- Missing shingles on 1st Place manse have been replaced.



TEN WAYS TO MAKE YOUR ADVENT



- 1. Turn off your phone or other electronic devices for a certain period of time (you determine what you are comfortable with). Don't put them on silence, literally turn them off like you are on vacation and are unreachable. Always being reachable can tire a soul without you even realizing it.
- 2. Commit to be kind. During this season of giving decide how and where you wish to give. Helping make someone else's Christmas special can go a long way to helping make yours more special as well.
- 3. Schedule time off. Write it in your calendar, schedule it on your phone. Whatever you need to do in order to ensure you get some down time amidst all of the craziness will help you remain energized to accomplish what you truly wish to accomplish. Treat it as an immoveable date as you would an important meeting...it IS important and you are worth it.
- 4. Make soul time a real time. Pick up a devotional, read something online each day. It doesn't have to be long, it just should be consistent. There are lots of resources available, or check with Pastor Lynn for other suggestions.

That's a dangerous approach and often doesn't yield what you were seeking but instead clutters our vision, leaving us feeling let down or disappointed.
- 6. Discover your laugh points. Laughing alleviates stress and is a great way to keep things in perspective. What tickles your funny bone?

- 7. Give yourself a present. Sound crazy? We want others to mystically discern what we most want, but who better to identify our needs than ourselves? You are working hard this season (and others). Treat yourself (it's okay, the world won't come apart). It doesn't have to be big or extravagant (spa time? alone time? lunch with friends?).
- 8. Nourish your soul with music. Christmas music, sacred music, break out the tunes and sing along (or dance, we aren't judging). Music can lift our souls in ways words cannot and put us in touch with the season.
- 9. Come to church. Really. It helps keep the season in perspective and fills you with messages and music that will enrich your soul. It gives you time to gather with your brothers and sisters in Christ and remind you that you are part of God's family and He loves to have you home.
- 10. Put on your armor of peace. People's expectations of you might drive you to do way more than any one person can possibly accomplish, and then they can make you feel badly when you don't meet all of their expectations. Putting on the armor of peace means not owning their expectations, but meeting your own. Set achievable goals. Take time, make time, to celebrate what you have accomplished. Cross things off your list (brings its own sense of satisfaction and is a visible reminder that you are doing a lot). Begin and end each day with prayer, you cannot go wrong with that practice.

Seasons of Change

Fall is such a gorgeous time of the year. Nature's colors are on view in a full array of hues: orange, gold, red, brown, with the remaining green leaves on trees forming a panoply of beauty against an azure sky that often reveals various shades of blue and different tints of gray clouds intermingling with white clouds. This type of landscape, coupled with ever increasing chilly temperatures form a special backdrop for walks where the beauty of the autumnal scene takes one's breath away and provides a moment to pause and contemplate the season that is fast approaching ...winter. That season will



bring frigid temperatures and the stark contrast of glistening white snow on bare brown branches. As the Bible states so eloquently in Ecclesiastes 3:1, "To everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under heaven."

Just as it's hard to escape the changing colors of the leaves during autumn, so it's been impossible for teachers involved in Christian Education in day schools and Sunday Schools not to notice that the number of children who are being exposed to Christian education with regularity is greatly reduced from even a decade ago. Crescent has definitely been hit with this phenomenon, and nowhere has it been more apparent to us than in our Pre-School-2nd Grade age group. There are only 6 children registered for the class. On occasions two to three weeks can pass by without even one child coming to Sunday School. We realize that grandparents do not have the custodial authority to bring their grandchildren to class each week, and some of our registered children live far away from Plainfield, while others are engaged in various activities that meet on Sunday morning. So the Christian Education and Nurture committee paused to contemplate the picture that was emerging and thought that during this season of change, perhaps we should make a change for this particular class, at least for the remainder of the 2018-2019 Sunday School year.

Instead of a weekly Sunday School class for the Pre-school-2nd Grade group that meets from 9:30-10:15 a.m. as our other age groups gather, our littlest students will have three "special" sessions that correspond with Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter. They will gather after church during Coffee Hour. Parents and grandparents can enjoy the class with them, which will include a Bible story, hands-on activity, and some music. Our first "special" session was held on November 25th. We're eager to see how this change works out. In fact, CEN is planning to have a Focus Group at the end of our Sunday School year to get feedback from our parents and grandparents about this particular change, and our program in general.

