

PASTORAL LETTER



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ

Recently during a difficult time a sister in Christ texted me this verse, Lamentations 3:22-24 (I will leave it to you to look it up for yourself) but suffice it to say it lifted my spirits and as I turned to Scripture and the context within which these verses rest, it proved an even more profound reminder that God provides and is present even during (perhaps especially during) the trials we may face. These are difficult times for many churches and for our faith in the world today. - * Brick repointing outside kitchen completed
- * Brick repointing outside bridal room, 95% complete
- * Henry Ward cleaned Sanctuary Room floors on 4/13
- * Roof over back stairs replaced.
- * Roof over 2nd floor choir kitchen repaired.
- * Installed two mirrors in bridal room,
- * The 1st phase of the Stonework project will begin in the middle of July. Will start on 7th avenue side between the two pillars of the main doors. After the work is completed, we will determine the next area based on budget and need.
- * Installed new solar lighting along walkway to 1st place parking lot.

From the time Janice Haer, Christian Education and Nurture committee member, viewed *Won't You be My Neighbor?* in the movie theater, she passionately, enthusiastically, and determinedly pushed CEN to show the film for a Family Movie Night event. There was something about her unrelenting persistence that resonated with me. Of course I was familiar with Mr. Rogers given my age and my profession as a career educator, because for over thirty years his program was broadcast daily into American homes, but something about Janice's account of the multigenerational moviegoers' reactions, made us all think that the four-star rated documentary could work in a Family Movie Night setting. If there ever was a time in our nation's history that Mr. Rogers' approach to young children in particular, and all people in general, is needed, it's NOW. Mr. Rogers might have seemed unassuming to most people, yet the film showed just how bold he was at a time when children's programming needed his creative genius, compassion, and limitless imagination and love to counteract the current trends. Think about it, that's what we need today. Our country, our world is in need of people who will think outside of the box and commit themselves to countercultural approaches... acts of love and kindness, when so many people are prone to hatred and meanness.

So, three Crescent groups, Christian Education and Nurture, Evangelism and Outreach, and the 175th Anniversary committee, collaborated and took the bold step to present *Won't You Be My Neighbor?* on May 4th at 6:30 p.m. in CAPC's Assembly Room on the big screen. Families, friends, and neighbors brought donated non-perishable items to pass along to Starfish, thus enabling us to be a blessing to some of our neighbors who are less fortunate than we are. Those in attendance watched the documentary, pondering the guided questions that would be discussed after the film. The three questions were: Do you think it is more important to tell a child you LOVE them just the way they are and that makes them special? Is Mr. Rogers' approach still a valid way to help children acknowledge and deal with their feelings or are other approaches necessary now? In what ways can today's adults use Fred Rogers' approaches to help children cope within the troubled world they're living? An open and honest discussion ensued after the film, and I think it would be safe to say that we all felt the conversation was a vitally important one to have.

At the close of the evening we seemed to be happy to be a part of an event that opened our minds and made us think, as well as opened our hearts and made us feel how much more we can and should be doing to help children and adults be good neighbors. One notable thing about the film showing on May 4th is that the audience size was smaller than expected. But, perhaps that was a good thing because already CEN is coming up with additional ideas for future showings of *Won't You Be My Neighbor?* This is not a film to be put in a "one and done" category. It's timeless message is vitally important for today's tumultuous times, and showing *Won't You Be My Neighbor?* at least one more time, is something we can do to show love and care for our neighborhood.



SOUP KITCHEN OPEN FOR BUSINESS!

Valarie's Kitchen, the soup-kitchen ministry of Crescent Avenue Presbyterian Church in Plainfield reopens at noon on Tuesday, May 7, 2019 after a hiatus during which the church's kitchen was totally renovated and brought up to code compliance. The ministry was the brain child of the late Valarie Fisher for which it is named. In the aftermath of Hurricane Sandy Valarie noted that the church's kitchen was still able to function and encouraged the congregation to open the facility bringing together people in need of food with those who had food in their freezers which they were unable to cook due to the wide-spread power outages. After the immediate crisis, Valarie encouraged the church to continue to feed the hungry offering with a soup-kitchen that offered seasonally appropriate meals every Tuesday.



