what?

I was struck by something Missouri's governor, Jay Nixon, told reporters last night. He said the situation in Ferguson requires a careful, delicate, but necessary balance of peace and justice, and then added that unless both prevail, none of us will get either. And I think what he meant to say is: the violence in the streets of Ferguson may be a conflict of two core values. There's a need for peace—for the violence and lawlessness to end. But there's also a need for justice—the right of angry citizens to give expression to their 1st amendment right to free speech.

A couple of years ago our church experienced a similar clash of core values. What grew out of that particular conflict is something today we call the Safe Church Committee. The history behind that committee's birth was an emotional debate over which core value was most important: safety of our children, or unconditional grace for all people.

In retrospect, most of us can see that both values matter to the Church. Both have biblical precedence. Both represent Christian sensibility. And yet, at the time, many of us felt constrained to choose one or the other.

And here perhaps is the value of moderation. Here is the Christian need, I believe, to see both sides. Peace and justice. Safety and grace. In any argument it'd be so much easier, and perhaps more expedient, to impose one value on the other. And yet, the history of human discord seems to suggest that mutual understanding is the only way conflicts get resolved. —Dan