Remember, this age group will no longer meet weekly at the scheduled Sunday School hour, 9:30-10:15 a.m. Please pray for this season of change that something beautiful will emerge for our youngest children as they gather to explore Christian teaching about Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter.

Sunday November 18th we gave thanks for our furry friends with our CABC Blessing of the Animals (special collection went to the Plainfield Humane Society).



Mission & Outreach

Soup Kitchen Subcommittee

After getting Session approval, members of the Soup Kitchen Subcommittee met on November 6th. Attending were Cindy GaNun, Winnie Neal, Janna Peterson, Janet Ramsey, Pastor Lynn and Pat Fleming. Jo-Ann Bandomer was unable to attend this first meeting.

The Subcommittee discussed and agreed on the traits and skills we would want in our Chef Manager of the Soup Kitchen, now known as" Valarie's Kitchen". These included ServSafe Certification, Leadership/Management/People skills, Cooking skills and menu planning, and knowledge of available food resources for supplying Valarie's Kitchen. We felt we would need this person on site from 8AM to 2PM on Tuesdays, with some off-site work for menu planning, creating shopping lists, ordering food and supplies, etc.

We have reached out to and are in touch with the Placement Officer, Wilma Armstrong, at the Food Service Training Academy (FSTA) of the Community FoodBank of NJ regarding the possibility of one of their graduates providing the Valarie's Kitchen Chef Manager services in exchange for a reduced rental for using our commercial kitchen for their own culinary operation(s), e.g., catering, pastry chef/baking, etc. Wilma is collaborating with Chef Paul Kapner who runs the FSTA and they have 2 possible candidates in mind, but want to discuss our "barter" idea of management services for kitchen use before recommending them.

An extra advantage of getting someone from the FSTA is that they would be aware of the process for obtaining food from the Community Food Bank as well as the types of food items available both for Valarie's Kitchen and the bag lunches. For those of you who attended the Gala on November 10th you can attest to the culinary skills coming out of the FSTA.

Longer range plans include the expansion of the Food Ministry of Crescent beyond Valarie's Kitchen. Towards this end we discussed the possibility of establishing a Board consisting of churches, companies, non-profits and individuals interested in partnering to alleviate hunger issues in the Plainfields.

Starfish

We have changed the usual big Starfish collection the Sunday before Thanksgiving to ask that donations of holiday related foods be made throughout the months of November and December. Collected items will be delivered after Thanksgiving and another delivery, assuming additional contributions, before Christmas. Although we usually do a large collection the Sunday before Thanksgiving we decided there was so much going on this Sunday (Blessing of the Animals, Heifer collection) that it was better to defer the collection for Starfish and spread the collection out over several weeks. We also learned that Starfish has usually already assembled their Thanksgiving baskets before we do our collection, so we felt this would work out better.

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<u>Cameroon</u> – Several of our members from the Cameroon have approached the Mission Committee and Pastor Lynn about doing something to help the people in the Cameroon, however there were no concrete suggestions presented on what assistance to offer or how to proceed with giving it. Pastor Lynn reached out to the Presbyterian Missionaries for the Cameroon asking them for suggestions on how we could offer help. We have now received a response with information regarding a new school that opened to replace one that had to be closed for safety reasons because of conflict in the area where it was located. The Missionaries have provided account information on making donations through the Presbyterian Extra Commitment Opportunity account. Look for information in the coming weeks on how you can support our friends in the Cameroon.

Angel Tree Christmas Project – We decided to do something locally this year and have obtained the names of 25 local needy children from the Salvation Army out of the 1200 names they have collected. Look for the names displayed on the Angel Tree in the Library, select a name or names from the display and purchase the gift requested by the child if possible. Nadia Ayouba - God's mission in Greece

Sharing God's Love with refugee families

Mission co-worker the **Rev. Nadia Ayoub** has accepted a new call to serve refugees and forced migrants in Greece.

"God remembered," she said, explaining that it was in Greece many years ago that she first felt the call to seminary. Now, after decades of mission service, her work has come full circle: Her most recent service, in preschool education among Roma children and their parents in Ukraine, has prepared her to support inclusion of refugees in Greece.



Nadia works with Perichoresis, an organization initially created by the Greek Evangelical Church of Kacerini and the General Synod of the Evangelical Church of Greece to provide relief services for refugees. Currently Perichoresis provides housing and support for 550 refugees in 115 apartments in the city of Kacerini. Nadia serves these families as a preschool worker and translator.

