This newsletter is designed both to keep the congregation inspired and informed regarding the information and outcomes from the Deacon's Council, Leadership Council, strategic planning activities and other pertinent ministries and events that relate to the life of our church. To be sure, many things about which we have spoken in good faith in the past are now coming to fruition; namely, this monthly newsletter, which you are now reading. I believe that the New Year has started out quite well and the prospects for the future are bright. Now, let's "Get God's House in Order: Setting a New Standard!" (1 Timothy 3:14-15) by communicating with one another openly and honestly and working together faithfully and diligently for the common ministry of our church *ad majorem Dei gloriam* ("to the greater glory of God")!

**Deacon's Council**

Besides the regular ministry reports, three important outcomes from the Deacon's Council are: 1) transparency and disclosure of finances. This means that we will start in March with our first *quarterly* Church Business Meeting. All members are invited to attend and should do so as part of their duty as members. 2) The Council decided that on odd months the men would serve communion on UNITY SUNDAY and the women on even months. 3) In the coming year the diaconate ministry's continuing education workshop will engage the text, *Essential Servants: Reflections on the Caring Ministry of Deacons* by Fred Swartz in order to be more adequately prepared servants for the church.

**Leadership Council**

1) Sister Debra Rosby, finance chair, presented the 2013 budget, which included significant cutbacks and adjustments so that we might meet our financial goals for the year. All ministry leaders were informed of the budget adjustments. 2) As a part of the effort to stay afloat during these hard economic times a system of **pledging** among the leaders will begin early this year and in the coming months presented to the membership. Pledging in short involves each member making a committed pledge of his/her giving for the year on a weekly or monthly basis. In this way, the finance committee can have assurance of monthly income and better track the budget. We will also have in the future fiscal seminars and workshops for congregants on money management and on making final preparations. 3) Finally, our **Strategic Coordinator**, Sis. Linda Caples, presented the process of kicking off our strategic aims (more to come!) with a number of case study styled questions, which she called, "Ministry Scenarios." For example, what does a ministry leader do if: "A financially stable member does not pay annual ministry dues of \$25.00?" Or also, "Two members of a ministry group have a disagreement outside of church and when they arrive to the meeting, it is still not resolved and causes tension in the meeting." These are real life experiences and your leaders are preparing themselves for the challenge of not only actualizing the strategic plan, but also of becoming more competent leaders.

### **Ten-Year Strategic Plan: “Prospering the Vision – 2013-2023”**

The strategic plan Core Team met this past Monday (January 7<sup>th</sup>) to initiate the first of our strategic aims, which is the development of various handbooks: Policy and Procedures, Leadership, New Members and Ministry Leader handbooks to name a few. There is a need now for all members to get involved in doing their part. This is a “Handbook Heads-Up!” because strategic leaders are certain to come your way “volun-telling” you for work (“*volun-told*” is a new word we learned from our strategic coordinator, Linda Caples). **In Memoriam:**

**John William McKenzie Brady {January 16, 2004 – December 31, 2012}**



My final note is in memoriam to John William McKenzie Brady (“Mackie”), the son of my former Tulane University colleague and brother in Christ, the Reverend Dr. Christian M. M. Brady. Dr. Brady is the Dean of Schreyer Honors College, Pennsylvania State University. In Dr. Brady’s own words:

*“It has barely been over one week since our wonderful boy died [Monday, December 31, 2012]. It was fast, sudden, and completely unexpected. It was not an accident or a prolonged illness, but rather a bacterial infection of the blood. We are thankful for the small grace that he was in very little pain and it was swift. But that is, as they say, cold comfort. We are riven with grief, disbelief, and the fundamental truth that we just want our boy back.”* (<http://targuman.org/blog/2013/01/09/how-to-lament/>)

My heartfelt prayers and condolences go out to my friend and also to Elizabeth and Isabel, his wife and daughter. I lived for six months with Chris and his family after the Katrina hurricane. I shall never forget how they opened their home to me and welcomed me as a member of the family. Mack was just a little guy then, about two years old. He was cautious with me in the beginning, but as I became a familiar fixture around the house he might let me play with him or even venture to sit on my lap for a few moments testing out its possibilities as a periodic place to perch. Following the lead of his big sister, “Izzy” (Isabel), he affectionately called me “Uncle D.” I saw him last in November of 2006 when I had dinner with the Brady’s in Washington, DC at the annual meeting of the Society of Biblical Literature, which was meeting in DC that year. The picture with his father (opposite page) is how he looked now. This is how I remember him –



Mack grew up to become passionate about soccer and his dream was to be the starting keeper for the US National team. He had wonderful friends at school, at church, and on his team The SC Celtics. He has the best parents and sister one could ever imagine. Mack was a third-grade student at Park Forest Elementary School and attended St. Andrew’s Episcopal Church in State College.