The program grew through word of mouth until there were volunteers from the church and the community at large who prepared lunches for as many as 150 guests each week. When it became clear that the church kitchen needed to be modernized if the program were to continue, the congregation was able to raise close to \$350,000 in grants from foundations and individual gifts to finance the extensive project.

Volunteers will be working under the supervision of Executive Chef, Kevin Cook. Chef Cook is a seasoned Executive Chef with more than 35 years of experience in the organization, execution and direction of culinary staffs and functions in such fine dining establishments as the Somerset Hills Hotel in Somerset, NJ and the Lake Edge Restaurant in Watchung, NJ.



The reopening of the kitchen with expanded services is just one of many exciting initiatives that Crescent Avenue Presbyterian has planned for the celebration of its 175th anniversary in 2019 building on its legacy of faith and service. 175th Anniversary Celebration



We are celebrating! Our beloved Crescent is 175 years old and has an amazing church history. We are going strong and WE are now creating the future history.



“Way back” in 1844, Plainfield Presbyterians were divided in philosophy. Plainfield’s First Presbyterian Church was wedded to the traditions of the past and followed the “Old School” way of thinking. However, 86 members of the Church chose to follow the more progressive “New School” philosophy and made the decision to ask for dismissal from the First Presbyterian Church of Plainfield with the intention of organizing a new church. The request was granted and on March 21st, 1844, a small group met at the home of Cornelius Boyce, a church member and prominent attorney. And so our church was born, and our illustrious history began.



To kick off the anniversary year, the 175th Anniversary Committee held an anniversary brunch in March. It was lovely, delicious and well attended and the feedback was extremely positive.

Sharing Memories for the 175th

WHAT YOU THINK YOU MIGHT KNOW ABOUT THE ~~CAPC~~ BUILDING BUT REALLY DON'T

Do you ever wonder why we are called Crescent Avenue Presbyterian Church when our address is 716 Watchung Avenue? Granted, both Crescent and Watchung Avenues surround us on either of our sides. But in the not too distant past (until sometime in the 70's or 80's) our address was 144 Crescent Ave. Why was that? The church and minister's offices were originally located on the second floor with the closer entrance to them being from the door on the Crescent Avenue side (where the mail was delivered). This Crescent door entrance led directly to the stairs by the Ladies Lounge.

At the top of the stairs, immediately to the right, was the church office. Proceeding through the choir room, to the right of the fireplace was the minister's office. Later, this became the office of the Music Director when that office was moved as a result of the new organ pipes being installed on the second floor where once the organ console was located.

When it was no longer practical or prudent to leave the doors on Crescent Avenue unlocked during office hours, the move to the current administrator's office location on the Watchung Avenue side of the church occurred. At this point the address became 716 Watchung Ave. because that became the door the mail carrier used to deliver the mail as the Crescent Ave. door remained locked at all times.

When I first joined the church in 1966, both the current pastor's and administrator's offices were being used for a daytime nursery school. If any of you have been in Pastor Lynn's office and noticed a very tiny half door behind her desk. It was used as a child sized door so the nursery school children could pass between the two rooms. When the nursery school was no longer in operation, the current pastor's office became a Sunday School classroom where I taught a class of fifth and six graders in the early 80's. At that point the church office had already been moved to its present location. Eventually all the Sunday School classrooms were located to the second floor and then the Pastor's office was moved downstairs to where it is now.

Perhaps some of you have heard of the (in)famous basement and even been down there to witness what can't be described with words. When I joined the church, there was a very active Boy Scout troop that held their meetings down there and, believe it or not, even stored their canoes in the basement for their camping trips!

After the Boy Scout troop ceased to exist, an International Gift Shop was opened in the area that is now used for the Fountain of Praise church. This gift shop was open two days a week (I think) and staffed by volunteers. All the items sold there had come from around the world and were made by hand by people as a means for their living. In turn the money from our purchases was returned to them as a mission project which helped them support themselves with dignity and purpose.

While our building has not structurally changed over the years, its inside rooms have certainly been re-purposed. But as we all know, it's not a building that makes the church, it's the people. And yes, the

people have changed too, but always there will be people from one generation to tell all our wonderful stories and memories to the next generation, and the next, and the next.