"As I think about God's call to me to serve among the refugees and strangers," Nadia said, "I see I was that stranger not once but many times." She identifies with refugee families who need support because they are frightened and unable to speak the language. "The situations in their homelands must be dire to travel so far, risking their lives and the lives of their children," she said.

"I pray for the ability to serve and strengthen the church's purpose of embracing the stranger," Nadia said. "May God give me ears to hear their real needs."

Jesus answered, 'I am the way and the truth and the life. No one can come to the Father except through me.' John 14:6

Dear Friends and Families,

In the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, the only way to the Father, I greet you from Katerini, Greece. I thank God very much for his love for us and for sending Jesus to show us the way to come back to the Father, know the truth and have life. This is the message that I need to tell over and over again to the many people who ask me, "Why have you come to Greece?"

Dear partners, I thank you so much for your prayers, encouragement and financial support that have enabled me to be in Greece for the past two-and-a-half months. It has been incredibly overwhelming trying to understand the extent of the refugees' needs. And what are these needs? Until now, I knew very little about the situation of the economically impaired Greek people who are trying to help very poor and needy refugees.

As they witnessed the growing refugee crisis on the borders of Greece, members of the Greek Evangelical Church in Katerini recognized it was their Christian duty to help Syrian forced immigrants, and they opened their homes to receive the refugees who fled the war and came to the Greek borders. And then they formed Perichoresis, rented many apartments and brought more refugees from the main refugee camps at the borders. But, it was a bigger commitment than the people of the church could take on alone, so they accepted help from UNHCR (United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees). The refugees receive aid from the UNHR for housing, utilities and living allowances.

Perichoresis serves refugees from Syria and many other countries — Africa, Pakistan, Afghanistan, Palestine, and even Kuwait. Many of these refugees recognize that Greece cannot sustain their families for a long time, so they stay for a short time until they find other countries to go to. This is very difficult for the numerous Greek people who really would like many of these refugees to stay and become integrated into the Greek community. Sadly, as the Perichoresis workers get to know and love the refugees, they leave to go to other countries. That is the discouraging side of this ministry.

By God's grace, I have begun my work in translating for Arabic-speaking refugees at the Katerini hospital. At first, the doctors and the hospital workers were resistant to speaking English, insisting that I speak Greek. I agreed that I need to learn the Greek language, but shared that since helping people is the first priority, it is necessary to speak English until I am more proficient in the specialized Greek vocabulary used in the healthcare field. Though I understand some of it, I even have problems understanding the general Greek language in Katerini. People in Katerini are from Greek-Turkish descent, so the language is a mix of Greek and Turkish. Thank God many doctors, nurses and office workers have agreed to use English.

I have also been asked to join an art class for refugees and women from the Evangelical Church of Katerini that takes place every Monday evening. As we create crafts, we talk and make friends with each other.

On Tuesday evenings, we have family fellowship in one of the Evangelical Church buildings with the cooperation of a group of Christian church leaders from Thessaloniki who are from Egypt, Sweden and Greece. These leaders come every Tuesday from Thessaloniki to Katerini and help teach the Christian faith to refugees. During this time, we explore the Christian faith. The next day at the hospital, when I see the Syrians who attended the meetings, they sometimes ask me questions. One couple shared that they knew this information about Christianity before but wonder what they need to do to be Christian. I replied, "It is your choice to decide if you would like to accept and live by the Christian faith." Other refugees come with questions about their own faith. Mostly I listen to them and let them hear themselves and think about what they asked me. At all times, I leave the door open for them to come back, talk with me and ask more.

The Greek Evangelical Church leaders agreed to sponsor my Greek visa invitation. I have come back to the USA to work with the Greek Council in New York in acquiring a Greek visa. I pray it will be granted in a short time so that I can go back to Katerini, Greece, and help with what the Lord has started there among the refugees.



I thank God that after living in a hotel for my first 20 days in Greece, I was able to move into a fifth-floor apartment. The apartment is in the center of Katerini, near the bus station and a good supermarket, but a little far (about a 20-minute walk) from the Evangelical church where I go to worship on Sunday and attend the Monday class and Tuesday fellowship mentioned above. The apartment is a good size for me, but perhaps because it is old, the plumbing is leaking and all the taps are dripping. I pray I will find a better place, but if not, I will need to do some renovation when I return from my trip to the States.