WITNESSING MIRACLES AT CRESCENT AVENUE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH NOT JUST ANOTHER RENTAL

Recently, Professor, Dr. Jennifer Durham, a lifelong resident of Plainfield and Professor at Adelphi University in NY, sat in the guest chair to the side of my desk. As we wrapped up the details of her rental agreement, our Sexton, Ron, glided in. He smiled, took a seat in Ruth's empty chair, positioned the chair to face me and Dr. Durham at the back desk, then leaned back. This seemed like the perfect time to discuss the set-up of the room that Dr. Durham had just rented. I introduced the two. The following interaction separated **this** rental from all others.

"Jennifer, (we were on a first name basis now), meet Ron Maltby, our Sexton." I told Ron that Jennifer rented the Guild room for a meeting in about a month. With that, Ron famously said, "Okay, we have time for that."

Just as I was completing the related rental paperwork, Jennifer turned slightly back to Ron and asked, "Was your mother a second-grade teacher at The Hartridge School for Girls in Plainfield?" Ron answered, "Yes." The conversation which ensued left *me* consumed with emotion, also Ron and Jennifer, from my observation. With absolutely no change to her professional, calm and gentle demeanor, Jennifer told Ron that his mother was her second-grade teacher at The Hartridge School. Ron with an amused look gave his undivided, unwavering attention to Jennifer. Jennifer proceeded to tell Ron how, as a little girl, she loved being in his mother's class. Mrs. Maltby always snuck in a daily prayer which was not really allowed at that time. Jennifer described how she always looked forward to going to her class because "Mrs. Maltby always made me feel accepted and comfortable."

I could feel emotions emanating from Ron and Jennifer, but I still can't describe the experience. Ron, now with glassy eyes and a more serious expression, nodded up and down, while Jennifer, trance-like, recounted the political climate at that time, and how Mrs. Maltby's class was the escape she looked forward to experiencing each school day.

Dr. Jennifer Durham then turned to me. She explained that she was the first black student to integrate The Hartridge School for Girls in Plainfield, New Jersey, and it was Ron's mother, Mrs. Maltby,

that removed the element of fear, from going to school each day. Jennifer turned back to Ron told him how she remembered being eager to get to his mother's class where she could just be another second-grade student. There, she could forget about the turmoil outside.

For *me*, watching this epic unfold was like sitting in the history about which I had only read about. For *Ron*, (and his siblings, I'm sure) this chance encounter, provided him comfort, peace, and pride knowing how his mother impacted the little girl named Jennifer that their family prayed for.....the little girl who Mrs. Maltby needed to feel safe in her classroom. And for *Dr. Jennifer Durham*, she has the amazing opportunity to reflect on this experience from a successful adult's perspective.

Ron and Jennifer now share a special bond, as Mrs. Maltby's lessons live on.

Our Presbyterian History

THE CHURCH'S COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

In his last message pastor Richards once more challenged the church to examine its work with the question he often asked: "Has it been a good thing for the church and the world that Crescent Avenue Presbyterian church is here. Has it been good for Plainfield?" Subsequent history shows that the church did its best to answer that question positively.

In fact, the church took a leading role, directly, or through some of its members, to start, provide leadership for, and support many community agencies for the welfare of the people of Plainfield. Mrs. Bliss, wife of the previous pastor, was one of the founders in 1890, along with other women of the church, of the Community Organization Society, to coordinate the work and fund raising of local welfare groups. Mary Rock, wife of a later Associate Pastor, was an organizer of Neighborhood House, a recreational and study center for children and young people in June 1943.

Other agencies the church had a part in starting included the YMCA, Muhlenberg Hospital, Children's Home, Salvation Army, and the Citizen's Aid Association. Mr. Richards said "This church has recognized it a part of our mission in Plainfield to promote all such movements to save our fellows from vice or intemperance and destitution!" Later Pastor Moment commented, "In the creation and support of these institutions, none had a larger share than the people of this church." All of this reflected the "Liberalism" of the New School movement and glory was brought to God through it all.

But by far the most significant outreach program established by the church were the three Sunday School Chapels (Bethel, Hope, Warren)...The story of the development of the chapels is truly remarkable. They were all started within a few years of each other, and their growth demonstrates how far-sighted this outreach ministry was. This congregation responded to the specific needs of neighborhoods to the east, west and north of the home church. They willingly provided hundreds of thousands of dollars to build, maintain and expand the churches and support three full-time pastors, until these missions could become self-supporting.