A little note about the Roma people in Karpatalja, Ukraine: Thanks be to God, the children have started the new school year. There are about 25 children between the ages of three and five in the kindergarten. The afterschool program is going well, supported with funds from Hungary. Pastor Elemer and his family continue to lead family worship for Roma people on Sundays and weekly Bible study in the Roma homes.

Thank you so much for your active partnership through your prayers, encouragement and financial support for my ministry among refugees and forced immigrants. Your support makes it possible for me to be used by the Lord in Greece for God's glory and the welcoming of those considered to be outsiders into God's kingdom.

CAPC -- A History

Our Presbyterian History

The Early Pears

Presbyterians had to decide which side they would join. Our Presbytery of Elizabeth chose the Old School denomination. Now the ministers and churches had to agree or risk expulsion. None defected. However, if members of a church were more in tune with New School thinking, they had only one choice, and 86 members of the Plainfield church made that choice on February 16, 1844 when they asked for letters of dismissal from the First Presbyterian Church of Plainfield, with the intention of organizing a new church.

Their requests were granted, and on March 21, 1844 at 2 p.m. a small group met at the home of Cornelius Boice, next door to the church. He was a church member and a prominent attorney. Two representatives of the New School Presbytery of Brooklyn were present to insure that everything was in order. Thus the church was born, and thus began the history of this people of God.

How difficult it was in a small congregation and a small town of perhaps 1,500 people. Eighteen of the 86 people were among the charter members, some 19 years earlier, of the very church they left. They had Biblical names: Josiah, Ephraim, Abraham, Jeremiah, Job and Hannah.

The action was not precipitous. According to records of First Church, there had been a great deal of discussion prior to the division. One vote taken was to remove the pastor, the Rev. Lewis Bond, suggesting this was a serious matter indeed. He did resign, but later that action was declared unconstitutional by the Presbytery because it had been acted upon by former members already dismissed to the new church. Mr. Bond was reinstated and he remained pastor for 13 more years until his retirement, having served the church for 32 years. He died in his 89th year and one of our pastors paid him tribute with these words: "He lived and died an honorable man." He is buried in the old Presbyterian Cemetery.

Surely the founding of the "Second" Presbyterian church of Plainfield, New Jersey was greatly affected by the New/Old School controversy. Those 86 people did not leave to found an independent church but one that was related to a New School Presbytery. Their desire was to be a Presbyterian Church, and so they became.

As part of the inaugural documents one finds a kind of Declaration of Independence which was printed in their first manual.

"...having been, for various reason and for considerable time, persuaded that (our) own edification and usefulness, and the proper education of (our) children, alike demanded some decisive change in (our) ecclesiastical relationships; and determining to proceed, in effecting it, in a way as much as possible, agreeable to the principles of peace, order, and good neighborhood, (we) asked and received a regular dismission for the purpose of becoming a regular Church of Christ..."

Like the good Presbyterians they were, they proceed to spell out in exquisite detail just what it would mean to be a member of the Plainfield Presbyterian Church.

"...to attend the Sabbath services regularly, punctually, spiritually, devotedly...To stay away on Sabbath afternoon, or Wednesday evening, or from the Preparatory Lecture, or from the monthly concert, or the prayer meeting...is a positive sin...unless you are providentially hindered."

Members were reminded that a rainy day was no excuse for not attending services. Furthermore, if a member was absent from Communion twice in succession, he was to give a satisfactory reason for this neglect, or be "dealt with."

Moreover, this "Manual for the use of members" listed (with appropriate scriptural references) those who would be considered "not worthy communicants." Among eleven proscriptions are these: "All idle persons who pursue no honest employment. All persons who attend places of sinful amusement, theaters, parties, balls, etc. All who are engaged in sinful employment, such as lotteries, gambling in buying or vending tickets. Heads of families who neglect family prayer."

This Manual was written by the first minister, the Rev. William Whittaker, Much of what Rev. Whitaker wrote was couched in the traditional theology and ecclesiasticism of the early 19th century Presbyterianism. Still, it is a remarkable document. He defined what it meant to be a good Christian Presbyterian member of the new church. More interestingly, the Manual sounds more like Old School orthodoxy than anything radical, or even progressive. In short there is nothing in the writing to suggest that these 86 members left their church for doctrinal reasons. Perhaps the question lurking in all of this is: did they get an Old School adherent in Mr. Whittaker when they really wanted someone from the New School?

If progressive theology was not their primary motivation, what was? 'Various reasons' sounds like a nice way to avoid naming names. After all, they said they wanted to do this in an agreeable way. The three specific reasons they do give will have to suffice. They left because they were not being edified; and

because they wanted to be useful, and for the proper education of their children. We must try to read between their lines. It sounds as if the preaching wasn't very inspiring, that their talents were not being properly used, and that they wanted something better for their children.

They apparently left the old church more in sorrow than with rancor. They wanted to do it peacefully. No negative reactions in the mother church are recorded. Not many years later, the third pastor of our church apparently had a good relationship with the now old Mr. Bond. Still later history shows how well the two churches got along, and even had joint services from time to time.

Soon after organizing, the new congregation called The Rev. William Whittaker, an Oxford University graduate, to be its first pastor. He was said to be a preacher of exceptional ability, but only ten members were received in his ten-year ministry. We wonder why. It was also difficult time for the First Presbyterian Church.

For the first year of its new life, the congregation worshipped in Mr. Boice's house, popularly called The Academy because it was formerly a private school. They built their first church building on Main Street, now 120 West Front Street. It was a frame structure much like a New /England Meeting House. Later it was enlarged to 30 by 70 feet, with a rear entrance from Park Avenue. There were sheds for carriages. One of the pastors described it as "a very plain looking frame building, (it had two lonic pillars on the front to dress it up and a modest steeple), but the congregation was intelligent and cordial."

The Rev. Theodore Brown became the second pastor at the end of 1854 and stayed for twelve years. His pastorate encompassed the Civil War years, although the Minutes of the Session do not even mention that wrenching event. Other records show that "he took decided grounds for the support of our government, and the suppression of slavery," which is more than could be said for many pulpits of the time, even in the North. But only two members left the church in protest over his views.

Pastor Brown was also a strong supporter of Lincoln's second campaign, and one time hurried from a prayer meeting to address a rally for the president. These were the actions of a confirmed New Schooler. Thus just fifteen years after its founding, the new church began to visibly demonstrate commitment to its progressive roots by its concern for human welfare. Mr. Brown was so influential in the town that when he preached his last sermon here, he tells us that several other ministers closed their church and came to hear him. During his ministry the church grew from 96 members to 221.




The Chancel

chan·cel /'CHansəl/

Noun

The part of a church near the altar, reserved for the clergy and choir, and typically separated from the nave by steps or a screen.

The Chancel contains the Communion Table, the pulpit, the lectern and other symbols of the Christian faith. The Communion Table reminds the faithful of the Last Supper and is the place at which the sacrament of Communion is celebrated. It is not an altar, but a table at which those who are baptized are invited to share the feast which Christ has prepared. On Sundays when Communion is not being celebrated, a Chalice stands as a reminder of the New Covenant and the shedding of Christ's blood for the atonement of our sins. A Bible stands open proclaiming Christ as the Word become flesh, a Suffering Servant and a fulfillment of God's promise. Two candlesticks stand as reminders of the Light of Christ which has come into the world.



The pulpit stands as a theological witness to the high regard Presbyterians have for Christ proclaimed. The lectern stands as testimony to the high regard Presbyterians have for the Bible. At the back wall of the Chancel stands a Cross, now empty of the body of Christ in celebration of His Resurrection.

The Session Room

The Presbyterian Church, USA believes that all are called to ministry and some are set aside or ordained to specific callings. One such calling is to the office of elder. Elders are called from within the congregation and serve with the Minister of Word and Sacrament, now referred to as the Teaching Elder, to discern where Christ is leading His church and shepherd all the ministries and missions of the church. The Session Room was a place where the elders would gather prior to worship and for special meetings. Originally this room was referred to as the sacristy, and still houses vestments, paraments, and other items used for worship.

There are three pieces of art that grace this room. They include:

An ancient wood carving from Spain representing a Spanish version of one of the Wise Men. Note the spelling of the name as carved in the wood itself.

St. Peter and St. Paul can still be faintly recognized in this antique icon of Russian orthodox origin. The images of the Saints, not too easily discernible, are painted on a wooden base.

Christ Blessing the Children - this is the work of the Brothers Reipenhausen, German painters of the early nineteenth century. I was produced about 1820. Luke 18:15-16.