At any one time fifty Crescent Avenue members were working every week in the chapels' Sunday Schools and other programs. More than a thousand children and adults attended classes and services in the chapels every week during the height of their growth. In addition, countless hours were given by the

pastors and boards of the church to care for this extension work in the chapels. Viewed in the light of our church's heritage of concern for others, we can see their work as part of the theology of involvement.

THE CHURCH ENTERS THE TWENTIETH CENTURY

After eighteen years Dr. Richards resigned in 1902, as the church edged into the 20th century. Dr. John Zelig was to move it forward for the next fourteen years. Once more the church chose a non-Presbyterian. Originally he was a Congregationalist, those folks who so troubled an earlier generation of Presbyterians.) Looking back, Dr. John Moment commented wryly that the church was acting in its 'tradition of denominational liberalism.") Not only was he from the other side of the denominational tracks, he was Yale, the hotbed of liberal theology. He was described as a man of particular charm of personality, with a mystical fervor which gave his writing a classical standing in devotional literature. He contributed to literary magazines like the Atlantic Monthly, and many others. His writings were also well known in England, and he lectured in Europe.

During his pastorate the church increased its interest in foreign missions. Several members became teachers in China, while others served on boards of mission schools abroad. The church began supporting one of its own young people, the Rev. Gilbert Lovell, who had grown up in Crescent Avenue. Mr. and Mrs. Lovell established a famous school for boys and girls in China.

The sixty year old church was showing its age. Dr. Zelig described it as a 'gloomy chocolate and coffee tinted walls, not conducive to beauty and reverence in worship." In 1908 a major renovation was undertaken to restore it.

In the last months of Dr. Zelig's ministry, World War I had started, and eighty-six young men from the congregation were in the armed forces (Five were wounded, one was missing in action, and two were killed.)

Dr. Zelig left the pastorate of the church in 1917 and became a chaplain in France, to the American Expeditionary Forces. He wrote, "It is one of the greatest privileges of my life to be with these men. I can't begin to write of the tragic things...I have never worked so hard in my life, and I have lost all track of time." After the war Dr. Zelig helped administer relief in Russia for the Federal Council of Churches.

During the war, the fuel shortages brought joint worship services to Crescent Avenue. The Congregation Church worshipped here for two months, with their minister, the Rev. Ernest Clark, filing the pulpit. Meanwhile a search was on to find a successor to Dr. Zelig. It ended when the Rev. John Moment was installed on January 13, 1919. Dr. Moment served a pastor for nearly 30 years, and led Crescent Avenue into the modern era.

John Moment was a Canadian via Brooklyn, Princeton University, Hartford Seminary, and Lawrenceville School where he was Master of the Upper House and several other pastorates. He was a poet, writer of hymns (two found their way into the Presbyterian Hymnal 1933), pageants, anthems, articles, a book and over a thousand sermons. The sermons were masterpieces of the art (so much so, that Princeton Seminary students were sent to hear him).

The education, music, youth, missionary and community programs grew so much that more space was desperately needed. On November 12, 1919 the congregation voted to do something about it. They authorized a fund of \$39,000 to purchase a new manse for the Bethel Chapel, and to acquire the Cook property next door to the church. A committee of about 70 people canvassed the congregation and the goal was oversubscribed in two weeks.

This 17-room house was turned into a Parish House with classrooms, an apartment for the sexton, and church offices. Ten years later it was torn down to make way for the large Parish House we have today. This three-story Tudor-Gothic style building and its chapel required much planning and fund-raising. Ten families donated \$148,000 to start. Other gifts brought the fund to almost \$200,000. The total cost was over \$300,000. In addition, Mr. Howard Foster gave \$50,000, which began the Endowment Fund. The corner stone was laid in the out-door pulpit of the chapel on February 12, 1931, and the House was opened in October, free of debt.

Almost immediately the building became a center for a number of community groups, as well as some 500 Sunday School children, and many church meetings and dinners. The chapel, which can seat nearly 130, is an architectural gem with its rose window and small stained glass side windows. One side of these illustrates events in the life of Christ, the other, ten activities of the Christian church. In December 1993 the chapel sustained heavy damage from a broken steam pipe, but has been restored to its original beauty. A carved Flemish oak fireplace, dated 1645, dominates the Guild Room, the setting for many educational and social events. Christian symbols in various forms are found throughout the building.

Brandon Baker






Nicholas Archer-Kennedy






